Communist Self-Propelled Guns and Mortars Beat Off US Counter-Attack

ON TAEGU FRONT, Korea, Aug. 25 (UP)—Communist self-propelled guns and mortars beat off today a joint American-South Korean counterattack up the "bowling alley" highway north of Taegu.

American forward positions 14 miles north of Taegu astride the main highway from the south. It was from these positions that the 27th (Wolfhound) Regiment threw back five Communist attacks toward Taegu earlier this week.

The South Koreans who had been ordered to leapfrog through us started 15 minutes late and astounded the Americans crouching in the paddies by marching in a column straight up the road.

They walked the 500 yards up to our positions without receiving enemy fire.

The plan called for the Americans to hold their places until the South Koreans took over. But the leading South Korean platoon spread out in a creek bed and moved no farther.

An American major approached them and tried to get them moving. But a South Korean non-commissioned officer explained they could go no farther because their officer had not arrived.

Soon afterward, half the South Korean battalion marched up the road led by an officer waving a dirty towel to keep the flies from his face.

The rest of the battalion was moving single file at the base of a ridge on our left.

Since the operation seemed to be going smoothly, I walked back 500 yards along the road to F-company's command post. Half-way back, I passed three South Koreans sauntering up the road covering their noses with their handkerchiefs against the stench of the Communist dead along the road.

At that moment, the North Koreans opened up with a murderous fire with their mortars and self-propelled guns directly into the American covering force which started to pull back under the leap frog plan.

From the company command post, I saw the shells burst among the Americans and South Koreans. The GIs spread out through the rice paddies and began to work their way backward.

The leading American tank, in which tank platoon leader 2nd Lt. Billie D. Hughes of Jacksonville, Ill., was riding, returned the fire. Then it plowed into the rice paddies to help the GIs who were trying to get out with their wounded.

Nearly ten American soldiers climbed aboard the tank out of

the heavy mud, back on the road and out to safety.

The American Major who had gone forward to spur on the South Koreans was killed. His body was brought out by the withdrawing Americans.

When the South Koreans saw the Americans leaving, they turned and ran, too, even though they must have known the original plan called for the covering platoons to pull back.

Late today Col. John Michaels, commander of the 27th Regiment was trying to reorganize the South Koreans and get the counter-attack rolling again.



Observers Doubt Iran's Forces Could Hold Out More Than Week

TEHRAN, Iran (UP)—American and other foreign observers here doubt that Iran's military forces could hold out for more than a week if Russia should decide to invade this oil-rich little middle eastern nation.

There has been no clear indication that Russia plans such an attack anytime soon, but a Soviet grab for Iran's oil would probably come soon after the start of any general war.

Ever since 1946, when world pressure forced Russian occupation troops out of Iran, Soviet forces have waged a constant "war of nerves" along the border on both sides of the Caspian Sea.

Iranian frontier areas were closed to foreigners last month, as a result of repeated Russian protests, and few reliable reports from the frontier have reached here since that time.

There is little doubt, however, that Russia has strong forces grouped on her side of the border, and that Soviet troops could move south in overwhelming force when ever the Kremlin chooses.

Some observers believe that Iranian forces would give up at the first blow, while a strong Communist fifth column stuck behind them to prevent "scorched-earth" sabotage of Iran's oil fields.

Other sources believe the Iranians would fight gallantly, while the new government of Premier Gen. Ali Razmara held rear-area Red activity to a minimum.

None believed, however, that the Iranians could stand up for long against full-scale Soviet attack.

The most popular estimate appeared to be that border resistance might last four days. Most observers agreed that Soviet forces would reach the southern oil lands within a week to 10 days.

Observers who recently have watched troop maneuvers believe Iranian regular forces could be depended on to wage a punishing guerrilla war from the mountains after their defeat in open combat.

Some recent reports indicate that for the present, at least, the Russians are fortifying the border for defense rather than attack.

There were reports that the Russians are building a chain of watchtowers along the Azerbaijan provincial frontier, west of the Caspian, to back up barbed wire entanglements and machine gun posts guarding the border.

The bulk of the Soviet frontier force consists of "security police," said to be equipped with tanks, artillery and warplanes. Regular Army units are believed to be grouped behind the police forces, but no one this side of the Iron Curtain can say for sure.

The Security Police are the principal Soviet forces in the "nerve war." A favorite alarmist tactic is for a company of Russian tanks to roar up to the border, deploy as if it meant business, and then retire after firing a few rounds at simulated targets.

TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission has refused to permit a proposed truck rate decrease on shipments of Cuban sugar from Houston, to other Texas points.

Motor truck lines had asked to establish a rate of 37 cents per 100 pounds for a 30,000 pound minimum on refined Cuban sugar. Present motor rates range from 53 to 65 cents per 100 pounds. The rail rate is 43 cents per 100 pounds.

The ICC said the proposed rate for Cuban sugar "would be certain to lead to disruption of the motor and rail sugar rate structures."

AMARILLO, Aug. 25 (UP)—Mrs. M. A. Choate, prominent 71-year-old Amarillo property owner, was killed last night when she stepped in front of an automobile near her home. Witnesses absolved the driver of the car, a 24-year-old Amarillo man, of blame in the accident.

AUSTIN, Aug. 25 (UP)—A 70-year-old general practitioner from Pecos has been named "Texas" doctor of the year by the State Medical Association.

HOUSTON, Aug. 25—The City of Houston took in \$7,592,486 in revenues and taxes in the first seven months of this year, Controller Roy Oakes announced today. The figure represented an increase of \$465,659 over the same period last year.

General fund receipts totaled \$5,175,751, with \$1,286,984 in current-tax collections and \$506,912 in delinquent taxes collected.

HOUSTON, Aug. 25—Houston draft board officials said today they were convinced that a large number of eligible men in this area are definitely against selective service.

Of 606 men called last week by draft boards for pre-induction physical examinations, only 396 showed up, and only 264 of those were found acceptable.

Mrs. Josie Koonce, principal clerk of the boards, said a large number of the 210 men who did not show up are delinquents and are subject to prosecution.

HOUSTON, Aug. 25—The bodies of two Houston fishermen who drowned yesterday in Galveston Bay were recovered eight hours after their boat capsized.

The two were Cleo Owens, 16, son of Clifton Owens, and John Preston, 35, Justice of the Peace G. P. Redell returned a verdict of accidental drowning.

The two were members of a party of eight who rented two boats and started out toward the dike off Texas City. Witnesses said the boat in which Owens and Preston were passengers developed "a big leak" and sank quickly. Two other men in the boat were rescued.

DALLAS, Aug. 25 (UP)—Three alleged members of a hoodlum gang that specialized in robbing wealthy families remained in jail here today after being denied bail by a district court.

District Judge Henry King yesterday refused to release on bail Flemming Van Derrick, Wannie Franklin Strong and Leroy Goss. They face multiple charges of armed robbery.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Aug. 25—Feliz Ontiveros, 58, was killed yesterday near the Texas-Mexican railway depot here when a freight car, cut loose from a switch engine, crushed him.

AUSTIN, Aug. 25—Bell county officials were urged today by the Texas Highway commission to speed preparations for a four-lane highway on U. S. 81 between Temple and Belton.

The construction project has been tagged as essential for defense purposes by Army authorities, who have urged the highway department to maintain U. S. 81 from San Antonio to Fort Worth. Commission members said Bell county officials had purchased the right-of-way between Belton and Temple, but had not completely cleared it of obstructions.

Dr. Jim Camp, who has served three generations of West Texans, received a plaque from the Association's executive council.

Traffic Picks Up Through Hotel Window

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 24 (UP)—Traffic was busy through a second story window in a San Antonio hotel early today.

Police stid a young woman, visiting her male friend, in the second floor room leaped and landed unhurt.

The man followed her through the window and was not as lucky. He broke his right leg and received a severe head cut.

The wild leaping started, the woman told officers, when the man insisted that she marry him and slapped her when she said "no."
