"HOW AMERICAN!" This was evangelist Billy Graham's description of Richard M. Nixon, the nation's 37th president, who died last Friday and was buried on Wednesday.

The son of a groceryman, Nixon has been lauded for "pulling himself up by his bootstraps," from humble beginnings to becoming one of the world's most powerful figures.

Like many in our age group, Nixon was one of the early national political figures we had to deal with.

In fact, Nixon was on the ballot when we cast our first vote for president in the 1960 election. But that was in his race against John F. Kennedy, and like the majority of Americans, Ye Editor voted for the charismatic JFK, who had clearly dominated Nixon in the series of TV debates, the first of this nature for presidential candidates.

Later, we voted for Nixon when he defeated Hubert H. Humphrey in 1968, and again on his re-election in 1972. Did you know that Nixon was one of only two people who was on a national ballot (president or vice president) five times? His record was 4-1, so that wasn't too bad.

We approved of Nixon's leadership, and felt that he did a good job during a turbulent time for our nation.

The scandal of Watergate proved to be Nixon's political undoing, and the irony then, as now, was that Nixon would have won re-election with a big landslide over George McGovern, without any of the Watergate antics.

Having come to Nixon from the Lyndon Johnson administration, and having heard stories of LBJ's wheeling and dealing in politics, we thought at the time that Watergate was no worse than many of the Democrats' shenanigans. It was just a case of the Republicans getting caught--and then the cover-up that followed, which brought Nixon down.

By today's standards, Nixon would probably be considered "too square" to run for president.

We still recall the day in 1974--almost 20 years ago--when Nixon became the first U.S. president to resign. We were a witness as history was being made.

But we believe that Nixon will be recalled for his leadership in helping bring about the end of the Cold War--even though he first won attention as an anti-communist.

He opened up relations with the People's Republic of China, and began dialogue with the Soviet Union that resulted in Henry Kissinger negotiating the Strategic Arms Limitations Treaty. (How any interpreter could understand Kissinger well enough to explain to the Russians still remains a mystery, however. Maybe they just thought they understood what Henry was saying!)

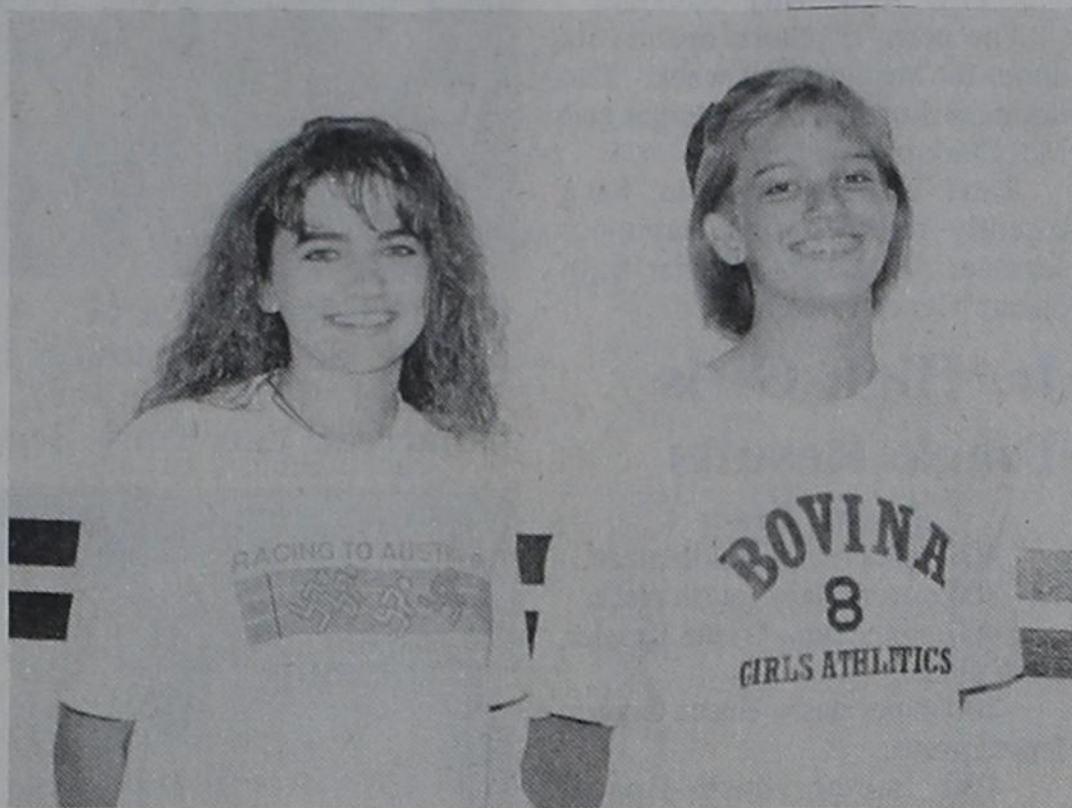
As a member of the U.S. Navy during World War II, Nixon was another of our presidents, like Eisenhower, Kennedy and Bush, who knew the real meaning of war, and that a good deterrent to war was in keeping a strong military in place. He didn't run off to Canada or England, but enlisted in the U.S.N.

Also, like those other leaders, those in power in the Communist Bloc knew exactly the type of person they were dealing with as leader of the Free World.

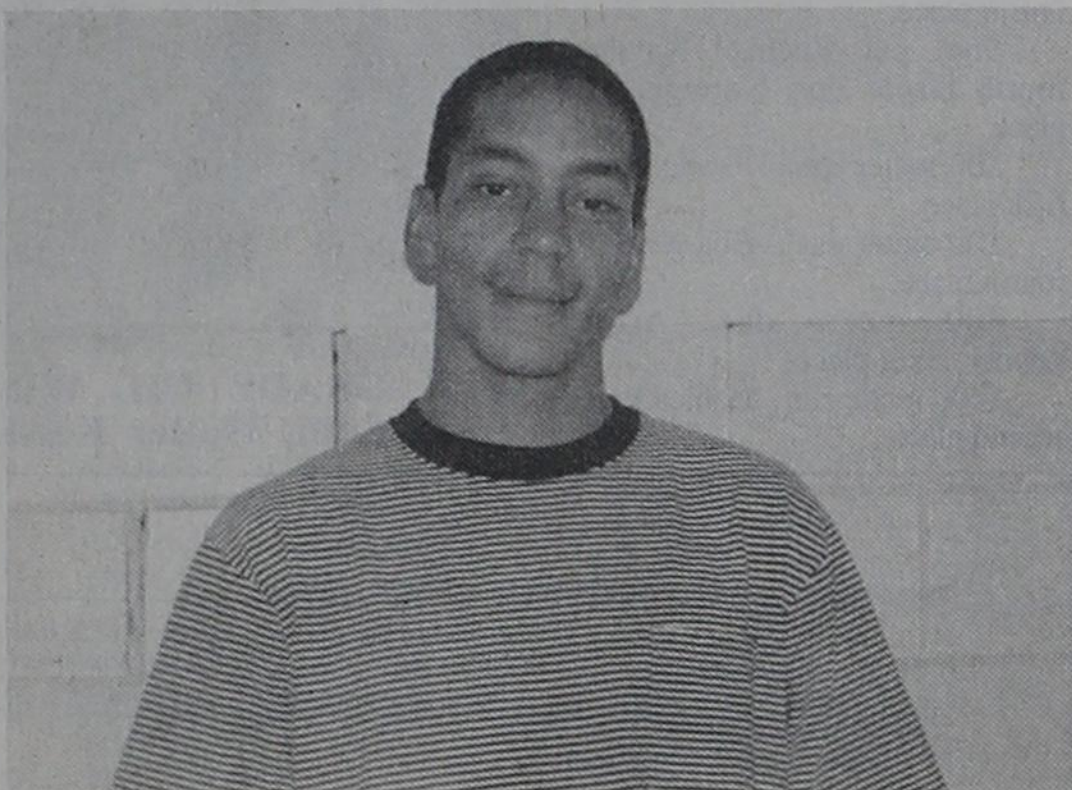
We may need someone with his leadership and backbone again sometime in the future.

N. Veazey Is Tabbed As Assistant Superintendent

The recently-vacated position of assistant superintendent for professional services will be filled from within the Hereford Independent School District, Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt announced Tuesday morning.

Nena Veazey, who currently serves as administrative assistant to the superintendent, will assume the new job on June 1 after the departure of current assistant Richard Souter.

With the promotion, she becomes the highest ranking woman in the district and the first known female assistant superintendent.

Souter announced last week he has accepted the superintendent's job in the Portales, New Mexico school system.

With the internal move, Greenawalt said, Mrs. Veazey's position will not be filled, eliminating one central office administrative job.

"I am not going to replace anyone in the position of executive assistant to the superintendent," he said.

"Because we've been able to pull all the administrative staff into one building, it's enabled us to coordinate activities" and make the staff reduction possible, Greenawalt said.

The district last month moved into its new administration building at 601 N. 25 Mile Avenue, consolidating from previous quarters in the old administration building and at the Stanton Educational Services Center.

"We'll continue to look at ways we can consolidate responsibilities," Greenawalt said. Officials will also continue to look at ways to reduce the administrative staff of the district.

Under the new job alignment, Mrs. Veazey will retain her current responsibilities for curriculum and instruction while at the same time assuming Souter's personnel duties.

Business manager, Norm Smith, will take over finance and risk management programs, which deal with district insurance. He will be given the title of controller of school finance.

Cheryl Davison, who currently serves as Souter's secretary, will become Smith's secretary, Greenawalt said, because of her

knowledge of insurance and finance matters.

Greenawalt said he knows of no other woman who has held as high a position in the district, noting that when he came here, all administrators from the level of principal and up were male.

Today, there are three female principals: Alice Lockmiller at Northwest Elementary; Darla Baggett at Bluebonnet Intermediate; and Marylin Leasure at the Junior High.

Nena graduated from Bovina High School in 1972 and her husband is Mike Veazey, who is employed for Deaf Smith REC in Hereford. The couple has one daughter, Kylee.

Her parents are Henry and Nellie Spicer of Bovina.

Linda Lewis Named Teacher Of The Week

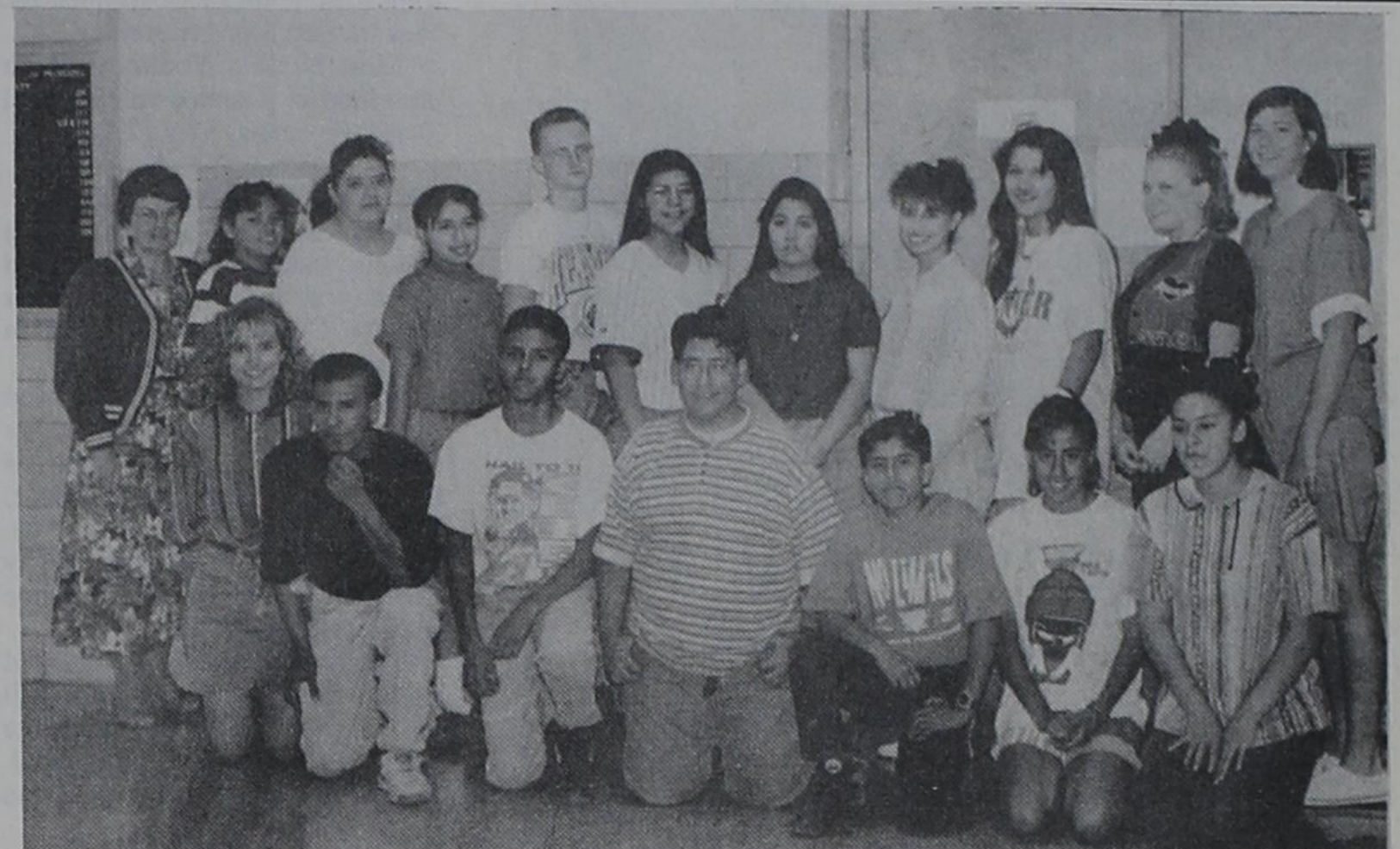

McKay died April 27 at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He

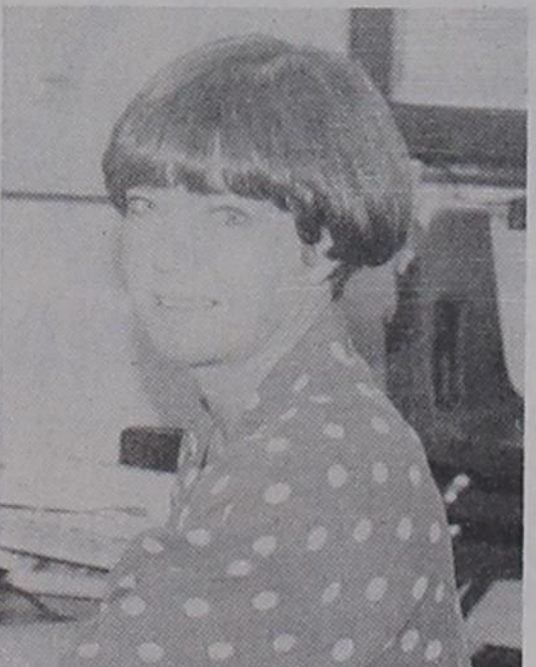
was born October 2, 1922 at Turkey, Texas. He married Veda Osburn December 28, 1942, at Turkey.

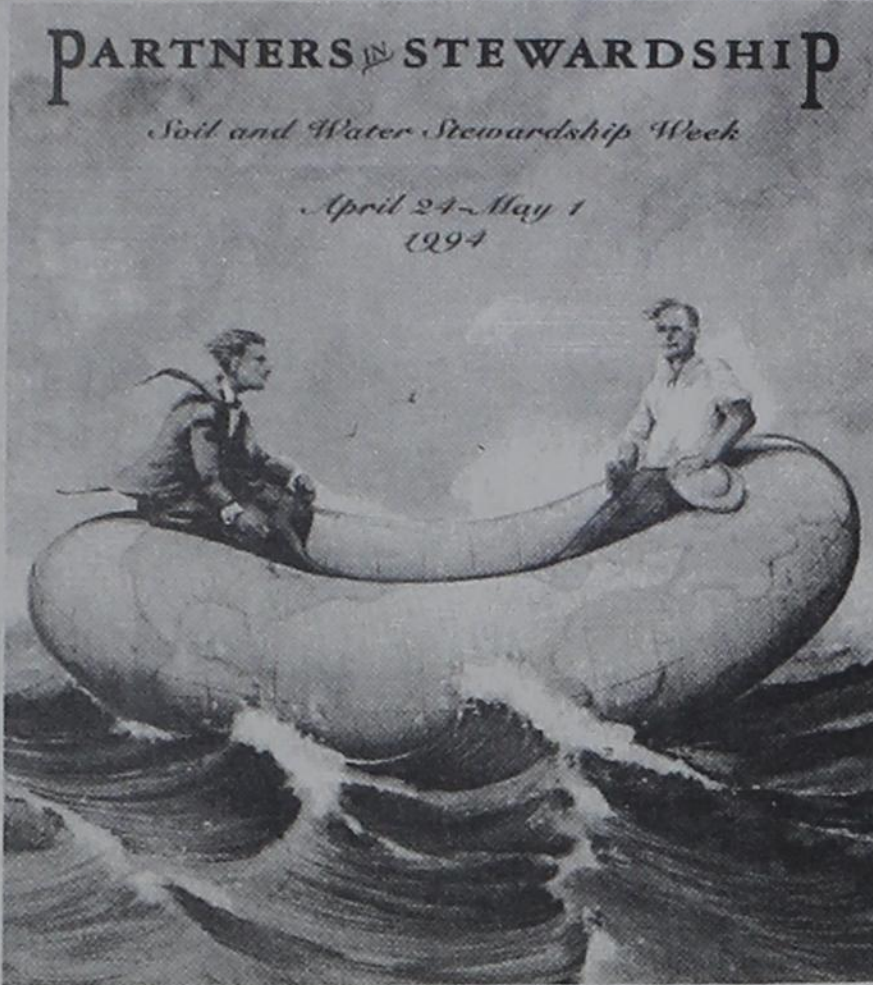
He was preceded in death by two sons, Dannie McKay August 17, 1978, and Bennie McKay December 12, 1989.

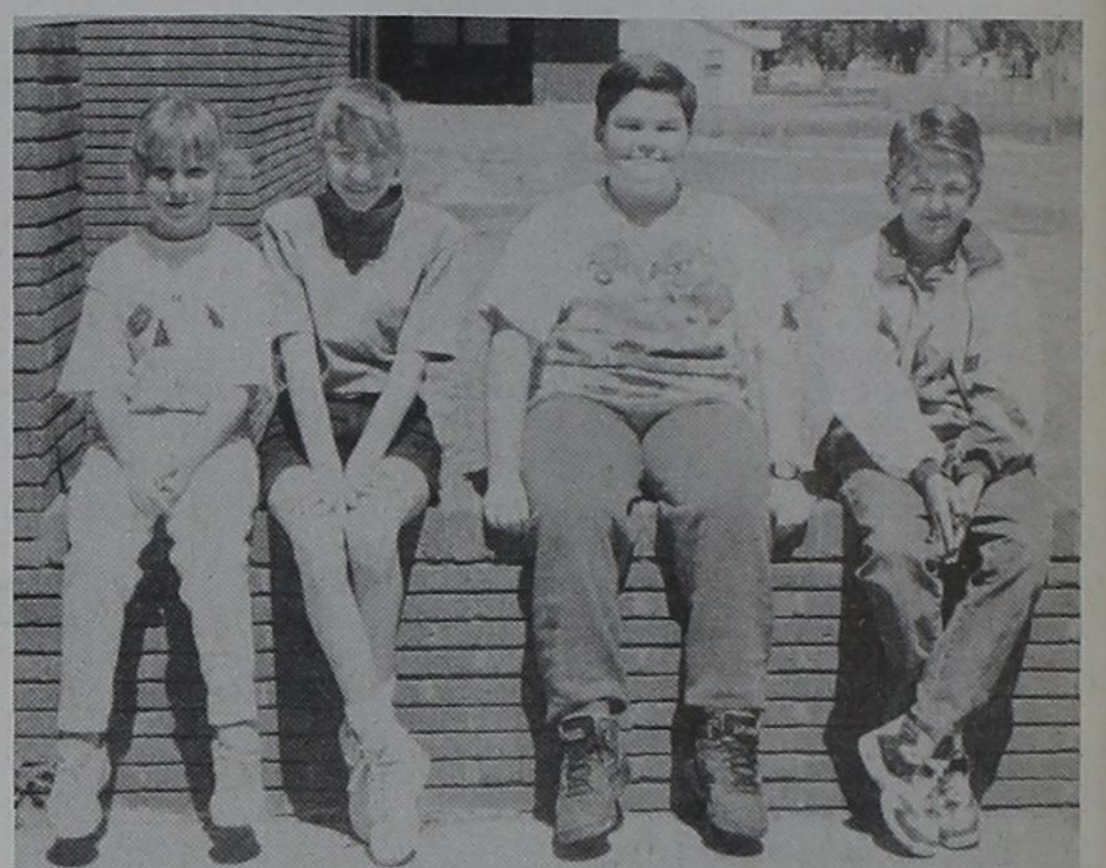

Chocolate Crunch Brownies

- 1 cup oleo or butter, softened
- 2 cups sugar 4 eggs
- 6 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow creme (I used about 28 big marshmallows)
- 1 cup creamy peanut butter
- 2 cups (12 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate chips

3 cups crisp rice cereal
In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar; add eggs. Stir in cocoa, flour, vanilla and salt. Spread into a greased 13"x9"x2" pan. Bake 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until brownies test done. Cool, then spread marshmallow creme over brownies. In a small saucepan, melt chocolate chips and peanut butter over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in cereal. Spread over marshmallow layer. Chill before cutting. Store in refrigerator. Yields 3 dozen.

Strawberry Pretzel Jello

- 3 cups boiling water

Combine pretzels, 3 tablespoons sugar and margarine, then press into a 13"x9"x2" dish. Bake
