Traffic crashes killed more persons during the four-day Fourth-of-July weekend than any previous holiday in history and it appeared certain that the final toll of dead in

all types of accidents also would set a new record. A United Press survey showed 800 persons died in accidents during the 102-hour period from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight last night.

Of the total, 479 died in traffic Drownings claimed 159 victims, three died from heat prostration, 22 were killed in plane crashes and 137 died in other types of accidents.


