**THE FIRST STEP IN THE** organization of a state home guard unit for Eastland was made at a meeting Tuesday night.

Officers for the unit were named, and other preliminary organization plans were made.

Roy Laney, police chief was made captain of the local unit. Laney was chosen largely because he is in position to know when and where the home guard may be needed.

The home guard will serve strictly as a home protective organization. It will be available for such emergencies which may arise in this area where a sizeable force may be needed to keep order.

Sufficient equipment will be issued to the unit to enable it to carry out its duties efficiently.

**IF THE NATIONAL GUARD** is called up, the home guard will be the only force available to handle local emergencies which may arise. Most persons are agreed that the calling up of the National Guard is only a matter of time depending, of course, on the future developments in the international situation.

More men are needed to make the home guard a workable organization which will have strength enough to be of any help in a crisis which could arise in this area.

Laney states that another meeting will be held in the near future. The date of the meeting will be announced later. He urged that anyone who can serve in the unit attend the meeting.

Laney is available to answer questions concerning the guard, and to give any information he has to those interested. It is a move deserving of the support of the community.

**A LITTLE EFFORT CAN SELL** a lot of horned toads.

Members of the Old Rip Horned Toad Derby committee have found that out in the past few weeks.

Some of the committees have worked long and hard on the derby, and their work cannot be called slight. But a great number of the 400 entries which had been received by yesterday morning were obtained by the writing of a letter, which is not a tremendous amount of effort. Especially when all of the letters, after the first, are copies, with only a different name and address.

The letter writing idea was dreamed up by L. E. McGraw, dealer in Chrysler products, who credits the 100-day Chrysler strike with giving him enough time to devote almost full working hours to the interest of the derby.

Thanks to Chrysler's strike, McGraw and a number of other local businessmen, the derby this year has given Eastland more favorable publicity than any event in recent history.

**WHEN THE 400TH ENTRY** was brought in yesterday, the derby was already a far greater success than most persons had dreamed it could be, and the first racer had not left his stall.

The number of entries assure the derby of being a very profitable show this year. A much greater profit than the more than \$200 realized last year is assured.

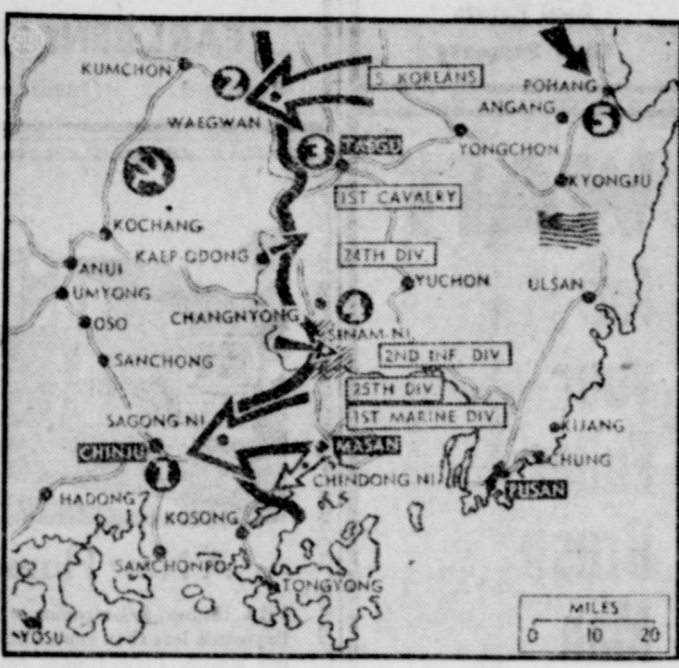
This year, the entire profit will go back into the derby fund, and most of it will be spent to buy additional bleachers for the next year's program, which is being planned for downtown.

As the derby grows and gains full equipment, the derby fund will mount and may be used in the future for needed improvements in the city. The bleachers have already proved themselves very useful.

Looks like the Old Rip Derby is here to stay, with good results for Eastland.

## Teagu Front

### Yank Battalion Surrounds 200 Koreans And Begin Wipeout

ON THE TAEGU FRONT, Korea, Aug. 10 (UP)—A Yank battalion surrounded about 200 North Koreans on a commanding hilltop behind the American Nakdong river line today and began an "operation wipeout."

Tanks and mortars poured withering fire on the Reds, and the infantry attacked repeatedly during the night, morning and early afternoon. But the enemy, estimated at reinforced company size, still clung to the battered hill.

Division Commander Maj. Gen. Hobart R. Gay directed the attack personally. The hill, four miles southeast of Waegwan, gave the Reds a full view of two supply roads leading to the American and South Korean defense positions. Their machine gun and mortar fire had made the roads unpassable and caused some casualties.

**INFANTRY ATTACKS WERE** alternated by bombardment. A heavy mortar battery threw several rounds of white phosphorus into enemy positions to mark them for the .75 millimeter guns of the tanks.

The tanks poured round after round into the hilltop as fast as the gunners could load. Shells raged the hillside, directed by infantrymen who had been up there and knew just about where the Reds were dug in.

### Truman Says Doesn't Like Filibusters

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (UP)—President Truman today criticized Russian behavior in the United Nations Security Council as a filibuster.

**THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE** was asked at a news conference about his evaluation of the current Russian attitude in the Security Council where Soviet Delegate Jacob Malik, as the presiding officer, has conducted a running battle with the United States and British representatives over UN efforts to restore the independence of South Korea.

Truman said that he does not like filibusters in any form and that there is no doubt that this is a Russian filibuster.

**THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE** elaborated by saying that he's not nearly as interested in the Russian delegation as he is highly pleased with the performance of the American and English delegates.

At the same time he ruled out any prospect of his participation in any meeting of Eastern and Western heads of state. He said the UN is the proper forum for international discussions. There have been no official proposals for a meeting of heads of states so far as is known.

**TOKYO, Friday, Aug. 11. (UP)**—Communist forces burst out of a bridgehead in the elbow of the Nakdong river today and raced several miles southward, threatening the flank of American columns on the march less than three miles from Chinju.

But in other sectors the allies wiped out a bridgehead over the Nakdong near Taegu, trapped 800 to 1,000 Communists east of Chinju, scored gains up to 12 miles on the south coast and drove the enemy back on the northern front.

A lightning thrust by counter-attacking North Koreans from the bridgehead some 30 miles northeast of Chinju threw out of balance the otherwise firm stand on the Nakdong line.

About 300 or 400 of the Communists boxed in for five days on the Nakdong where it turns eastward to Pusan slashed through the southeast corner of the box.

They struck out southeastward, seized a bridge over the Nakdong about 15 miles north of Masan, and sent feeler patrols down the highway leading to that port 25 miles behind the spearhead of the American push to the gates of Chinju.

### Brooks Asks Opponent If Favors Tax

**ABILENE, Tex. Aug. 10 (UP)**—Pierce Brooks asked in a statewide radio broadcast last night whether his runoff opponent for Lieutenant Governor, Ben Ramsey, favored a state income tax.

Brooks charged that while Ramsey was a state representative, he "voted for and supported a state income tax bill. The bill would have slapped a personal income tax on the people."

"Does he still feel that way?" asked Brooks. "And does he favor the income tax companion, the sales tax?"

Brooks, a Dallas insurance man, pledged his opposition to additional state taxes and warned that "unseen forces are seeking to seize control of a high state office and set up a puppet regime."

"An all-out attempt," he said, "is being made... to seize control of one of the most powerful offices in state government—that of Lieutenant Governor."

The U. S. Marines on the coast southeast of Chinju were mopping up isolated Communist pockets and moving forward virtually at will, with a 12-mile gain reported by supreme headquarters.

The midnight communique said the Communists in the elbow bridgehead were under mounting attack and artillery fire. But front reports and an 8th Army headquarters statement disclosed that shock troops of the estimated 4,000 men in the pocket had counter-attacked.

**THEY DASHED SOUTHEAST** down the Nakdong valley, grabbed a bridge over the river, and took at least temporary control of the road south to Masan.

A front dispatch said it was too early to guess just what the enemy thrust might develop into. It said that perhaps 300 to 400 North Koreans were moving southward, "but how many more will try to follow them has not been determined."

**NEITHER HEADQUARTERS** nor front reports had clarified the overall situation around Waegwan, northwest of Taegu. Whether the shattered bridgehead was the only remaining Communist toehold on the east bank of the Nakdong there was uncertain. MacArthur's communique said only that the Waegwan bridgehead was "contained and under attack" and another five miles north of Waegwan was isolated by Korean Republicans.

South Korean troops counter-attacked and drove the enemy back in the area of Uisong, northeast of Taegu, the communique reported. But Communist pressure continued in that sector.

On the east coast, Communist troops moving south from captured Yongdok were checked just south of the port by the South Koreans.

### Good Tax News

## INCREASED OIL PRODUCTION MAY RELIEVE FORECASTED \$26 MILLION STATE DEFICIT

taxes has been pegged at about \$165,000,000.

At the present rate of spending, about \$150,000,000 would be needed in the next biennium for the operation of the state government. To that must be added the \$26,000,000 forecast deficit, and an expected \$34,000,000 shortage in the state's omnibus tax clearance fund, to meet needs of the \$15,000,000-a-year rural road program and the minimum foundation school program. The total need comes to about \$210,000,000.

**HOWEVER, FOR THE 1951-1953** biennium, only about \$45,000,000 in revenue is in sight, with some \$39,000,000 expected to come into the general revenue fund, and \$6,000,000 from the penny-a-pack cigarette tax enacted last February for a hospital building program.

While economy moves could cut the total it was not expected that any appreciable amount could be whacked. Ninety per cent of the state's money goes to schools, highways and public welfare.

Calvert's report of state finances for July showed that more revenue was brought in than was spent. Cash receipts amounted to almost \$46,000,000. While \$35,000,000 was being spent.

However, at the same time only about one-half of the "surplus" went into the general revenue fund. As a result, the general fund showed a net drop of about \$500,000, dropping to \$29,612,000.

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
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



### OLD RIP MAKES HISTORY

When Eastland county dedicated its then new courthouse in 1897 with the laying of the cornerstone, Earnest Wood, now justice of the peace, noticed his son Will playing with a horned toad. The idea came to Wood to place the toad in the cornerstone of the building. This toad was Old Rip who made history by living in the cornerstone until February 28, 1928, when the building was torn down. Three thousand people watched as Judge Ed S. Pritchard removed several items from the cornerstone until only Old Rip remained. Eugene Day, an oil man, reached in and lifted the dust-covered toad out and handed it to Rev. Frank S. Singleton, pastor of the Methodist Church who handed it to Judge Pritchard. Pritchard held the frog up by one leg and it kicked with the other, raising a cheer from the people as Old Rip awoke from his 31 year sleep. Rip was exhibited in various parts of the nation, and visited President Coolidge in Washington before he died of pneumonia Saturday, January 19, 1929. His body was embalmed and may be seen today in a beautiful plush lined casket in the lobby of the present Eastland courthouse.

### Robinson Clings Tenaciously To Welterweight Championship

 JERSEY CITY, N. J., Aug 10 (UP)—Defying the tragic spectre of Joe Gans peering over his shoulder, "Sugar Ray" Robinson clung tenaciously to the welterweight championships of the world today because "I'm worried about my health but titles are hard to get."

Tired and drawn after a weight-making battle which preceded his successful 15-round title defense against Charley Fusari, Robinson prayed for a shot at the middle-weight crown.

There was no doubt in the chill breeze swept through Jersey City's Municipal Stadium last night that Robinson still was the best welterweight in the world, even as a shadow of his best fighting self. His toughest fight came a few hours earlier when he sweated to make the 147-pound limit.

The first time he weighed in he was a quarter-pound over weight. He shadow boxed for four

rounds and then baked in a sweat box.

At the next weigh in he was one ounce too heavy and it was back to the sweat box.

And those who watched this dehydrating procedure shook their heads in dismay. They remembered all too well, the old timers, the tragic fate of Joe Gans, the old master who wore the light-weight title at the turn of the century. Gans, too, had his weight making difficulties.

There was an afternoon at Goldfield, Nev., when he had to sweat off weight at ringside to match the scale in a title defense against battling Nelson. Gans won that fight. But it was the start of a down-hill battle with tuberculosis which claimed his life a few years later.

Robinson remembers that, too. But the famous "Sugar Ray" was born Walker Smith, son of a poor widow, and it was a long uphill struggle from the streets. The welterweight crown is his passport to security—even if it is an eventual ticket to tuberculosis.

Against Fusari the lean Negro, who had weight making troubles for several years, was slow and off form. Only in the last round did his flash the form which rocketed him to stardom as the dancing dynamiter.

"Did I look tired?" he asked later in the dressing room, denying with narrowed eyes that he had been.

Watching him closely was Dr. Vincent Nardiello, Robinson's personal physician.

"Making weight like this is absolutely detrimental to Ray's health," the dapper little doctor explained with a shake of his head. "He'd be a sucker to do it again. And he has more trouble all the time shedding that extra poundage."

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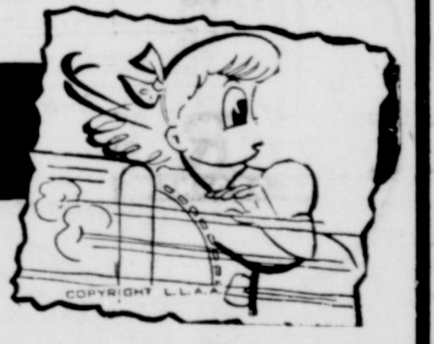

### Officers Hunt Teen-Age Girl; Fear Murder

FREMONT, Mo., Aug. 10 (UP)—Officers who tracked down and killed ex-convict William Harris, slayer of three persons, today intensified their search for a 15-year-old girl who may have been abducted by him.

A state highway patrol spokesman said Lola Fansler may have been a fourth victim of Harris who killed her father and brother and his own four-year-old daughter earlier this week. Two other persons were wounded in the shooting affray at the Fansler home near Eminence, Mo.

Harris, 39, was shot to death yesterday by special deputy sheriff Harold Frey in the "Irish Wilderness" of the Clark National Forest where 300 officers, deputies and volunteers had hunted for the killer.

Harris killed Lola's father, R. N. Fansler, 65, when the farmer accused Harris of running off with the girl. Lola disappeared from home last Friday, the same day

Harris disappeared from his house at a nearby farm.

In addition to killing Fansler, Harris fatally wounded his son, Homer Fansler, 27, and Barbara Wanda Harris, the gunman's daughter.

The state highway patrol at Willow Springs, Mo., said police throughout the region had been notified to watch for Lola.

"The people present at the shooting scrape haven't been able to help much," a patrolman said. "We're investigating the possibility that Harris may have killed her too."

He declined to say whether police considered it probable that Harris had killed her.
