## Summer Ends For Students

The 1991-92 school term begins in Bovina on August 19 for all students. "All students need to be in school on August 19 and not wait until after Labor Day (September 2)" says Dr. Michael Jansen, Superintendent of Schools.

New students are encouraged to come by the high school office to register for school during the week of August 12-16 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. They are asked to bring their social security cards and papers from their former school if possible.

Also, free and reduced lunch applications can be filled out by anyone, new or former students, during the coming week if they want to do this before school starts.

## School Addition Complete

One of the main activities locally in recent months is the new addition at Ridgelea School. Builders at Reynosa Construction from Amarillo began work on the building approximately June 1.

According to Dr. Michael Jansen, the building will be completed September 1. The building measures 42x60.

The multi-purpose area, 40x45, will be for physical education and music for pre-kindergarten through first grades. The remaining space will provide storage for track equipment and also a restroom.

The new addition will provide access for students from the building during bad weather.

Dr. Jansen has asked that parents cooperate and pick their children up in front of the school. Please do not block the driveway to the back of the school. This area is strictly for the buses.

In summer competition, Andy placed first in Silvertown and second place in Melrose, N.M. Shane placed fourth at Muleshoe and first in Portales, N.M.

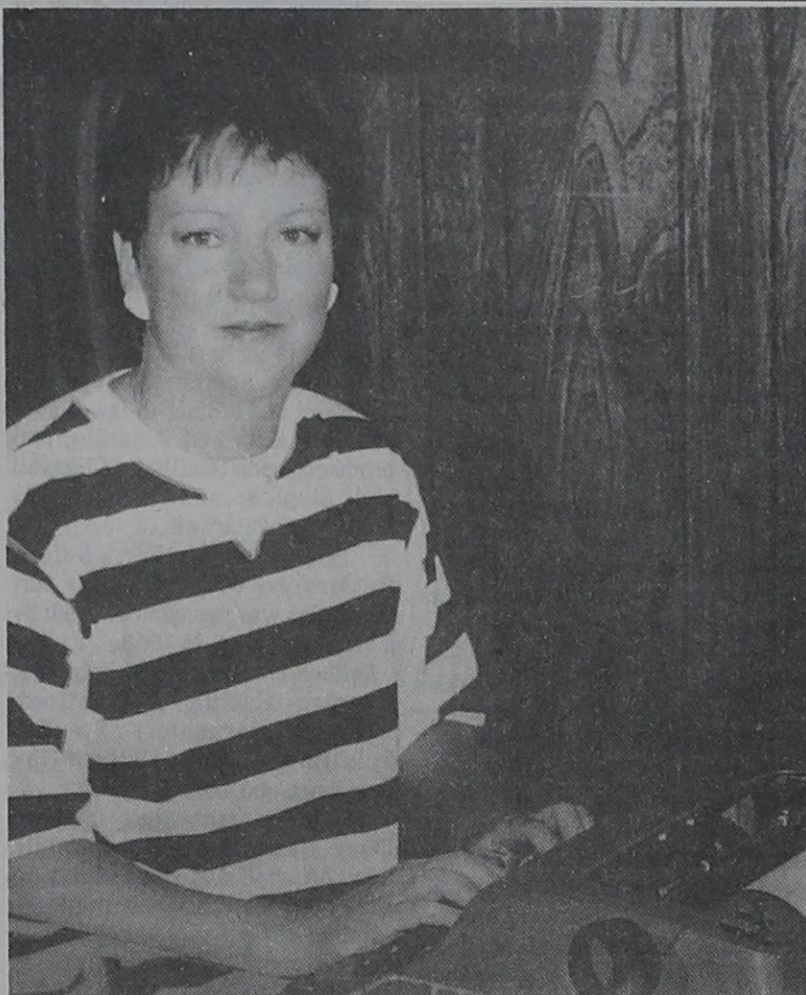

Both boys plan to participate in the High School Rodeo Association during the coming school year.

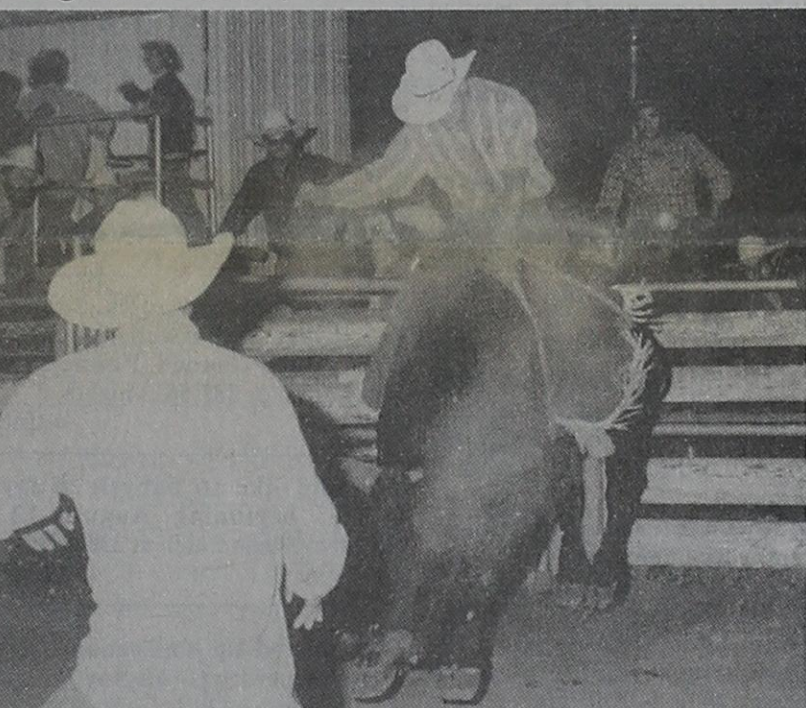
## BISD Board Sets Meeting

## Voters Cast Ballots In School Issues

With a turnout of only about 12 per cent of the voters, local and county voters went to the polls last Saturday to cast their ballots in what was termed "one of the most confusing issues" that voters have faced in quite some time.

In the statewide issue, Proposition 1, to provide for exemptions to taxes by the County Education districts, county residents narrowly favored the issue, 215-210.

On Proposition 2, which would have provided bonds for college loans, county voters went against the issue, 245-170.

In the County Education District vote, county voters voted in favor of the two additional exemptions, and against the personal property tax.

On Proposition 1, (20% property tax exemption), county totals were 245 in favor and 179 against. Friona's totals were 132 for, 88 against, but Bovina went against the proposition, 52-23.

On Proposition 2, (Exemption for Elderly and Disabled), county totals were 239 for, 163 against. Friona's totals were 144 for, 81 against, but Bovina voted 50 against, 25 for.

On Proposition 3, (Taxation of Personal Property), the county voted 232 against and 167 in favor. Friona's totals were 138 against, 85 in favor; while Bovina voted 47 in favor to 29 against.

"It was one of the most confusing issues we have ever had," said County Clerk Bonnie Warren. She said the county's turnout was about usual for an amendment election, which isn't noted for high turnouts. "In some counties they only had a nine per cent turnout," she said.

## New Manager Told For Local Hospital

Phil Langston, who has been the local administrator at Parmer County Community Hospital for Preferred Management Corp. for just over a year, is being transferred back to Oklahoma, it was announced this week.

Langston is being replaced by Bill Neely, a native of Lake Whitney, who has been with the Preferred Corp. for about a year. He comes to Friona from Lindsey, Oklahoma, where he worked with the hospital there.

Prior to his stint at Lindsey, Neely was employed by the Hall County Hospital in Memphis, Texas, on the eastern edge of the Panhandle, for a period of two years.

"I have enjoyed my work in Friona. It's a good community,

which has shown overwhelming support for its hospital. We have excellent physicians in Friona, and a good board of directors, and the future of the hospital looks great," Langston said.

Langston has been associated with the local hospital ever since the board of directors became associated with the Preferred Management Corp.

He will be transferring with the company to Shawnee, Oklahoma, which is in Central Oklahoma.

Commenting on a rumor that was circulating this week that the "hospital had been sold," Langston said it was definitely untrue. The hospital's affiliation with the hospital district is imminent, so that had to just be a rumor," he concluded.

## Breast Screening Date Is Scheduled

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American

Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self-examination every month.  
2. Have a physical examination every year.

3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, September 25, 1991, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. **35 YRS. AGO--AUG. 8, 1956**

He was a sophomore at Texas Tech University, where he was a member of the PIKA Fraternity. He was also a member of St. Ann's Catholic Church.

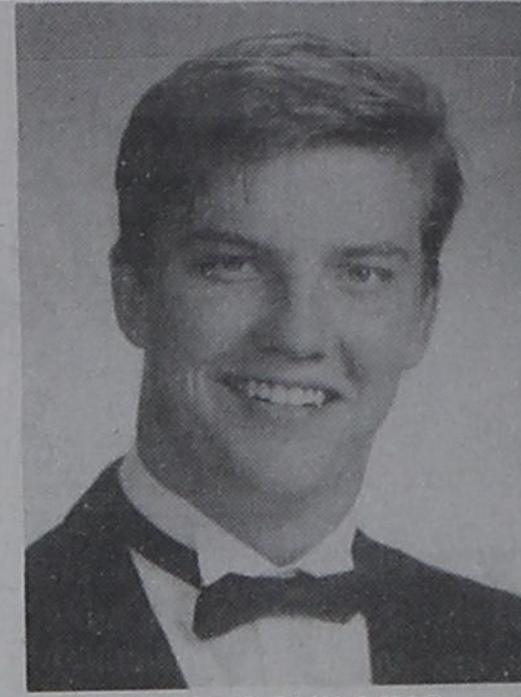

THE 1991 TAURUS SHO comes standard with a driver's side air bag, four-wheel antilock disc brakes, front and rear three-point safety belts, a safety-designed roof structure for roof crush protection and steel side guard beams inside doors for side-impact protection.

## Irrigation Well Checks Available

The Soil Conservation Service is currently checking irrigation wells with an ultrasonic flow meter.

This device is clamped onto a pipe either at the well, on aluminum flow line, or at a pivot.

It measures the velocity of water with a system of bouncing sound waves through the water. This flow meter has the capability of measuring several wells at one time. It is currently the most accurate system available.

The machine even indicates what per cent accuracy it shows on each well check reading.

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District purchased this unit last September for use anywhere in the county. Over 150 wells have been checked in the last 12 months.

The average output of all gas and electric motors tested, excluding submersible pumps is 390 gallons per minute. According to Thomas Reed, District Conservationist, this figure of 390 gallons per minute does not necessarily indicate what the average well in the county will produce.

This is based on the wells SCS has tested and requests for well checks most often come from those with a noticeable well problem. If anyone has need for well checks, please call the SCS office in Friona at 247-2220.

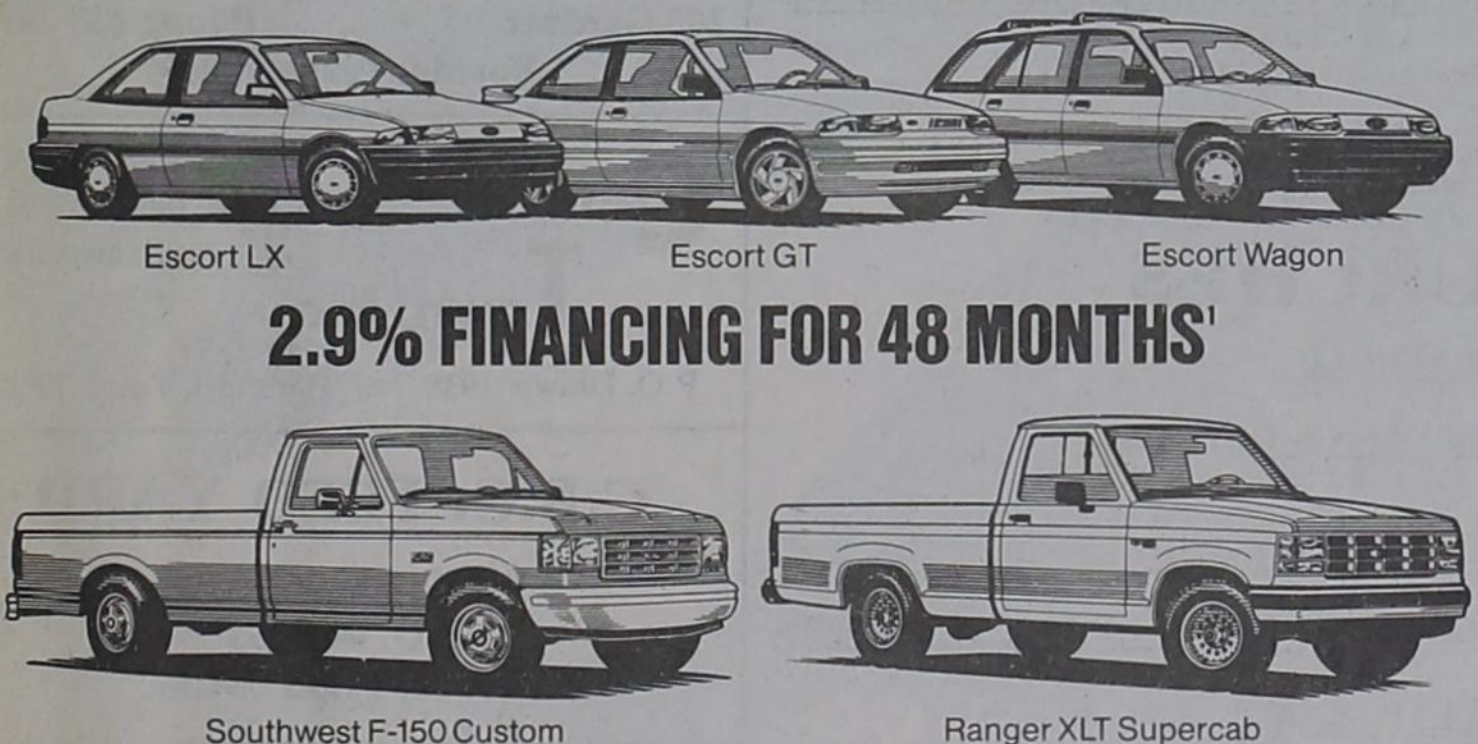

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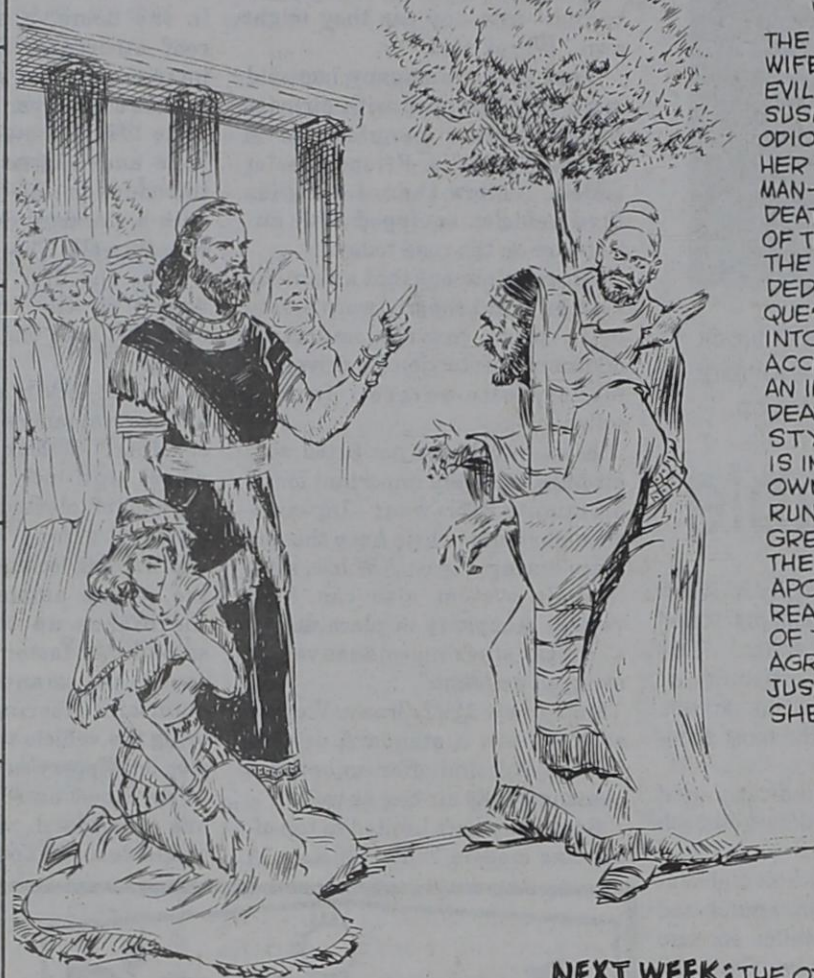



Dear Editor:

Can you imagine what it would be like to have to live daily with the knowledge that you had a disease that could cause your body to slowly self-destruct? Some authorities are now saying that as many as three million people do have such a disease, and for some unidentified reason the number is growing. An estimated 55,000 new cases are being diagnosed in the United States each year.

The disease is not contagious and it is not cancer. It is systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE), a chronic connective tissue disease involving the body's immune system. In SLE, the immune system, which is supposed to protect the body against environmental and infectious agents, turns against itself and attacks and destroys healthy tissue.

Although SLE is not a well-known disease, it is more prevalent than muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, leukemia, and cystic fibrosis. It is more widespread among black women than sickle cell anemia. SLE affects all races, age groups, socioeconomic groups and both sexes. However, ninety per cent of lupus patients are women, with the usual age of onset being between 16-30.

Systemic lupus attacks internally, damaging or destroying any organ which is targeted. With proper treatment, most SLE patients can live a normal lifespan. However, even a mild case may become life-threatening without proper treatment. More than 6,000 people die from SLE each year. Symptoms vary but can include joint pain, muscle aches, skin rash, photosensitivity, hair loss, inflammation of the membranes around the heart or lungs, anemia, fatigue, blood abnormalities, kidney involvement, and others.

The paradoxical thing about SLE is that the victim can look healthy and well, even when he/she is critically ill. This often causes misunderstandings among relatives and friends, who cannot understand how anyone can be really ill and look so well. Many SLE patients feel isolated and alone because of the lack of understanding they encounter.

The L.E. Support Club, Inc. is a world-wide, non-profit organization dedicated to bringing help and understanding to SLE patients. Its newsletter, the L.E. Beacon, prints up-to-date, informative articles on subjects which are important to SLE patients. The cost of printing the newsletter is paid for by the tax deductible dues and contributions of members and concerned friends.

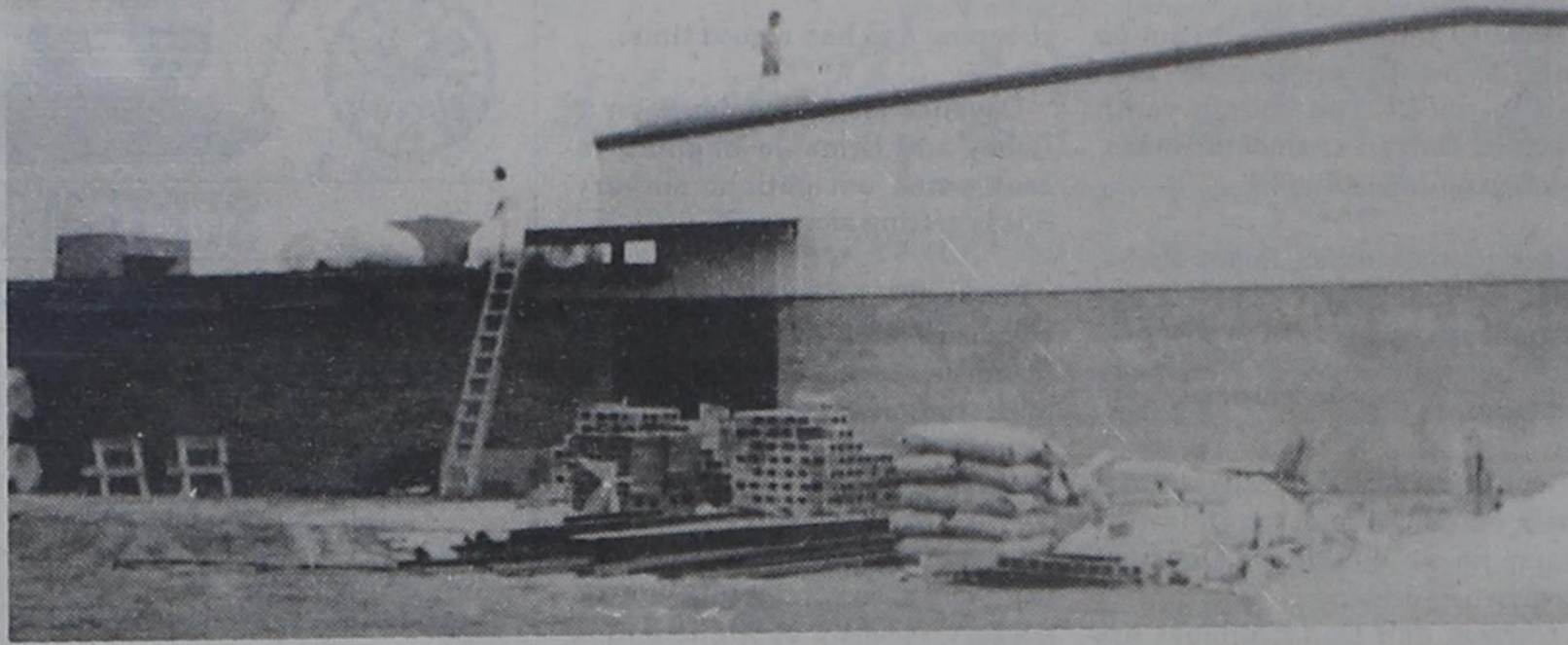

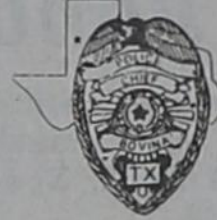

The youngster will be hospitalized approximately 4-6 weeks, according to family members. Cody is the son of Royce and Karen Grissom of Grand Junction, Colorado.



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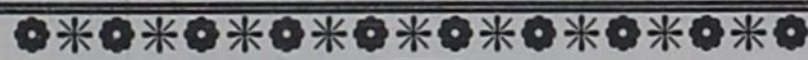
