Bull Town Days time again it is.

From here, it looks as though the people in Bull Town have everything in readiness for the annual celebration except for a few last minute details, which always, amazingly, seem to get

The bull statue is ready for its dual dedication ceremonies and in just a few hours the choice beef will go on the barbeque pits and be "just right" for the Friday evening supper, which is again expected to attract thousands of people to temporarily more than double the population of this central Parmer County community.

It's an ill wind that blows

Green bugs, which have infested the Parmer County grain sorghum crop during the past two years are considered an expensive menace to the farmers. About the only thing good about the insects is that, by spraying,

they can be controlled. As far as most people here know, there was no major green bug damage to grain sorghum prior to last year --- '68. But that year and this saw the bug population build up to the point that regular spraying with insecticides was necessary to control the maize yield - des-

troying bugs. The "good" part of this deal, unless you're in the aerial spraying business, is that the insecticides which are used to control the green bugs will also, evidently, control mosquitoes.

The mosquito population hereabouts during these past two years has been almost nil. If we've seen a mosquito this summer, we don't remember it. Prior to all this spraying business, mosquitoes were certainly a problem. Cities were forced to spray at least on a weekly basis in an effort to make it comfortable for their citizens to get out in their yards in the late afternoons and nights.

Parathon is one of the chemicals most often used to control Thousands Will Eat -the green bugs in the grain sorghum and it is the one given the credit for keeping the mosquito population killed out. Maybe other chemicals help

in this, too. We're getting into the chemical business over our head when we even bring up these points. But it could be that these same chemicals are also aiding in keeping down the fly count.

Flies, certainly, aren't as scarce as are mosquitoes, but some people feel they are not as numerous as they were say three years ago. Other folks will tell you there are just as many flies as ever so we won't argue over that part of the insect situation.

But we will take our hat off to whoever and whatever is responsible for getting us out of the mosquito business.

At long last, agricultural chemicals may be able to do with mosquitoes what most folks wish Noah had done when he had that pair on the ark eliminate 'em!

People who are in the housing business should take a look at Bovina.

That information may be worth just as much as we're charging for it, but it looks from this angle that opportunity is a'knocking in this area for people who will provide places for other people to live.

Houses, apartments and whathaveyou for dwellings, as far as we know, are not mecessarily at a premium, price-wise, but they're about as scarce as hen's teeth if you need to find one in a hurry for a family to live in.

Starts Here Thursday Bovina's sixth annual Bull Town Days celebration gets underway about any tastes.

Three - Day Schedule

this week, with three days of activities scheduled to please just

Beginning Thursday and continuing through Saturday, the events are expected to attract thousands of people, as they have in the past. An estimated 3,000 attended Bull Town Days '68.

Approximately 2,800 came to supper Friday night last year at the free downtown barbeque. As many, if not more are expected to enjoy the beef, home-grown cantaloupes, and pinto beans at this year's meal.

Thursday afternoon's jack-pot calf roping kicks off the celebration. It is scheduled for 1 p.m. in the roping arena, and will be followed by boys calf-riding. Admission, which includes both events. is \$1 and 50 cents.

Later Thursday, at 6 and 6:30 p.m., the men's and women's cow calling and beard growing contests will be held.

Anyone who thinks they possess the vocal qualities necessary to attract cows is eligible to enter. Men who have neglected to purchase a shaving permit and now sport luxuriant growths, will have their fuzz judged as soon as the cows have been called. Both events will be at the roping arena.

Hold on to your seat, because the Bull Town Days Queen contest is scheduled to follow at 7 p.m., also in the arena.

Nine girls will be judged on their appearance and horsemanship, with a queen and two runners-up selected to reign over the 1969 celebration.

Immediately after the queen contestants move from the arena. the spotlight shifts to the Bovina Schools auditorium. The Bull Town Days variety show will be staged there at 8:30.

Mrs. Mike Barraza, director, promises an unforgettable evening in an Old West setting. The show has traditionally played to standing-room only crowds. Admission is \$1 per family.

Winners in the beard-growing, cow calling, and queen contests will be announced at intermission of the show.

Bull Town Friday gets off to an early start with a chuckwagon breakfast slated from 7-9 a.m. in the Bovina Gin yard. Members of Bovina Roping Club will serve scrambled eggs and sausage, complete with the flavor of early morning on the High Plains.

Old-timers registration will be from 10 a.m. to noon in the downtown police department. Bovina Woman's Study Club is overseeing the registration, and a community basket lunch. The lunch is scheduled for noon in the Masonic Lodge Hall, and all celebrants

Also beginning at 10 a.m. and lasting until 2 p.m., are horsemanship activities at the roping arena. Everyone is invited to bring their horse and participate. An eight-man pony express race will be included in these events.

The first dedication of the bull statue accompanying Bovina's historical marker will be at 3 p.m. Friday. Members of the Roping Club will supervise the informal ceremony.

Hungry paraders can join the spectators at 6 p.m. for a massive downtown cook-out. Over 3,000 pounds of barbequed beef will be served to Bull Towners and visitors at that time. Pinto beans, cantaloupes, and drinks will accompany the beef.

Mutt Graham and R. L. Hopingardner are the chief cooks for the meal, with special mesquite wood for cooking furnished by the Young Farmers.

At 8:15, awards for the winners in the days events will be presented. Following this, participants will have a chance to danceoff some of that barbeque in the square dance contest and downtown square dancing.

Square-dance chairman Pat Kunselman expects 10 squares of dancers to participate in the contest.

For those who favor another kind of dancing, "The Intruders," a rock band, will provide music for the teen dance. Mrs. Marie Venable announces that it will be from 9 until midnight in the American Legion Hall, with \$1.50 per person admission charge.

Bull Towners can wake up Saturday morning, full of barbeque, and tired from dancing, to find another day of activities awaiting.

Santa Fe's High Spot Court Case Subject

Parmerton. Most folks think of a bald knoll of rich farmland beside a grain elevator when that name is mentioned -- the highest at Bovina, they were not let en", this area of Parmerton spot, by altitude, on the Santa

Fe railroad in West Texas. But Parmerton was the first county seat in Parmer County and was the center of controversy and court cases for more than a decade. Its name probably caused more furor than any other back in 1907, soon after Parmer County was organized, until 1916, when the subject of a county seat was dropped for at least 10 years.

A search of records in County Clerk Bonnie Warren's office at Farwell, a long day of reading the 1907-'08 files of the Hereford Brand, and visits with Attorney Sam Aldridge--born in 1907at Bovina; pioneer Frank Hastings, Leroy Berggren, who moved here in 1907; County Treasurer Mabel Reynolds -and others -- have revealed some interesting facts.

Parmerton has been surrounded by legend for over 60 years, some fact -- some fiction. As nearly as can be determined from scant records, and memories, the following happened:

It all began early in 1907 when Parmer County broke off from Deaf Smith County, to which it had been aligned since this area was organized as a part of the state of Texas. Earliest records of Parmerton were found in the Here-

ford Brand, dated Feb. 22, 1907. "District Court convened this week with Judge J. N. Browning of Amarillo on the bench. The fore part of the week was consumed mostly in impaneling

"The election in Parmer County to determine county seat will be held in about six

Parmer County didn't wait

The Hereford Brand reported the election was held on May 10. 1907 with Parmerton receiving 21 votes; Bovina 19 votes; Farwell 11 or 17 (difficult to distinguish); and Frio, six

W. L. Townsen was elected county judge; J. F. McKay, county clerk (later designated as district clerk, but may have been both); Norman Wilson, treasurer; E. T. Stevens, sheriff. Oldtimers say Sam Bratton was the county attorney.

A list of commissioners was also reported, but could not be distinguished.

Neither the election, nor the following, was entered in the earliest Commissioners Court Notes on file in Parmer County. Speculation is that such may be mixed in the recordings of Deaf Smith County.

The election was contested -both that for the county seat and for the county and district clerk. On July 5, 1907, the Hereford Brand reported:

"First District Court was held in Parmer County since its organization. The docket was

"Hon. J. N. Browning, Judge 47th Judicial District, presiding, Henry S. Bishop, district attorney, J. F. McKay, district clerk, E. T. Stevens, sheriff."

The case of Tom Hoghland et al, contestants, vs. Henry S. Bishop, contestee, was Cause No. 1 and contested the county seat election. The hearing was continued until next session, but later reports of the outcome could not be found. Because of later developments, it apparently was affirmed.

Cause No. 2, E. L. Swenson, contestant, vs. J. F. McKay, contestee, questioned the election of clerks. The case was

Cause No. 3, in that first district court, was M. B. Tisdel et al vs. R. M. Whitehead et al, suit for specific performance of land contract. Was continued by operation of law. completed two days labor without being able to find sufficient evidence upon which to base an indictment. This is certainly a splendid record and shows people of Parmer County have taken a stand on the side of law and order.

'This is one of the first counties of the state to be organized without a single indictment.

"Ample accommodations had been provided by ladies of Parmerton and this new town has her name well up as a royal entertainer."

A court house was built, along with a few houses for the county officials, and a one-cell jail. A windmill supplied water for the sparce residency. Leading to the town was a wagon road, which ran alongside south of Santa Fe tracks, according to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hastings. Aerial Spraying Relatively New Business

By Carolyn Bobo

He flies over your house in the early hours of a new day, disturbing your sleep and reminding you of wartime blackouts and surprise attacks. He scares the dog, annoys your wife, and wakes you up.

He dives towards a field of sugar beets, cotton, or milo, apparently bent on total selfdestruction. Just as you're ready to close your eyes and pray, he pulls up, levels off, and skims the field, barely five feet above ground, dusting it with insecticide or fungicide to give the High Plains farmer a higher crop yield.

Those daring young men in their flying machines may cause Bovina residents to wake up a little earlier, but the farmers who require their services don't object to the loss of a few winks.

Aerial crop spraying, a relatively new business in this area, has become an essential factor in successful farming. Several agricultural schools have added flying to their curriculum in an effort to fill the growing need for skilled crop spray plane pilots.

Pilots are readily available. but it is often difficult to find one with experience in agricultural flying, "They've either been flying jets, or have very little experience when they come to us," said Mrs. Chuck Stallings, wife of the owner of Chuck's Aerial Spraying Service. "They've been to school, flown a few hours, but don't realize how little they know."







Mrs. Thompson is particularly greatful for her husband's use of a helmet on one occasion: "He was taxiing along the runway, and a gust of wind caught the wing. The plane flipped over, and the top caved in -they had to dig him out."

The hazards of the airways consist mainly of the whims of the wind. An air pocket, providing no lift, causes steering problems. Whirlwinds without dust are invisible, and will spin a plane around. Power lines are always a danger, because they are hard to see against the horizon and terrain. If a pilot hits a high-line dead center, it will probably only scar the plane, but catching a line in a in 7 or on the tail will cause loss of control. "You can't have anything else on your mind when you're flying," attested Mrs. Stallings. "If you keep your mind on what you're doing, you can usually avoid accidents," added Davis.

The season for crop dusting may start as early as February, and "pretty well ends by October 15," said Thompson. "Once in a while, we'll spray in February, then some wheat in March. Then milo, sugar beets, vegetables, and some

cotton defoliating." If a plane is wrecked, it can be rebuilt as long as the motor is intact. Every plane has a number, and can be completely restructured from this serial designation. During the winter, pilots spend their "flying time" ground-bound, working on planes and repairing







Preparation for germination is the next step. Strata is prepared depending on the types of seed. Some seeds are planted in petri dishes, and others wrapped in blotters, or paper towel-like mats.

In the case of grain sorghum, 100 seeds are prepared for germination in an unusual manner. A plastic square, approximately 8"x8"x1", is connected to an air hose. On the square are 100 holes similar to tiny vacuum cleaners. When seeds are poured onto the square and then shaken off, 100 will be held in place by air pressure; the oth-

a perfect square, ready to go into the germinator.

Germinators are similar to refrigerators, and have light and heat regulated depending on the needs of the seeds. After the proper germinating period, the new sprouts are removed, inspected and given a rating reflecting the number of seeds that can be expected to grow-the germination percentage.

When the consumer sees a seed tag on grain, he will have an idea of the quality of the product. If the seed is labeled 90 per cent germination, 90 of every 100 seeds planted should sprout and grow. If the seed is labeled 95 per cent pure, the quantity contains only about five per cent weed, trash, straw, or other foreign matter.

The seed lab checks these percentages to be certain that the product complies, within a certain tolerance, to the standards on the tag. The higher the

ists, the lab can ask for a hearing and file suit, usually for \$25-\$200, depending on the severity of the mislabeling.

Although most of the samples received by the lab come from within the state, some are from Oklahoma and New Mexico. These are usually from individuals or companies wishing to sell seed in Texas.

There are also privatelyowned laboratories which test for germination and purity, but only a state lab can provide the tag for legal sale in Texas.

election was held, O. W. Rhinehart was elected mayor, with John Kimbrow and J. T. Hammonds serving as Bovina's first commissioners.

One of the main reasons for incorporating Bovina was the reality of a city water system. "The town was full of windmills," recalled Rhinehart, "nearly everyone had a well." A \$25,000 bond election was held and carried, to finance a water system.

The city fathers contacted Santa Fe officials in Amarillo to investigate possibilities of leasing or buying two deep wells and a water tank owned by the and Homer Martin was hired

"The water engineer said, 'How would a dollar a year basis to collect water bills," sound'," recalled Rhinehart. "We were expecting to pay considerably more for the use of those wells." The Santa Fe railroad even sent a crew to steam clean both wells and the 133,000 gallon tank, at no charge to the town.

An Amarillo engineering firm recommended that the water system be constructed according to standards of the state Fire Insurance Commission, in order to lower insurance rates.

Plans for the system were submitted to the Commission, which returned them with only minor changes. The bonds were sold to Security State Bank in Farwell, on a 20-year, 3 per cent interest plan.

With the paperwork out of the way, construction began on a water system for the fledgling City of Bovina.

"We put eight inch (water) mains in the commercial district," said Rhinehart, "and six inch mains in the residential area. The Fire Insurance Commission required the larger pipes because of higher volume in commercial areas."

While the new city government was providing growing Bovina with water, the momentary mayor, W. O. Cherry, was quietly helping. "He served one meeting," Rhinehart chuckled. "But he was a lot of help. He stayed up a lot of nights 'til midnight, or 1 or 2 in the morning working for the city. He was a good hired hand who didn't draw a salary."

At this time, Emmett Tabor resigned as mayor, and C. R. Elliott finished his term. Then, under the new aldermanic form, Boyd Gilreath was elected mayor, with A. R. McCutchan, A. L. Glasscock, J. E. Sherrill, A. L. Kerby, and A. E. Crump comprising the aldermen.

Today, Bovina enjoys city water and sewerage facilities, and is officially a city. Presently serving as a governing body is Mayor Bedford Caldwell, and Aldermen Vernon Estes, Charles Corn, Billie Sudderth, Lloyd Gober, and Vernon Willard.



Bovina continued to grow, and in 1954, joined the Texas Munic-

In 1955, O. W. Rhinehart was again elected mayor of Bull Town, Emmett Tabor and Paul Jones served as commission-

At this time, a bond issue was voted on to install a city sewer system. A \$100,000 revenue bond was passed by city voters. "I believe everyone in the city limits could tie on to the system," said Rhinehart.

Early in 1956, O. W. Rhinehart resigned as mayor of Bovina. "I wanted the offices stag-
