TOKYO, Friday, July 21 (UP) - A Communist armored assault on Taejon drove out the hard fighting American defense garrison and trapped some of its men today in the shattered and burning city.

In Washington an Army spokesman said Gen. William F. Dean, commander of the 24th division, had beeen unofficially reported as missing in the fighting at Taejon. When last reported he was in the thick of the fighting and had knocked out one tank personally.

A dispatch from the hills outside Taejon said the Amercans were pushed out after battling desperately all day against a tidal wave of North Korean tanks and troops.
