



Ice Harvest Was Big Business

timers of the not so long ago when the harvesting of natural ice was big business.

Seventy years ago, ice manufacturing plants were a novelty. Until well after the turn of the 20th century, many communities even as far south as Virginia had their needs for ice in summer supplied by one or more local ice farmers.

As the number of ice manufacturing plants climbed to its present U. S. total of 7,000, and, in later years, as home mechanical refrigeration became widespread, the

Food cooling ventured out of caves and springhouses only a little more than a century ago. Thomas Moore, a farmer of Montgomery County, Maryland, obtained the first U. S. patent on a household icebox in 1803. Moore's idea could make little headway, however, at first. Improved methods of cutting and storing natural ice were necessary before the infant industry could grow by leaps and

bounds. It was the plowlike, horse-drawn ice-cutter of about 1827 that made
