#### Loophole Plugged

NOGALES, Ariz. (UP)-"Hands across the border" is all very well, the international boundary and water commission has decided, but the old fence between this border town and its twin city, Nogales, Mex., stimulated travel and trade beyond a desirable point. The commission, representing both the United States and Mexico, has ordered an 11-foot fence to replace the old barrier, only eight feet nigh and decreipt enough to invite smuggling and illegal border crossing.
