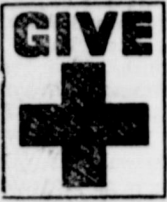
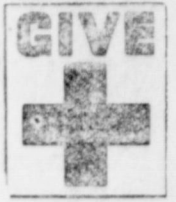

After all the talk about drilling for oil on the proposed hospital site just back of the Caton Clinic, we were a little surprised to learn that owners of the block had not been contacted about the matter, at least not all of them. ### 'Selfish Scramble To Get Ahead Of The Other Fellow' Causes Inflation

DALLAS, TEX., March 13 (UP)—Gov. Allen Shivers, warning that painful steps are necessary to avoid ruinous inflation in America, lashed out today at "scare buying" and "selfish scrambling to get ahead of the other fellow."  
It is on America's love for easy living and our "reluctance to make the necessary sacrifices," said the Governor, "that Joe Stalin is basing his great hope for internal collapse of this country."  
Shivers, in a speech prepared for delivery before today's opening session of the 74th annual convention of the Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, said the nation's economic dilemma could be solved only by courage—not fear.  
His address was to be followed by talks from House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Alan Kline of Chicago, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.  
The Governor said he was abandoning usual topics to invade the field of economics, national policy and international relations because of the gravity of the problem created by the shrinking value of the American dollar.  
"The early stages of inflation have a very attractive aspect," said Shivers. "Good times, easy money, jobs plentiful and not too tough—why not let the spiral keep turning?"  
"I'll give you a tip," he said. "Lots of governments have tried it. They are not here today."  
The governor challenged the cattle industry, "the economic heart of Texas," to help begin the fight against inflation.  
Shivers said inflation "means simply the existence of too much money and credit in relation to available goods." To halt inflation, he said, "You have to cut down on money and credit, produce more good or both."  
The Governor added that certain price controls were necessary, although they are merely stop-gap measures.  
He outlined several things that could be done immediately about the dollar's declining power.  
The laboring man, the cattleman and the farmer can help by increasing their productivity, Shivers said. The banker can avoid inflationary loans, both with the government and his customers, the governor said.  
"Just any citizen can help," Shivers said, "by doing without the things he doesn't really need."  
He called on the federal reserve system to help in the fight by discharging its responsibility to prevent unwarranted credit expansion, and protect the dollar from excessive devaluation.  
"We can all help," said the chief executive, "by demanding and practicing economy in government. We can all help by being willing to sacrifice a little for the good of all."

### Route Of Annual Livestock Tour Is Designated

The route of the annual spring livestock tour by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association next Saturday, March 17 has been designated according to Judge M. S. Long, Eastland, president of the organization.  
The group will leave from the City Hall in Eastland that morning at 9 o'clock and the tour is expected to be concluded near Cisco that afternoon around 4 o'clock. At least ten different stops are to be made at different farms and ranches to see sheep, beef cattle, dairy cattle, and horses. Nearly all of the animals to be seen are purebred it was said.  
Lunch will be a ranch style dinner through the courtesy of G. P. Mitcham, Jr., at his ranch northwest of Cisco. Ed Huestis and R. H. Donovan, Cisco ranchers are assisting Mitcham with plans for the meal. Over 100 ranchers are expected on the tour.  
The schedule calls for stops at C. M. McCain, Baldy Harris, Onis Anderson, Jack Baker, Mitcham, M. E. Fry, T. G. Caudle, Dr. N. A. Brown, Pauline Royall and C. A. Ditmore places.  
All members of the livestock association as well as any others interested in the progress of the livestock industry in Eastland County are cordially invited and urged to go on the tour and see the livestock.

BARCELONA, Spain, March 13 (UP)—Four Spanish warships and a trainload of special police arrived here today to maintain order after at least three persons were killed and 100 arrested yesterday in Spain's worst outbreak of violence since the civil war 12 years ago.  
This city of 1,125,000 population—Spain's second largest—appeared to be quite as the alarmed government of Generalissimo Francisco Franco threatened stern action against rioters.  
Following an emergency cabinet session at Franco's home, interior minister Blaz Perez Gonzales announced: "The government has in its hands power to put down any kind of trouble-making and will apply the full weight of the law against those who try to break down peace and order."  
This statement was followed by arrival in Barcelona Harbor of the cruiser Mendez Nunez and the destroyers Escano, Gravina and Liners. Officials described the visit as a routine courtesy call.  
A special train-load of police arrived from Madrid and special police agents from the Madrid political squad also were arriving by train and plane. They were trying to get at the root of yesterday's rioting, during which demonstrators set fire to curtains in the city hall, punctured tires and staged a general sit-down strike in offices and factories.  
The government claimed Communists were responsible for the outbreak. Informed neutral sources said there was no doubt, however, that high living costs prompted many to take part.  
Official Spanish Chamber of Commerce figures showed prices have increased about seven times since 1945, while wages have gone up only three and one-half times.  
The crowds protested the high cost of living following their triumphant boycott of city street cars last week which forced authorities to rescind an order raising fares.  
Eduardo Baeza, the city's governor, told newsmen the strikes had been provoked by Communists determined to embarrass the nation just as its international position was improving. He said a number of Communists already had been rounded up.  
Informed sources said, however, that soaring prices on essential foodstuffs had created honest complaints from non-Communists.  
The people were incensed, they said, not so much against the government as over Madrid's dictation of food controls.

### Citizens Should Accept Their Duty Rotarians Told

"We must accept our responsibilities and duties if we are to continue to live in the greatest country and the greatest day in the world," Judge Ernest Belcher, Stephenville, told members of the Eastland Rotary Club at their regular meeting in the Connellee Hotel, Monday.  
"Because we are living in a democracy which has carried on for a number of years, we are not guaranteed that tomorrow will be the same," Belcher said. "A democracy is not self-sustaining. We have to do something about keeping it going."  
"Each of us should put ourselves into class I-A as a citizen and do our part so that we may continue to live in the greatest country and the greatest day on earth," Belcher concluded.  
Norris Wilson introduced Belcher to the club.  
Hubert Westfall, club president, announced that a volleyball net and volleyball were being placed on the Douglas School playground.

### AF Uses 6-Ton Guided Missile In Korea War

TOKYO, March 13 (UP)—The Air Force disclosed today it has achieved excellent results with six-ton guided missiles launched from B-29s in Korea.  
The 27-foot "Tarzon" bomb, controlled by a radio transmitter in the launching aircraft, has been especially effective in the destruction of big bridges, Far East Air Force officials said.  
They said 12,000-pound "Tarzon" bombs destroyed four major bridges at Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, and three other key spans close to the Manchurian border. Heavy steel girders were flung up to 150 feet by the explosions.  
Bombardiers reported the bomb's response to directions during its descent was "excellent."  
Officials said the "Tarzon" bomb has been used "in limited numbers" in Korea since last August.  
"Several have been used against principal and vital North Korean targets, most of which have been bridges of massive type construction," an Air Force spokesman said.  
"Principles used in control of the bomb are a radio transmitter in the launching aircraft, a receiver on the missile which enables its control, a flare for tracking the bomb on its course and a bombsight for use of the bombardier in directing the descent."  
United Press aviation writer Charles Corddry reported from Washington Saturday that two types of radio-controlled bombs now are in use in Korea, the Tarzon and the 1,000-pound Rozon.

### Dallas Transit Workers Ask Pay Increase

DALLAS, Tex., March 13 (UP)—Some 1,200 transit workers have asked the Dallas Railway & Terminal Co. for pay increases in a renewed union contract, a union official said today.  
E. R. Thompson, secretary of Local 1338, the Amalgamated Association of Streets, Electric and Motor Coach Employees of America (AFL) said the union had asked the firm to open talks on their contract, which expires May 1.  
Thompson did not say how much increase the union wanted. However, any new wage probably would be subject to the freeze order allowing wages to go up only 10 per cent over Jan. 1950, levels.  
Operators now earn \$1.23 and \$1.28 per hour, while shop workers, maintenance men, machinists and others make from \$.95 to \$1.50.  
If past patterns are followed, any wage increase might be reflected in higher fares on streetcars and buses.

## THE LIFE STORY OF JESUS CHRIST

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### SYNOPSIS

## Perfume Makers Run Short Of Ylang Ylang

NEW YORK, March (UP)—A rose isn't a rose in the perfume business.

Some roses are better than others for perfume essence, and right now, because of the iron curtain, perfumes are complaining that a good rose is hard to find.

Walter A. Poucher one of the 10 men in the world with the title of perfume (it means a man who knows everything from the chemistry to the sex appeal of perfume), disclosed the gloomy side of the rose picture in his company's scented office here.

"The best rose source is the valley of the roses in Bulgaria. The climate is perfect for heavily scented roses," Poucher said regretfully. "But now that area is behind the iron curtain. When you buy essence of roses in Bulgaria you just have to send a check to a bank in Sofia and they send you what they want. It isn't satisfactory."

The British perfume expert for Yardley of London began a quest for roses last summer to replace the Bulgarian supply. He found the best blooms in a surprising spot.

"On the edge of the Sahara Desert I found pink roses almost as good as those in Bulgaria," he said, brightening briefly. "The area is bounded by the Atlas Mountains on the north, is close enough to the Dades River to get moisture, and has the desert heat besides. Only there aren't enough roses."

Texas roses come closest to being right for perfume in this

country, Poucher added, but the scent still isn't strong enough. "But your country grows wonderful peppermint and cedarwood," he said politely. These, however, are help to the chewing gum and liqueur businesses than to perfumes.

To top off the problems that a lady never dreams of when she daubs perfume on her wrists and ear lobes, ylang ylang is getting scarcer by the minute.

"Ylang ylang oil comes from flowers that grow on trees in the Philippine Islands," Poucher explained. "During the late war the trees were not properly cut back, nor were new ones planted, so we're faced with a terrific shortage, and the oil is very important in perfumes."

Musk, one of the basic ingredients of all perfumes, comes only from China, so that's depressing to perfume makers too.

"Oh, we have synthetics, so we'll go on making perfume," Poucher said reassuringly. "But even that's no cause for smiles among perfumers. 'Natural lilac,' Poucher said, "is nothing as good as synthetic lilac made from turpentine."

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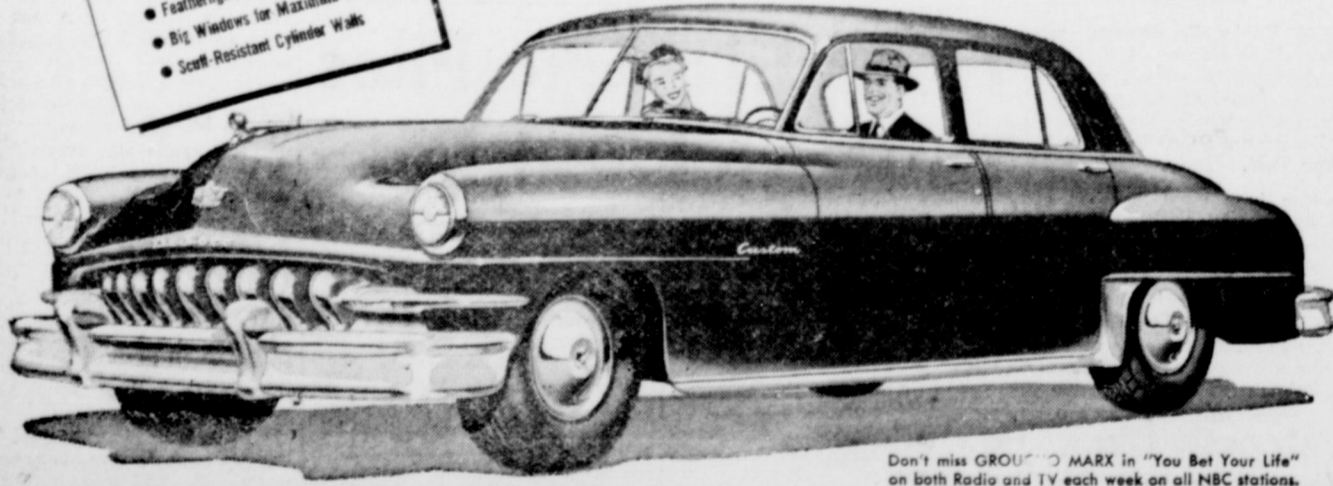
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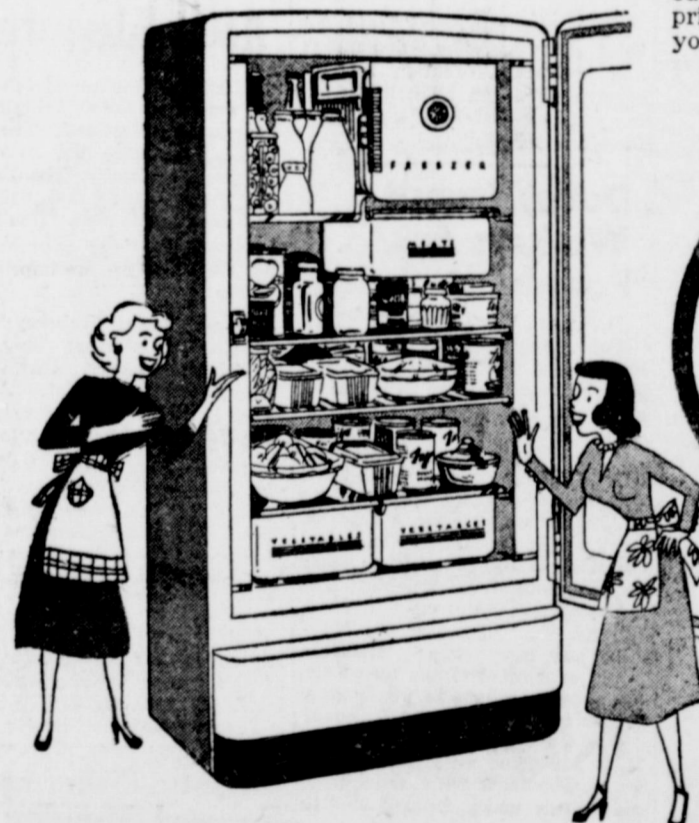
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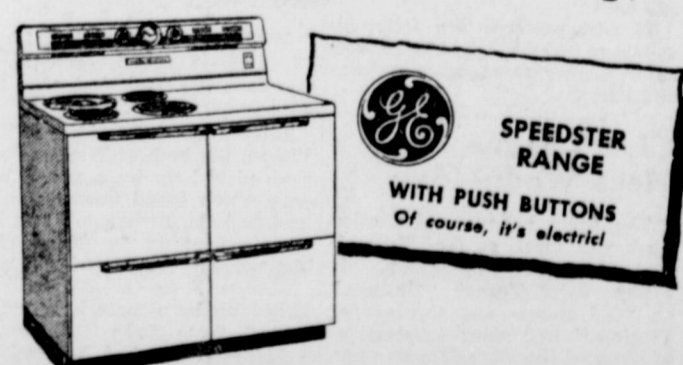

and the usual tourists "traps". If you can believe it, there isn't even a curio shop in the place.

Life in Alamos was unburied and unworried for the O'Ryan's, who tried this life for six months and loved it. Delectable indeed, especially for Mrs. O'Ryan whose only concern was the daily delegation of work to two servants. And these servants did everything for a combined monthly wage of \$6.

The food situation at Alamos will turn the American housewives green with envy. The article says: "With the abundance of pork chops and roasts, sirloin tip and filet mignon, venison steak, a fresh fruits and vegetables, we had to watch our waistlines. The meat cost an average of 16 cents the pound, any cut; and fowl, the entire fat bird, mind you, could be bought for some 40 cents."

Milk cost 8 cents a quart, eggs 20 cents a dozen, bread 3 cents a loaf, coffee and fresh country butter 25 cents a pound!

The O'Ryan's lived in part of a great mansion. Their bedroom was as large as a cottage, cool and dark, with a colonnaded porch opening onto a courtyard full of flowers. These pajama quarters cost 50 cents a day for two. The superb winter climate made house-heating an unknown practice.

Clothing was no problem either—far from it. Local dressmakers could whip out an original or an exact replica of an Adele Simpson or Charlie McCardell for the astonishing price of \$2 per number. Not to be outdone, Mr. O'Ryan had an excellent fitting gabardine suit hand-tailored for \$12.

## White House Scrap For Sale To Collectors

WASHINGTON, March (UP)—Somewhere today a tired GI may be washing away training camp grime in Margaret Truman's old bathtub.

Or a weary WAC may be soaking off fatigue in the tub in which President Coolidge once sat.

During the renovation of the White House, most of the old plumbing fixtures have been removed and installed in other government structures, particularly in barracks.

The person who dunks is a former White House tub, however, never will know upon what famous enamel he slithers, because the disposition of the White House bathroom fixtures is a deep, dark secret.

A woman in the Midwest recently wrote to the White House, asking to buy the tub used by Gen. U. S. Grant when he was president. The commission on renovation of the executive mansion replied gravely that Grant's bathtub disappeared years ago. The would-be bathtub collector was offered a number of other items from the White House, ranging from a small piece of ash to a load of bricks.

Most of the White House scrap—much of it dating back to 1792 when the original construction started—is available for sale to souvenir collectors. All sales are handled through a mail order office for the commission set up at Ft. Myer, Va., under Capt. James V. Little.

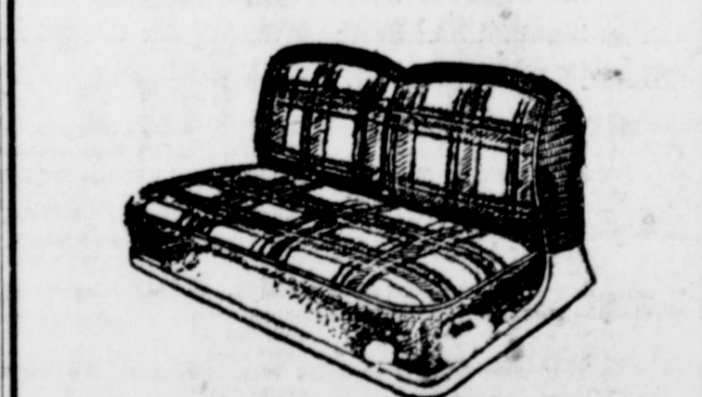

## Last Second Free Throw Beats Aggies

AUSTIN, Tex., March 12 (UP)—Texas A&M, lean and hungry from 17 winless years on the Texas Longhorns' home court, battle the Steers tonight in the "sugar game" of their playoff series for a NCAA tournament berth.

The Longhorns, who lost the series opener to the Aggies, came back last night to score a narrow, 35 to 34 victory in the final seven seconds of play. Tonight's game is decisive.

Sophomore Guard Leon Black was the hero of the Texas victory. He plunked a free throw through the basket seconds before the final gun.

The Aggies, who haven't won a game here since 1934, fought the Steers on an equal footing throughout the game. The score was tied, 19 to 19, at halftime and the lead changed hands eight times in the last period.

A capacity crowd of 7,000 fans who crowded Gregory Gymnasium feared the worst when A&M took a 34-32 lead with five minutes to go, then froze the ball for more than three minutes. However, Texas tied the score with one minute and 20 seconds to play after speedy Jimmy Viramontes stole the ball, dribbled down the court and handed off

to George Sealing, who hit the bucket for a field goal. The sticky-fingered Longhorns kept control of the ball the rest of the way, and won on Black's timely charity shot. A post-season playoff was necessitated when Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Christian tied for the conference championship. The Horned Frogs were eliminated in a one-game playoff with the Aggies. A&M won the opener of the best-out-of-three series with Texas, 45 to 33.

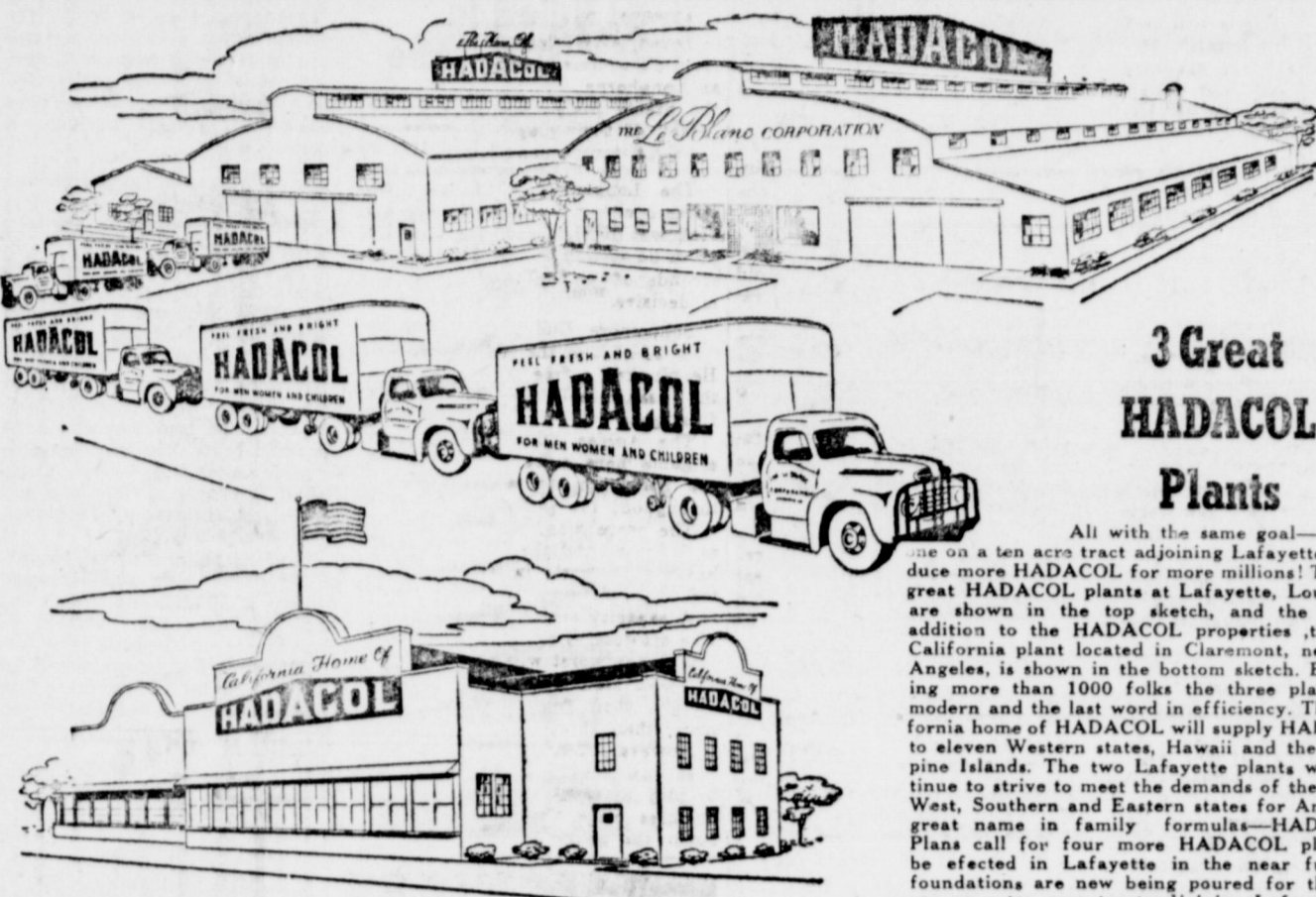

### 1000 Chinese, 1 GI Killed In Han River Battle

WITH THE U. S. 25th DIVISION, Korea, March (UP) — Rampaging U. S. infantrymen backed by a fierce artillery barrage killed 1,000 Chinese communists for the loss of only one man in carving out the first UN bridgehead across the Han River. The Yanks poured across the muddy Han yesterday in tiny assault boats that crossed and recrossed like ferry boats to pick up new loads. The artillery and mortar barrage that preceded the crossings was so intense that dozens of the 204 prisoners taken were bleeding at the eyes from concussion. The beaches of the Han were littered with enemy dead. The lone American fatality occurred on the south bank. The body of the GI was sprawled face down in the gravel. The crossing of the Han was made at three points. The doughboys had to row their own assault boats and it made you think of another river crossing by American

soldiers, George Washington and his men crossing the Delaware.

The center crossing made the greatest advance. There, a regiment loaded with automatic weapons and grenades swarmed through enemy positions and once it got tank support overran a command post.

By nightfall they had moved 2 1/2 miles beyond the river and were in possession of the low hills 15 miles east of Seoul.

The new assault started before dawn with the artillery and mortar barrage. It flickered and flashed on the enemy-held shores across the Han like a pinball machine.

At dawn the assault regiment with "Item" and "Love" Companies in the lead moved out in the small boats. The two companies were commanded by Capt. Robert D. Glazer of Cleveland and Lt. Otis R. Skinner of Yorktown, Tex.

The first prisoners were captured by Pfc's Clyde and Hayward Gillum of Big Stone Gap, Va., brother, and Pfc. Donald E. Funkhouser of Stephens City, Va.

The three Virginians found 16 Chinese huddled in four large fox-holes in a gully. A well-placed gre-

nade brought them out with their hands up.

Nine others were captured by Sgt. Donald Knowlton of Carthage, N. Y., and from then on the march of prisoners seemed like a parade.

### Posing In Nude Gets Heated Retort

TORONTO, Can., March 13 (UP) — Pretty Canadian models turned the heat today on artists who make them pose in the nude in chilly studios.

They announced formation of the Artists' Models Federal Union with the help of the American Federation of Labor to gain better working conditions and more pay.

"Why, sometimes I get so chilled in unheated studios that I can't speak," said one model who poses in the raw.

### New Super Launderette Takes Care Of 22 Laundries And Ten Babies

NEW YORK, March 13 (UP) — Twenty-two laundries and ten babies can be taken care of, by the simple procedure of putting a quarter in a slot for either baby or laundry, in a novel new super launderette.

Corp. Arthur Percival, thought up the idea for baby sitting combined with laundering, and opened a new one-story brick building in the center of a suburban apartment development in nearby Astoria, L. I., last week.

The baby just gets entertained, no scrubbing.

First day they handled 15 babies and more than two dozen

family washes. Second day a peculiar situation developed.

Mothers came in, handed junior over to Mrs. Veronica Clark, the registered nurse in charge of the kiddy department, put the quarter in the slot for an hour's worth of baby sitting, and went out without even glancing toward the automatic washers.

Ten youngsters, from a year and one half to six years old, shrieked, banged on the toy xylophones, played with blocks and generally drowned out the sound of the washing machine from their television-equipped nursery corner. Each child wore a tag with a number on it which corresponded to the number of the slot where he'd been paid for.

When his hour was up, a red light flashed beside the slot.

"They do seem more interested in the baby sitting department than the washing machines," manager Francis Decaro shouted over the din. "But sooner or later we'll catch them on the wash. They begin to feel obligated I imagine."

"After we get a little better organized it won't be so noisy," Mrs. Clark said cheerfully. "Two of these youngsters are my own, so I understand children. We'll have a reading hour and in warm weather we'll open an outside playground."

Manager Decaro pointed out other features of the new launderette, which, if successful, the company plans to include in other cities.

Three sewing machines at one side can be rented by the hour, if mothers want to sew while the clothes wash and the baby gets entertained.

"Or they can rent them and take them home for six dollars a month and six free washes," Decaro said. "We'll rent television sets for \$12 a month and 10 free washes."

Housewives also can buy granulated soap in wallpaper-covered cardboard drums, weighing up to 250 pounds, if they have home washers. There's even a dozen meal compartment. For 87 cents a woman can buy frozen swiss steak, peas and corn—serving for one.
