Lift Up Your Heart By Rev. C. Nelson

The fourth commandment answers the question of how often we sare to worship God. We are worwhip him every Lord's Day. No person will ever grow strong in the spiritual life who neglects his worship of God. No home will ever reach its maximum happiness that neglects this important matter. No nation will stand that neglects this matter, for it is only an indication that the nation has forgotten and forsaken God.

This commandment sets out certain duties that are binding upon man. The duty of work. This com mandment dignifies labor. Labor is man's normal condition. Man is as much commanded to work six days as he is to rest on the seventh.

The duty of rest, Jesus said, "Man was not made for the sabbath, bu the sabbath was made for man." Man's mental, physical, moral and spiritual health de pends upon his observance of this day. The word Sabbath comes from the Hebrew wordbdadao5s meaning, to rest from labor.

The duty of worship. Worship sacred rest for the soul. As God ed the sabbath for the rest refreshment of man's physical life, he also intended the sabbath for the refreshment of the spirit of man. Man is both spirit and flesh. His soul must be - refreshed if he is to be happy.

Let us notice some of the reasons for keeping this day. First God rested from his creative labors and commanded his people to This should be sufficent reason. Second, God set this day aside become participants with unholy men committing an unholy act. Third, it commemorates the resurrection of our Lord in whose death rent keeping of God's Holy day.
