# Korean Reds Launch Major Attack

## Commiss Push Troops From Taejon; Some US GIs Trapped In City

### Heavy KoRed Forces Come And Come Till Americans Run Out Of Bullets And Begin Retreat

TOKYO, Friday, July 21 (UP) — A Communist armored assault on Taejon drove out the hard fighting American defense garrison and trapped some of its men today in the shattered and burning city.

In Washington an Army spokesman said Gen. William F. Dean, commander of the 24th division, had been unofficially reported as missing in the fighting at Taejon. When last reported he was in the thick of the fighting and had knocked out one tank personally.

A dispatch from the hills outside Taejon said the Americans were pushed out after battling desperately all day against a tidal wave of North Korean tanks and troops.

### Irate Woman Receives Call Early Today

HOUSTON, July 20 (UP) — Mrs. Clara Berry, 45-year-old nurse who used a mop handle on "peace" petitioners at her home 10 days ago, received an anonymous, threatening telephone call early today.

Mrs. Berry, mother of a Navy lieutenant, told police the incident took place at a private clinic, where she is employed.

It was 3 a. m. she said, when another nurse, Mrs. Mildred Strait, looked from a window and saw a man apparently tampering with Mrs. Berry's car. She summoned patrolmen, but they were unable to find the prowler.

Shortly after the police left, Mrs. Strait answered a telephone call. In a low voice, a man asked Mrs. Strait to relay a message to Mrs. Berry.

"We don't want her calling police when she sees anyone around her car, or something is going to happen to her," Mrs. Strait quoted the caller.

Ten days ago, Mrs. Berry beat one "peace" petitioner about the head with a mop handle and tried to tear up his petition asking that the atomic bomb be outlawed. Three of the petitioners, two men and a young girl, beat a hasty retreat across her lawn to their car.

### Korean War Stops Work In Houston

HOUSTON, July 20 (UP) — The first major construction project in Texas to be shelved by the Korean war is an 18-story office building planned here.

The \$4,000,000 structure was to have been built in downtown Houston by investment developer Frank B. Christian.

Christian has announced now that in the interest of the war effort he will withdraw his plans. When certain materials no longer are necessary in government projects, he will go ahead with the building, Christian said.

### Nat'l Guard May Get Call To Duty, Today

WASHINGTON, July 20 (UP) — The Army may call its first National Guard units to active duty today.

There was no indication just what units would be called, but it was expected they would not be whole divisions. Under present plans, the Army intends to call up the Guard by battalions or regiments at the most.

The first call for reservists went out yesterday.

President Truman told Congress he has authorized Defense Secretary Louis Johnson to mobilize the National Guard and the Reserve. He asked the law-makers to remove the present ceiling of 2,005,000 officers and men on the combined strength of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Chairman Miltard E. Tydings, D., Md., summoned his senate armed services committee to meet in a "working session" on Truman's request.

He and other key Democrats told newsmen it is "entirely possible" the committee will approve immediately legislation to lift the manpower ceiling and to permit the President to extend enlistments for one year.

The Armed Services need men in special categories. For that reason, they have been combing their personnel files for the past several days to determine what Reservists or Guard Units should be called to active duty.

Men involved in yesterday's first call for Reservists were expected to get their orders momentarily.

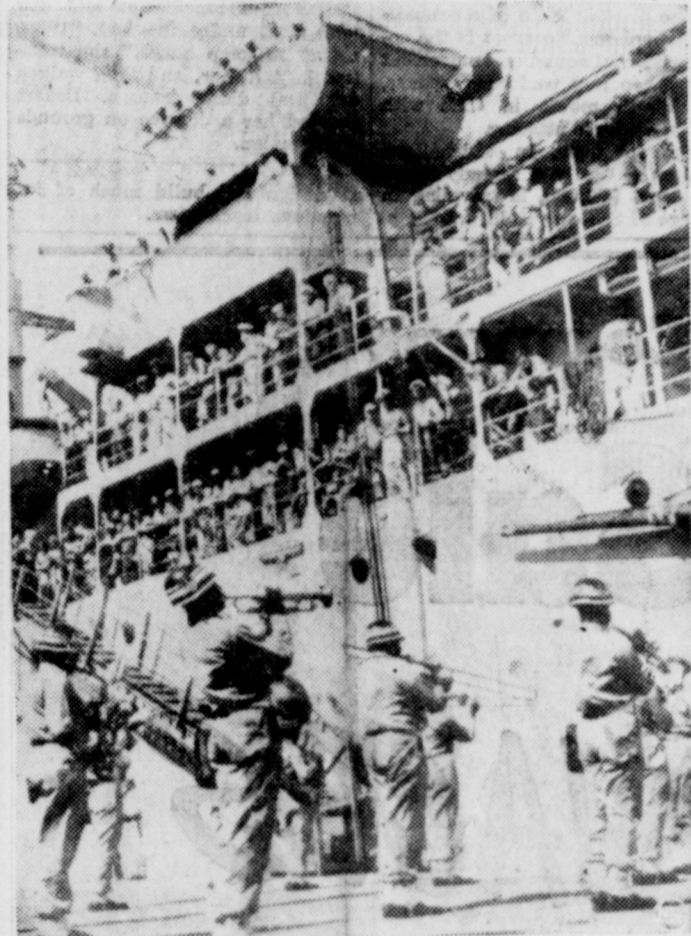
Rev. Jack D. Wester will hold a revival meeting at Staff, beginning July 23 through 30.

"Hiya Joe. How you making it?"

"Swell, how about yourself Jim?"

"Oh, pretty good considering. How is the wife, and kids?"

"Tolable, I guess. How does the war situation look today? I didn't get to hear the news broadcast this morning."

"Not too good Joe. Looks like we are going to have a long, hard fight. Prices are going up too, and mighty fast."

"Yeah, but you know, it's all the people's fault. Greed, that's what's causing it."

"Sure, but what can you do about it? Those Washington officials talk till they are blue in the face telling everybody that there is no present danger of shortages, but people keep buying up everything they can find. One guy told me yesterday that he had bought 300 pounds of sugar."

"I hope it costs it's guys like that that cause prices to go up you know. If a lot of people do that, there will be a real shortage, and the people that do need things won't be able to get it, while those who stored up will have it rotting on their hands."

"Yeah, even if there are no shortages now, it is getting to the point that there are, and plenty fast. Plenty of merchants are taking advantage by jacking up their prices too. Helps scare people."

"People just don't think, that's the trouble. When a scare like this comes, everybody runs to buy. They don't take time to think. If they would all just let things go along normal like, there would be more for everybody, and prices wouldn't be so high."

"That's right. That's exactly right. But how you going to change things? People just go wild buying, everything they can get their hands on. They buy things they never thought of buying before, and things they won't need for a long time. Can't do a thing about it though. Well, guess I will run along. See you, Joe."

"Okay, say where you going, Jim?"

"Oh, I thought I would go over to the tire store to buy me a new set of tires. I hear they got a new shipment in yesterday, and the way people are buying things up, there won't be any left for long. I wasn't going to get new ones for a year or so, but people are buy crazy now. You gotta protect yourself."

"Yeah, I believe I will go with you. I bought a set about four months ago, but believe I will get another or two, just for insurance. That way I will know that I have them if I need them. My wife said to pick up if I can find them. Ours may not last over two or three years she says. I'm going to buy three or four futurevision control dials too. Of course, futurevision is not perfected yet, but I hear rumors that it is ready to come out. I don't want to be unprepared. The way people are buying things up there won't be anything for long."

"Yeah, people are sure crazy. Let's go before they buy up everything. Say, do you think we should get us about 100 pounds of sugar too? Just for insurance, you know."

"Might be a good idea. Hate to get caught short. People are sure crazy."

**Famed Puppet Show To Perform After Rodeo**

Levi's Electric Puppet Rodeo, enjoyed by millions of visitors to the 1939 and 1940 Golden Gate International Expositions, will perform here after each rodeo at the main gate of the arena.

The exhibit, credited with being the most complex mechanical and sound display ever built is traveling aboard its own monster, streamlined truck. The show is a complete Western Rodeo in miniature, with judges, announcer, cowboy singer, bucking horse, and even a clown and his trick mule.

Each of the 29 puppets is an exact, hand-carved likeness of a prominent figure in the rodeo world; and all are dressed realistically in miniature Levi Strauss Rodeo Shirts and miniature Levi's Waist Overalls, complete even to the concealed copper rivets on the back pockets.

Among the notables represented

are Gene Autry, leading singing cowboy star of the movies and radio, Abe Lefton, famous radio announcer, Fred McCargar, secretary of the Monterey County Fair, Homer Holcomb, noted rodeo clown and Burel Mulkey, former Grand Champion Cowboy.

The rodeo carries its own power plant to operate the twelve electric motors and scores of electro magnets that actuate its tens of thousands of moving parts. From behind the scenes, it has the complexity of one Rube Goldberg's mechanical nightmares.

Yet, so perfectly has the mechanism been designed that it works automatically throughout, without the necessity of any attendant to pull a wire or so much as throw a switch. The entire action and sound of the rodeo are directed by the electric brain of a concealed Robophone. So exact is the coordination of sound and movement that when any performer speaks, his mouth moves in time with the words he is uttering.

The spectacle, in which Levi Strauss & Co. have already invested some \$50,000, is traveling in charge of S. Reese Kidd, who helped design and build much of its ingenious mechanism.

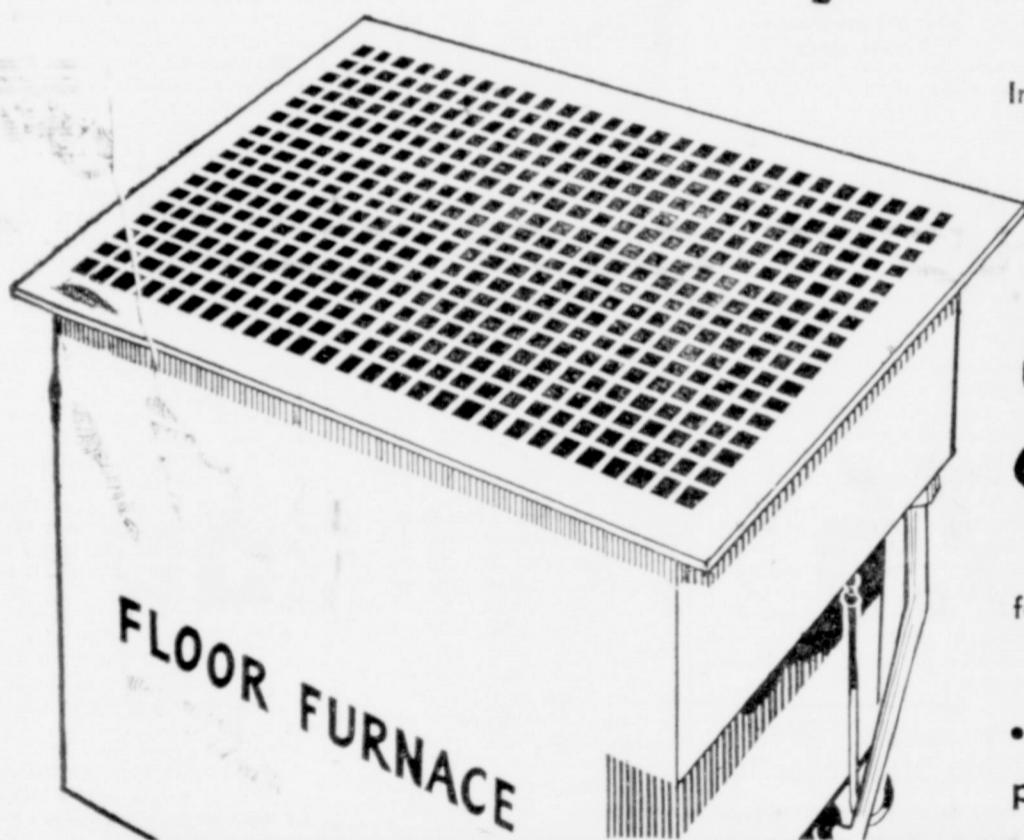
Brooks declared in his opening campaign address that the State is facing the worst financial crisis in its history.

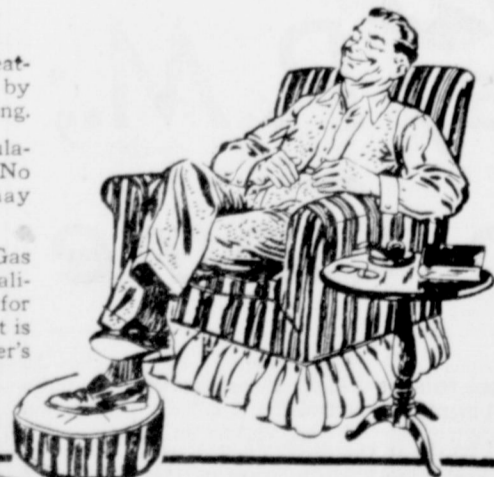

## Alaska Troops Alerted For Possible War

FORT RICHARDSON, Alaska, July 20 (UP)—Jet fighter planes stood ready for "instant" takeoff on every Alaskan air strip today as territorial military forces manned their posts on a "defensive alert" designed to foil any "Pearl Harbor" of the North.

Every means of detection, from sharp-eyed native spotters in the Arctic seaboard to the latest type of radar, operated continuously with fresh crews rotating at control points.

Military personnel manning Alaska defenses were kept constantly alert. A certain percentage of men in every outfit stood by in full battle dress. The others were under instructions to report to their posts the moment a raid warning sounded.

A unit of jet fighter planes was ready for immediate takeoff at every Air Force base. Pilots and mechanics stood by the planes in shifts. Ladders were up to the cockpits and all equipment was aboard each craft. If an air raid warning were to sound, the jets would be roaring down the runways in from 90 to 120 seconds.

A second unit of jets were on a "30 minute alert" at every base. Pilots and mechanics stood by telephones in their quarters, ready to send the remainder of the fighter plane armada aloft as quickly as the raid warning summoned them.

Air and ground defenders were ready around the clock to swing into action if enemy forces were detected approaching the coast of Alaska. The thoroughness of the military planning makes it evident the mistakes of Pearl

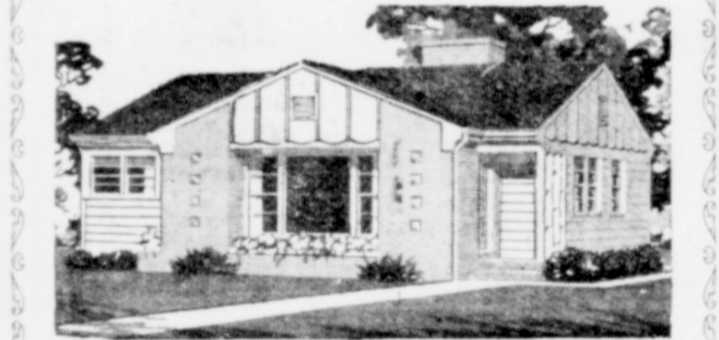

### Truman Urges People Not To Panic To Stop Creating Shortages With Foolish and Selfish Hoarding

WASHINGTON, July 20 (UP)—President Truman told Americans last night that National security and the peace of the world are at stake in Korea.

In a radio and television report to the nation, he called upon all Americans to tighten their belts, to pitch in and "work together" to meet the threat.

He said the Communists' "raw aggression" against South Korea was a challenge to the effort by free nations to build a world where men "can live in freedom and peace."

"This challenge has been presented squarely," he said. "We must meet it squarely."

The President's talk was broadcast and televised from a small movie projection room in the east wing of the White House.

Truman stood before a small

lectern, and read his address in a calm serious voice, looking up occasionally to drive his points home.

About sixty persons crowded in to the small room to hear and see the President. Those present included members of the cabinet and the White House staff.

Grave and unsmiling throughout, Truman detailed the \$10,000,000,000 program for defending the free world against Communism which he had set forth in a message to Congress earlier.

He warned bluntly that substantial increases in taxes would be necessary to finance it.

"We are united in detesting Communist slavery," he said.

"We know that the cost of freedom is high. But we are determined to preserve our freedom—no matter what the cost."

The President said events leading up to World War II had taught the free world the "fateful lesson" that "aggression must be met firmly."

"Appeasement," he said, "leads only to further aggression and ultimately to war."

He warned that Moscow's Communist plotters would not stop in Korea if the Red regime in North Korea is victorious.

"The free nations face a world wide threat," he said. "It must be met with a world-wide defense."

Truman urged the people to cooperate in an effort to halt scare buying, hoarding and profiteering which have become apparent since the South Korean invasion.

He was "sorry to hear" that some people had fallen victim to rumors and started buying up commodities they had heard would be scarce.

"This is foolish—and it is selfish," he said, since "there is plenty of food in this country."

Hoarding of food was "especially foolish," he said, since "there is plenty of food in this country."

He added that if he had seen any actual threat of consumer

goods shortages he would have asked Congress for price controls and rationing. If excessive buying or speculation force prices up "unduly" he will ask for such controls.

The President had a sober word for businessmen who have raised prices to take advantage of panic buying, and for the hoarders. A "major aim" of the new tax program he will send to Congress later, he said, will be "the elimination of profiteering."

Truman said he knew the American people were "willing to do their part to support our soldiers and sailors and airmen who are fighting in Korea."

He again expressed his conviction of final victory, but acknowledged that a tough struggle lies ahead. He quoted from messages from Gen. Douglas MacArthur and Army Chief of Staff Gen. J. Lawton Collins to support this view.

MacArthur cabled that the Communist invaders failed to exploit their "great chance" to knock out the American and South Korean defenders.

"We are now in Korea in force," the General said, "and, with God's help, we are there to stay."

Collins told the President the job in Korea is not an easy one but American troops are giving a splendid account of themselves and "I am confident of the outcome."

Truman shared that confidence. "Our country," he said, "stands before the world as an example of how free men, under God, can build a community of neighbors, working together for the good of all."

"That is the goal we seek not only for ourselves, but for all people."

"We believe that freedom and peace are essential if men are to live. It is this faith that has guided us in the past, and it is this faith that will fortify us in the stern days ahead."

General Gets Into Fight, He Reports

ON THE TAEJON FRONT, Korea, July 20 (UP)—Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, commander of the 24th infantry division, personally got into the battle today just before the Americans abandoned Taejon.

He strode into a command post with a bazooka team and a broad grin on his face.

"I just got me a tank," he said. The tank was one of at least 12 knocked out by the Americans in their retreat from the city that formerly housed U. S. advance headquarters. Most were destroyed by new super-bazookas that fire 3.5-inch rockets. The Red tanks got into Taejon

before the Americans realized they were not U. S. reinforcements moving up to the front.

When the tanks were only two blocks from the Taejon railway station, a sergeant hollered:

"Don't shoot! They're ours!"

At that moment, the tanks opened fire and the battle was on. The day's best shot was Pfc. Robert Veronisi from some city in Massachusetts. He destroyed three and possibly four tanks with rockets.

The Americans had to fight their way out of Taejon through a road block thrown up by the encircling Reds. They escaped to safety through a gantlet of machine-gun, mortar and rifle fire from North Koreans disguised in white peasant clothes and scattered through hills overlooking the road.

One train escaped from the railway station. Another which was ordered to bring out wounded was riddled with bullet holes, and had to go back.
