Fall being a season which is usually connected with sports, largely because of football, some of the readers may be interested in a book just off the press called "Towering Texans."

The book contains sport sagas of the Lone Star State and was written by one of the state's greatest names in the sports writing field, Harold Ratliff.

Ratliff has been in the sports writing business over 25 years, and during that time he has become acquainted with the state's greatest athletes of the area.

Another book by Ratliff, "I Shook the Hand," has proved to be a big seller.

From the cover of "Towering Texans" we quote: "Texans stand against the sky in the world of sports. They are among the greats of all time in football, track, baseball, golf, tennis, polo, marksmanship, boxing, horse racing."

"Great coaches, great promoters, great leaders. Colorful, dynamic, inspiring. Athletes and sports events of Texas have written the headlines of the world."

"This book captures the color and the glamour and the glory of a half-century of sports achievement. It is history written by great men and women on the fields of keen competition."

A big part of the greatest athletes the state has produced are included in the book.

Some may have been overlooked who are deserving, but the book covers the situation very well.

Had we been consulted, we would have had Ratliff include Jackie Robinson, Baylor's All-American basketball star who played on the American Olympic team a couple of summers ago. But offhand we cannot think of a season we should have been asked about the book.

Robinson was one of the greatest athletes we have ever had the privilege of watching, and perhaps he would have been included if he had not received an injury which kept him out of competition in his final collegiate season, or if he had gone into pro basketball.

We are sure you might find someone you think might have been worthy of the book also when you read it, but all in all, Ratliff has covered a great majority of the greatest of the state's athletes.

Lions Turn Tamer; Mavericks Subdued Friday Night, 25 -- 0

Eastland's Mavericks failed to qualify as Lion tamer Friday night, especially of one Lion, Jimmy Allman, who led Albany to a 25-0 win over the Mavericks at Maverick Stadium.

Allman tried to turn the game into a one-man show, scoring 3 touchdowns among his other accomplishments.

Despite a tremendous weight advantage for Albany, the Eastland team played hard throughout the game, never letting up as is indicated by the fact that as the game ended, the Mavericks were trying to punch across a score from the Lions' 11 yard line.

If games were won on sheer grit and determination, the Mavericks would be a mighty hard bunch to take into camp.

Typical of the spirit of the Eastland team was 117 pound Rodney Stephen who played the full game, despite the fact that he was slightly injured on two occasions after being hit by boys from 30 to 70 pounds heavier.

Stephen passed, punted, ran and made several hard tackles on opposing players during the game. His passing was brilliant when he had time to spot his receivers, and his punting was outstanding throughout the game.

Bobby Womack played an outstanding game at end in the absence of regular Eddie Haines. On offense, Womack, who has previously played center, caught several of Stephen's passes, including one for a touchdown which was called back because of an infraction of the rules.

Time and again Womack stacked up plays in his territory on defense, once brushing by four blockers to make a tackle.

Gerald Davis, playing with a still taped arm, also turned in a good defensive game. Derrell Black also showed some good defensive play, partially blocking 2 punts. Gerald Ables, playing guard for the first time on defense, turned in some steady work.

Doug King was captain for the night and he turned in some power running of merit.

Allman scored the first touch-

down of the game, returning a punt for 70 yards after receiving Stephen's punt on his own 30, faking to one player, and going all the way. The score came early in the first quarter.

Keith Witherspoon kicked the extra point and Albany led, 7-0. Allman added the second score in the second quarter on a 29 yard run from scrimmage after he had run back another punt 59 yards to the Eastland 20. The score raised the count for Albany to 13 as point was missed, and Eastland had 0.

In the second half, Allman returned a punt from his 30 to the Eastland 20, and then carried from scrimmage to the one foot line with Kenneth Burton carrying over putting Albany ahead, 19-0. Allman counted the final tally

after catching a pass from Witherspoon on the Eastland 40 and going over. The play was good for 60 yards overall, making the final score Albany 25, Eastland 0.

On top of this, Allman had a 68 yard run from scrimmage called back, and made several long gains from scrimmage.

Eastland's ground attack failed almost completely, as the Mavericks were unable to take the heavier Lions out of the plays to give the backs a chance to break through.

During the last half the Eastland team used a wing formation to give Stephen time to pass. He had been smothered repeatedly when trying to pass against the Lions from the T.

The Mavericks take a welcome open date this week before opening the district season against Comanche in Comanche on October 6.

The layoff should give Eastland injured a chance to recover, and the Mavericks will probably have some surprises worked out for the Indians.

Small Group Of Senators Fight Control Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (UP)—Sen. William Langer collapsed on the Senate floor today while filibustering against the Communist Control bill, and Senate leaders grimly pushed on to let opponents talk themselves out.

The 63-year-old North Dakota Republican his face ashen and murmuring, "I will not yield," right up to his collapse, slumped to the floor after talking for five hours and 28 minutes. He was taken to a hospital.

HIS DETERMINED EFFORT to delay action on a vote to override President Truman's veto of the "stringent Communist-curling bill" shaped up as only a futile gesture.

After Langer's collapse shortly after 5 a. m. EDT, Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D. Ill., with tears in his eyes, took up the talkathon. Then Sen. James E. Murray, D. Mont., relieved him at about 7:45 a. m. EDT and the talking went on.

SENATE DEMOCRATIC Leader Scott W. Lucas bluntly told the little band of determined men that their tactics were "absurd and ridiculous." He said members would be held at their desks all day if necessary.

He obtained consent to reconsider an earlier vote ordering Congress to quit today until Nov. 27.

Marines Meet Big Opposit'n

TOKYO, Sept. 23 (UP)—Stubborn enemy resistance staled the Marine drive to capture Seoul today but the Americans were enveloping three sides of the city and to the south the jaws of an Allied nitracker closing on 100,000 Reds were only 85 miles apart.

United Press Correspondent Jack James—in the first dispatch out of the Seoul-Inchon beachhead in more than 24 hours—said the Marines were just about stopped in their tracks Saturday.

"It's like a spring or rubber band," one Marine officer said. "Ever time we add a pound of pressure we have an extra pound of resistance."

The southern prong of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Korean offensive was surging forward from its Pusan beachhead with a speed which only a week ago would have been unbelievable.

But, with the Allied gains in the south, also came one of the tragedies of war.

British Tommies driving on Songju eight miles west of Waegwan were meeting stiff opposition two miles east of the town. They had captured one side of a hill and had called for air support to help them drive the Communists from the other.

Politicos Pay Call On AFL 69th Meeting

Two Democrats, One Republican To Talk

The AFL today trotted out three of its favorite political figures, including vice-president Alben W. Barkley, to help whip up enthusiasm for the November fight to elect Labor's friends.

The AFL's political arm—Labor's League for Political Education—had the spotlight at the Federation's 69th annual convention. League director Joseph D. Keenan was scheduled to kick off the session. Liberal Senators representing the Republican and Democratic parties were scheduled to address the meeting in the morning before Barkley's afternoon address.

OREGON'S WAYNE MORSE was on hand as GOP spokesman, although he clashes frequently with Republican leaders over party policy. Paul Douglas, freshman Senator from Illinois, was slated to speak for the Democrats.

In difference to the Taft-Hartley law's restrictions on union political activity, the convention recessed this morning. But delegates stayed in their seats as members of the political league's national committee.

THEY WERE SCHEDULED to reconvene after Barkley's talk to continue voting on resolutions.

The AFL, which has taken sharp criticism from John L. Lewis since he disaffiliated his United Mine Workers three years ago, readied a return salvo.

The resolutions committee of the AFL's 69th annual convention was reported drafting a report characterizing Lewis' invasion of the building trades as "akin to strikebreaking."

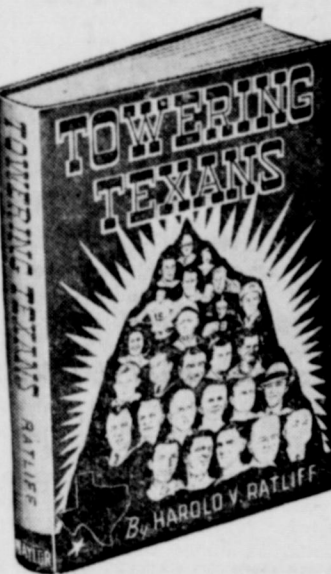

Truman To Say Whether Man Will Be Killed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (UP)—President Truman will have the final say on whether or not the Army carries out the death sentence imposed in Korea on Negro 1st Lt. Leon A. Gilbert of York, Pa., for disobeying an order.

Although the White House has yet received official notification of the case, it eventually will find its way to the President's desk. All court martial death sentences must be reviewed by the Chief Executive before they can be carried out.

GILBERT, A 32-YEAR-OLD soldier with the 24th Infantry of the 25th division in Korea, wrote his wife at York, Pa., that he has been sentenced to death by court martial for disobeying an order. If he had carried out the command, he told his wife, it "would have led me and 12 other men to certain death."

Mrs. Gilbert immediately hired a lawyer to investigate the case and the attorney enlisted the aid of Rep. James F. Lind, D., Pa.
