PLUG 'N TRIGGER

There have been a few crisp days and nights lately, if you're a hunter who dotes on ducks from a blind, or the angler who thrills to a heart-skipping battle with rod and reel, get set for fall!

The hunting season soon will be in full swing and there's no better time than now to ready that shotgun and ammunition for the thrills and excitement that lie ahead. For the rifleman who racks up bigger and more elusive game, prospects for deer hunting the coming season have never been better.

Fishing always is refreshing and invigorating in the fall. At every bend of stream and lake there's a new clean and thrilling scene to greet you with Mother Nature outdoing herself in all her glory of fall to break the summer monotony. Wildlife seems to sense her new and invigorating spirit; it's a catching, invigorating feeling that only the nimrod and angler can understand.

Rain, mud and cool weather have made dove hunting hard work as well as decreasing chances for a full bag. Dove hunting reports have been fair to middling with each day bringing the migration a little farther south. Not much hope is foreseen for an improvement, particularly in North Texas. Even with two strikes against them, nimrods have been covering the muddy grain fields thoroughly since opening day.

Mother Nature seems to have endowed some of her creatures with severe handicaps and then as if to make amends, developed abilities to overcome such handicaps. Take the Rhino, his defective sight can hardly make out a motionless man at a distance of more than 40 to 50 yards, yet this animal's sense of smell is so keen it can detect the presence of a man a quarter of a mile away!

The wild Barbary Sheep of Africa does not flee when he suspects danger. Instead, he will remain absolutely motionless; depending upon his color to blend with the surroundings to conceal him.

The pupils of the eyes of rattle snakes and other pit vipers, which are mostly nocturnal hunters, are spherical at night but in the daytime contract to a vertical slit, thus cutting out bright light.

The Hedge Hog is an ambitious and notorious snake hunter employing a rather unique system. It bites the snake near the tail, then curls itself up and lets the snake strike repeatedly, injuring itself on the hedge hog's tough spine. After the snake has exhausted itself, the hedge hog simply bites the snake into pieces and eats it.

Another tough little rascal is the Pangolin of Sumatra, a member of the Anteater family. He has a suit of armor so strong that it can easily resist a revolver bullet.

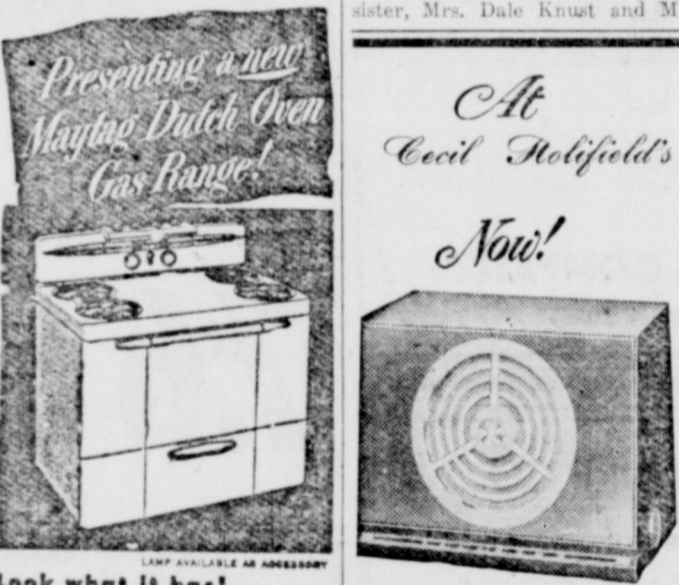

Communism in Russia deserves to be measured over against the intolerable tyranny and oppression of the Czars; it may even be a step in advance of that which it replaced.

But Communism within the United States is quite a different thing. Here it appears as a threat to that great good that we call democracy; and worse still, it seeks to overthrow the Christian religion which has been the sure foundation of our freedom and our integrity. Toward Communism in Russia we may take an attitude of sympathy, hoping that a great nation will move on to higher ground, though we recognize the right of the Russian people to choose their own political and economic system. So we say to each other, "Hands off" of the internal affairs of other nations. But we ought to be mightily concerned with the appearance of Communism in the U. S. A. Perhaps here, however, we ought to be on our guard against the reality rather than the name. It is one thing to belong to the Communist Party, which looks us squarely in the face and announces its position. It is quite another and a more dangerous thing to be a Communist and not let it be known. It is the under cover Communism which threatens us most.

Communism sets itself up as a religion, denying God and the Christian Faith; it would close the doors of the Church. Do you support the Church, or could its doors close so far as you are concerned? There are sixty million people in this country who are not members of any Church; they are the Communists we should fear. Godless women and men, intent on themselves or some political party as the chief good, irreverent and devoted to material ends—these are the Communists whom we Americans should fear and seek to change.

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Feds Accuse Scientist Of Being Commie

The government today accused a brilliant Chinese research scientist of being an alien Communist as another top-flight physicist was convicted of lying about former Communist party ties.

Dr. Hsue-Shen Tsien, 40, head of the jet propulsion center at California Institute of Technology was held without bail at the immigration service protection quarters on nearby Terminal Island.

IMMIGRATION SERVICE agents arrested him on the civil charge only two weeks after customs officials seized eight packing cases of scientific papers which Dr. Tsien sought to ship to Shanghai. The packing cases were routed via Hong Kong and consigned by the scientist to himself.

Meanwhile, Dr. Sidney Weinbaum was jailed without bail and awaited sentencing Tuesday on three counts of perjury and one count of fraud. A federal jury decided after nearly four hours of deliberation yesterday that the former Cal Tech physicist lied when he told an Army Security Officer last year that he had never been a Communist.

THE RUSSIAN-BORN WEINBAUM, 52, said he would appeal the verdict. He maintained he never belonged to the Communist party. Weinbaum was charged with perjury when he denied having Red ties in 1938 in order to remain at work in the Cal Tech jet propulsion laboratory.

The Weinbaum and Tsien cases were not related, authorities said. Tsien's work was with the Guggenheim jet propulsion center and concerned with pure scientific research. Weinbaum had worked in the top secret jet propulsion laboratory at the institution.
