

### **Name Inspectors** For Ouarantine


James Lee Calaway and Linwood Guthrie cattle inspectors with the Texas Animal Health Commission at Bovina, have completed a training course in cattle scables identification.

Calaway and Guthrie will be working in Parmer County assisting cattlemen in moving their livestock to market during the current cattle scables quarantine.

The quarantine is aimed at halting the worst cattle scabies outbreak to hit the nation since 1959, according to an official of the commission. The eradication effort needs specially trained men like Calaway and Guthrie because the mites that cause cattle scab are hard to spot. The mites are often masked by pesticides used to kill ticks and lice, the official stated.

Other inspectors in the quarantine area are helping cattlemen identify infected animals and clean them of mites. If every head of infected and exposed cattle in the quarantine area is inspected and the affected animal is properly dipped for scabies, the quarantine can be lifted, according to the official.

Hit By Fire

Council Okays

Burning trash, spread by high winds, resulted in a \$20,-000 to \$25,000 blaze late Saturday afternoon at the brick farm home of Mr. and Mrs. James Ensor, about two miles south of the Oklahoma Lane crossroads.

The high winds spread the fire from the trash barrels to the grass where it melted a gas line in the back yard of the home, according to Ensor, turning the gas line into a "blow torch" at the base of the home. The fire spread to the roof where fire extinguisher bombs in the attic exploded, probably preventing the fire from spreading more rapidly. Fire departments from Muleshoe and Farwell were called to the scene of the blaze, but couldn't prevent the middle part of the roof from collapsing. According to one report, the house suffered extensive smoke and water damage to the interior and family members saved little of their possessions.

Lee Hutchins and Milton Lee Walling, members of the Farwell fire department, sustained injuries during firemen's attempt to quench the blaze. Walling suffered minor burns and Hutchins suffered a broken hand.

Six Bovina businesses in Bovina were burglarized Monday night, according to Parmer County Sheriff Chas. Lovelace.

Most of the businesses broken into were located along Highway 60. Burglars were evidently interested in only money as cigarette, candy and soft drink machines were broken into at the businesses and little else was bothered, the sheriff said following a preliminary investigation Tuesday morning.

Businesses broken into were Custom Farm Services, Three-Way Chemical Co., Northside 66 Service, Lester Rhinehart's Station, Charles Oil Co. and Bonds Oil Co.

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usually an adequate source of most micronutrients and may contribute small amounts of the major plant nutrients.

If the topsoil is removed in land leveling, the remaining layer may be severely deficient in plant nutrients; in addition to being alkaline and having poor structure.


Studies to correct this problem were begun at the Center in 1963 on land that had been bench-leveled in 1962. The research team has spent the past several years trying to increase the production on the graded portion through application of materials such as cotton burs, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, iron, zinc and sulfur.

After eight years, yields from the cut area are still well | to provide up-to-date facts on below those from the fill area, but the yield differential is decreasing. In 1963, yield on cotton lint between the cut and fill areas differed as much as 440 pounds per acre. But in 1970, the greatest spread was only 290 pounds.

This points out the importance of proper fertilization of cut areas when land is leveled. Land owners should plan spec-



### Land Bank Sets High In Loans


