



It may mean adding a soil improving crop to the rotation, in order to increase oil productivity; or, it may mean eeding grass on abandoned cropand, or land that has ceased to pay a profitable return.

We, as soil conservation techniians, realize that when a group, or an individual asks his soil conservation district for assistance, and the district in turn asks us
