WASHINGTON, May 25 (UP) - The United States, Britain and France announced today agreement on arming the Arab nations and Israel. President Truman hailed it as a step that should promote peace and security.

Arab-Jewish tension, prevent a new outbreak of war and bolster the area against Communist aggression. The Arab nations and the new Jewish state are pledged

to use the arms only for their own internal security, and The Big Three agreement was


#### **Memorial Day** May Kill 290

CHICAGO, May 25 (UP) -A total of 290 persons may be killed in traffic during the four-day Memorial day week-end, the National Safety council estimated today.

Ned H. Dearbor, council president, said good weather would bring 30,000,000 veh icles onto highways. The death toll will be especially heavy, he said, if many persons are released from work on Monday.

Fill it out and mail it to the Addin Security Adminstration, Abilene ,Texas. You will receive your card in just a few days.






