



# U.S. Troops Strike Back

TOKYO, Thursday, Aug. 3 (UP)-American troops checked the Communist drive on Pusan today with their first tank-led counter-attack of the war. But they were forced to give up the important central front town of Kumchon to escape encirclement.

Troops of the U.S. 24th division, led by "souped-up" Sherman medium tanks, slashed through the flank of the Communist salient aimed at Pusan. They catpured strategic heights just east of Chinju and less than 50 miles due
