# Anthrax Epidemic Hits Eastland County

of livestock in an area of 12,-000 to 15,000 acres in Eastland and Stephens counties has been imposed after an outbreak of the deadly disease, anthrax, in Eastland county, E. V. Slover of Eastland, cattle inspector for the Texas Livestock Sanitary Com-

mission, has announced. Officials said that the outbreak is apparently fairly well under control after the death disease, but the quarantine is being imposed to prevent any possible spread of the disease, and will be continued until all danger is removed. Anthrax, or Charlion as it

is sometimes called, is one of the most dreaded scourges of animal life because of the variety of domesticated animals it may attack.

It is chiefly limited to cattle and sheep, but it may be cats and certain kinds of game. Dogs and hogs are slightly susceptible while fowls a r e practically immune, according to a Department of Agricul-

ture book, Diseases of Cattle. The book also states that anthrax may be transmitted to man in the handling of the carcasses and hides of animals which have succumbed to the disease.

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



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
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
