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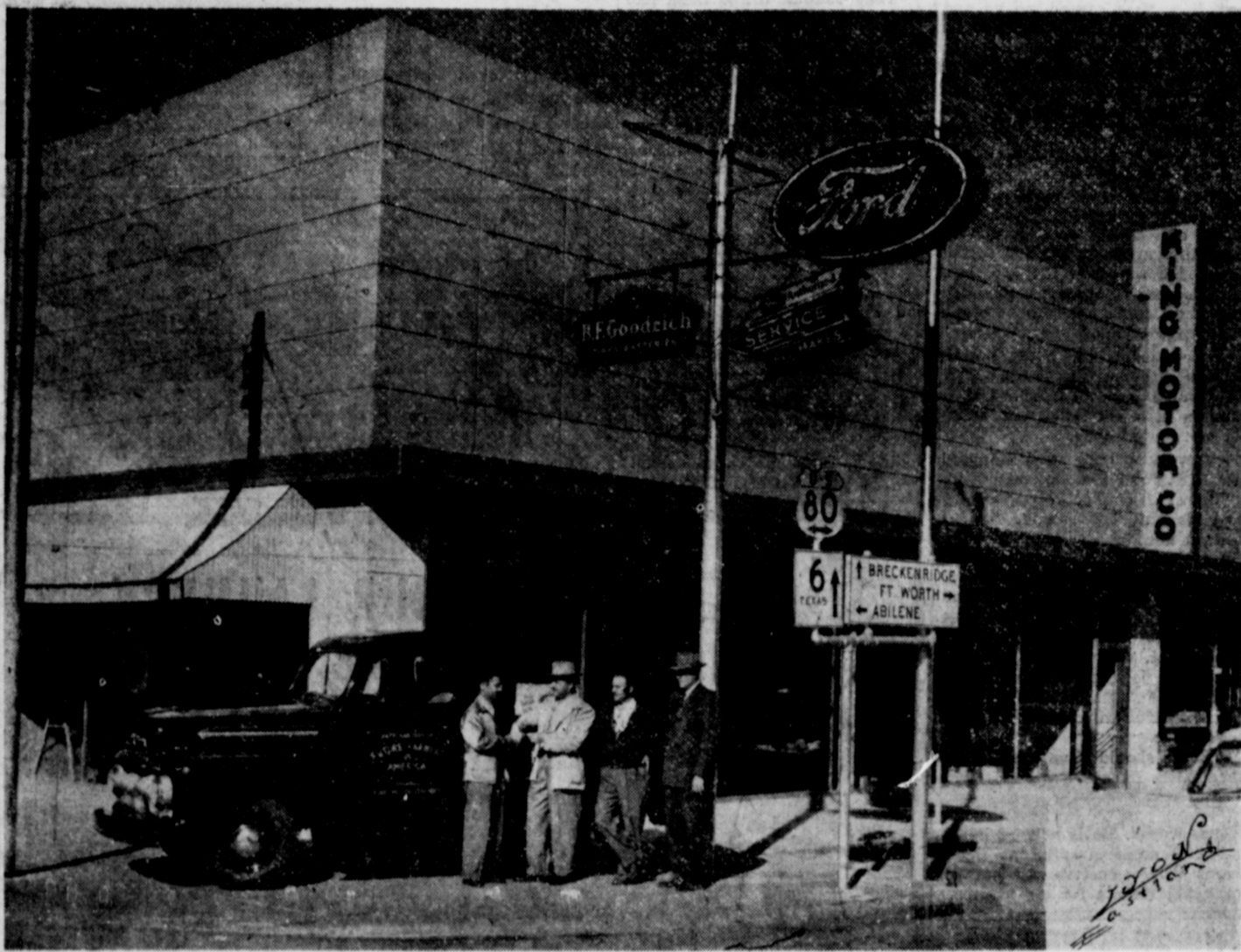

## High School Carnival Set For Tonight

## COOK WANTED IN MISSOURI

JOPLIN, Mo., March 22 (UP)—Prosecuting Attorney Dale Tourtelot of Jasper county issued a plea to federal authorities today to surrender killer William E. Cook to his home town to face trial for his life in the massacre of the Carl Mosser Family at Atwood, Ill.

Official circles expressed dissatisfaction here over the 300-year sentence assessed against Cook in federal district court in Oklahoma City yesterday.

"We want him (Cook) back to face trial on five first degree murder charges pending against him in Joplin," Tourtelot said.

Police said many persons on the streets echoed dissatisfaction over the sentence expressed in official circles.

## Meeting Date of March 30 To Climax Preliminary Preparation

Planning for a hospital in Eastland will reach a climax Friday, March 30, with a city-wide meeting to discuss the project in the High School auditorium.

Plans prepared by Ted Howard at Texas A & M College, and the estimated cost will be announced at the meeting, Mrs. John Turner, chairman of the hospital committee, said Thursday.

The meeting also will mark the kickoff of the fund raising campaign for the hospital. Plans for the fund raising will be made at that time and the campaign will get underway shortly thereafter.

## Russia Doubles Iran Troops

TEHRAN, Iran, March 22 (UP)—Russia was reported today to have doubled troops stationed on her joint frontier with Iran.

The report created new fears in jittery Tehran in the third day of martial law as tanks rumbled through the cobble streets to maintain order.

An about-face in Soviet propaganda broadcasts since the assassination of premier Ali Razmara March 7 placed new emphasis on the border report.

There was some speculation that British troops might be sent to Iran to protect the British-controlled oil industry. The Iranian parliament voted to nationalize the industry despite a British concession valid until 1953.

Mrs. Hendricks was a member of the Kokomo Baptist Church.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Daisy Wood, Gorman; and Mrs. Nola Wheeler, Carlsbad, New Mexico; two sons, Raymond Hendricks, Eastland and Albert Hendricks, Gorman; two brothers, O. E. Charman, Carter, Okla., and T. C. Charman, Stanton; two sisters, Mrs. Alice Whitby, Gorman and Mrs. Lena Shugart, Watsonville, Calif., twelve grandchildren and one great grandson.

Wall was sentenced to die by another jury last December. A 54th District Court jury deliberated only 30 minutes in returning the death penalty against Craft.

## King Motor Furnishes Eastland FFA Chapter With New Pick-Up

In the interest of helping to build a good vocational agriculture program for the community and schools of Eastland, King Motor Co., is furnishing a new 1951 Ford half-ton pick-up for the use of the Eastland Chapter of Future Farmers of America, according to M. D. Fox, local FFA adviser and vocational agriculture teacher.

The use of the pick-up will enable the club boys to locate and secure better livestock projects, take livestock projects to shows and exhibitions, and take equipment and other teaching aids to and from the demonstration farm or the boys' home farms wherever supervised farm practices are done; it will also facilitate a better supervision of project work on the boys' farms as well as assist in building a cooperative program of adult education in agriculture in and surrounding Eastland, Fox stated.

## 4-H Boys, Girls Enter Animals In Tri-County Show

The 4-H Club boys and girls of Eastland County have entered 132 head of livestock in the Tri-County Livestock Show to be held at Ranger, Friday and Saturday, according to C. V. Whitaker, assistant county agent.

Nine of these are beef calves and three are beef breeding heifers. There are twelve dairy heifers, two dairy cows and one dairy bull. Twenty-four head of swine are entered; two fat barrows, 14 gilts, three sows, and five boars. Five sheep and six goats are also entered.

Chickens constitute the largest number of entries with a total of seventy-one. The Tri-County Show is the only time that the 4-H Club members with poultry projects have a chance to show, which accounts for the large number of entries in the poultry division.

## Movie Stars May Tell Of Red Hollywood Ties

WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)—Several movie stars who once were Communists may follow Larry Parks and tell about Red activity in Hollywood, a member of the House Un-American Activities Committee said today.

The committee member, who declined use of his name, said the legislators know of several name actors who, like Parks, may testify they were "duped" into joining the Communist party and dropped out when they learned its real aims.

Hearings on Communism in the movie colony have been recessed until April 10.

## Russia Welshes On Promise

WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)—Russia has welshed on its wartime promise to return lend-lease goods to the United States, and prospects today were that further negotiations would be only name-calling.

The United States has been demanding that Russia return 670 ships and pay \$800,000,000 for the rest of the \$11,000,000,000 in lend-lease aid the Soviet Union received.

Russia replied yesterday that it would pay no more than \$240,000,000 and "refuse to consider the return of the ships." The United States was expected to protest formally.

Under the lend-lease agreement, Russia promised to return to the U. S. certain goods upon request. These goods included items that survived the war and which "shall be determined by the President (of the U.S.) to be useful in the defense of the U.S.A. or of the Western Hemisphere or to be otherwise of use to the U.S.A."

Secretary of State Dean Acheson invoked this clause on Feb. 7 and asked the Soviet to return the lend-lease ships. Russia's flat refusal, contained in a note handed to the State Department, said the United States did not need the disputed ships.

## Robert R. Fisher Rites Thursday

Funeral services were to be held at 2 p.m. today at the Moore Funeral Home Chapel, Arlington, for Robert Roy Fisher, 59, former Eastland resident, and one time Public Housing Administration supervisor for the Texas area.

Fisher died en route to a Fort Worth hospital, Tuesday. He formerly lived here in connection with his duties with the Department of Agriculture. He had lived in Arlington since his retirement six years ago. He worked for the PHA for 16 years. He was a mechanical engineer graduate of Texas A & M.

Fisher was a Shriner and a member of the American Legion. His only survivor is his wife, of Arlington.

George L. Lane of Eastland, who worked with Fisher while he lived here, was to be a pallbearer at the services.

### Wounded Eastland Infantryman Recalls Korean Battleground

Back from the roar of the shell, the bite of the cold, and the pain of a wound, comes Cpl. Earnest Mahaffey, 19-year-old veteran of some of the most bitter fighting of the Korean battleground.

Earnest, a quiet, likeable, and somewhat modest youngster, is spending a 30-day leave with his parents in Eastland. He walks with the grace of a pantler, his eyes look tired, old and maybe a little leaten. He carries his left arm in a sling.

Enlisting in the Army October 28, 1949, Earnest took his training with the infantry. It was with the Third Infantry Division that Earnest went into action last Nov. 17. It wasn't just cold over there and it wasn't just the fighting that made this young American wonder why American forces are on that distant battleground. But let the fighting man tell you in

his own words. "On November 17, we landed in Korea at a place you probably never heard of. It was called Wonsan. Aside from being scared, wondering whether this trip was really necessary and not believing that it was, we were feeling pretty fair as word reached us that we weren't by ourselves. The Devil Dog First Marine Division had gone in ahead of us and cleared the way. They paved the way for us in blood—Korean blood mostly but a lot of American—as they cleared every hedgerow—yard by yard—and on their bellies. This was we were later to do also.

"Yeh, those guys cleared the way through hedgerows, snow, ice, fox holes, or what have you. We moved out and went to Hamhung. I had started feeling scared, lonesome, and a little mad, as I n e boarding the boat in Japan, but now I could feel some of the tense ness leaving. We had met no enemies. There was apparently nothing in our paths. Then we engaged the enemy around the first of December while moving up to aid another outfit. Don't ask me which one as I don't know, make a withdrawal. I sure missed home

then." The Eastlander's outfit moved into their first baptism of fire with the same old American spirit which has been shown by all fighting men from the Continental forces of the Revolution on down. It was the same kind of spirit as was displayed by some of their older brothers when they hit the beach one day in April of 1945, or on six June of '44. The official records will prove that.

His outfit has received numerous medals including two presidential citations. Mahaffey, personally, has received the Purple Heart, Combat Infantryman's Badge, and a citation. He has received no battle stars as the operations in Korea are officially termed "police action" by the chair polishers in Washington.

From the time he entered combat up until he was wounded, Mahaffey was in constant action, taking part in every major battle of the period. It was while advancing up a hill near Seoul with a machinegun in his arms, that a rifle bullet came ripping into his elbow shattering it to the point of taking him out of action. The soldier made it alone back to the Aid Station.

"I didn't know I was hit at first," he stated to this reporter. "when it hit me there was no real pain—just felt as though someone had bumped into me or something. It was when I started to continue

moving that it started to hurt. I took off for the aid station." When asked about our chances in Korea and what his sincere opinion of the right and wrong of our troops being sent by Truman to fight and die on that distant land, the infantryman looked at the writer without speaking for several minutes. Then, when he spoke—it was slow, deliberate, and seemed to come from the bottom of his heart.

"Well, so long as we are in Korea and American blood has been spilled to gain our footholds I believe that we should stick and finish the job. However, I can't see any reason for being in Korea. We are supposed to be stopping Communism but when there is the evil Red hand in plain view everywhere including the United States and we apparently do nothing about it, I can't see why we should pick some spot like that to start trying to wash someone's dirty wash, and the charges of some countries that we are in Korea as aggressive capitalist is foolish. There is just nothing there that we would want. I know that I didn't leave anything there that I want to go back after.

"We are winning the war over there and I don't mind the Army. It is all right. In fact I am at present undecided as to whether or not to re-enlist when my time is up. A lot of things can happen between now and then to make up or change a fella's mind. So don't get me wrong when I say I can't see why we are in Korea. There are a lot of guys over there who don't know why. They are just there. You soon lose all knowledge of time and place.

"We are called police. But it is a pretty tough town when police have to fight full scale battles and use as heavy equipment as we do. The people over here in the States don't consider the country is at war. To the man fighting this war—its—well—its pretty big." Earnest spent Christmas aboard ship being on the last ship to leave

HOUSTON, March 21 (UP)—Miss Norma Barnes said today she supposed she would have to sell her Cadillac and purchase a Model A because proposing men and traffic officers won't leave her alone. "That Cadillac," moaned the 37-year-old brunette after Justice Neal Shurtleff fined her \$15 for speeding, "has caused me no end of trouble in the three months I've had it."

"The manager of the store found out about my car. He had only a 'three-holer' Buick and just couldn't stand to see me drive a 'four-holer.' I was finally forced out of a job at the store."

KEFAUVER SAYS CRIME IS RAGING IN AMERICA

By Barbara Bundsch United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, March 21, (UP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver said today his Senate Crime hearings here have proved that gangsters from the prohibition era still can place "men who could help them" in choice political jobs.

As the kleig-lighted session went into its eighth and final day, the committee called Frank "The Boss" Costello (at 9:30 a.m. EST) for one last chance to answer the \$64 question: "How much are you worth?" or face contempt charges.

Then the committee planned to dig into violence on the New York waterfront with Albert Anastasia, identified as head of Brooklyn's infamous Murder, Inc. And still the most powerful figure on the waterfront, as the star of some 40 additional witnesses.

Kefauver, Lincolnque Democrat from Tennessee, said Costello's admission yesterday that he was a friend of 10 of Tammany Hall's 16 district leaders, formed "a very important part of the pattern" the committee has found in its coast-to-coast study of crime.

"Here is the pattern of a gangster able to build up his importance with political influence, able to put men in big spots for doing things for him," Kefauver said in an interview. "But he's here. He's always escaped prosecution."

Former Mayor William O'Dwyer testified yesterday that he had tried to pull Costello's carefully manicured hands-out of Tammany politics but admitted he had appointed five friends of Costello, Joe Adonis and Willie Moretti to city jobs when he was mayor. "There are things you have to do

politically if you want cooperation," he explained.

"All over the country we have heard testimony about Costello and Meyer Lansky and Joe Adonis and Jerry Catena," Kefauver said. "This has been brought together to show how they got started—bringing liquor down from Canada during prohibition. The springboard for the syndicates all over the country was here and in Chicago and Cleveland."

He said testimony given by Ambassador to Mexico O'Dwyer Monday and Tuesday indicated that the interstate gang was composed of the same thugs who directed Murder, Inc. and spread crime across the country in the years

following the death of the speaker.

"I don't think it's as tight a federation as of now," Kefauver said. "But the old figures are still there. They still have common contacts."

Costello refused to answer the question of his present wealth Tuesday, standing on his constitutional rights. His attorney, George Wolf, said he would be prepared to submit a brief showing that the question wasn't valid

when contempt charges may be argued next Monday in Washington. Costello also faces possible deportation, perjury charges and income tax prosecution.

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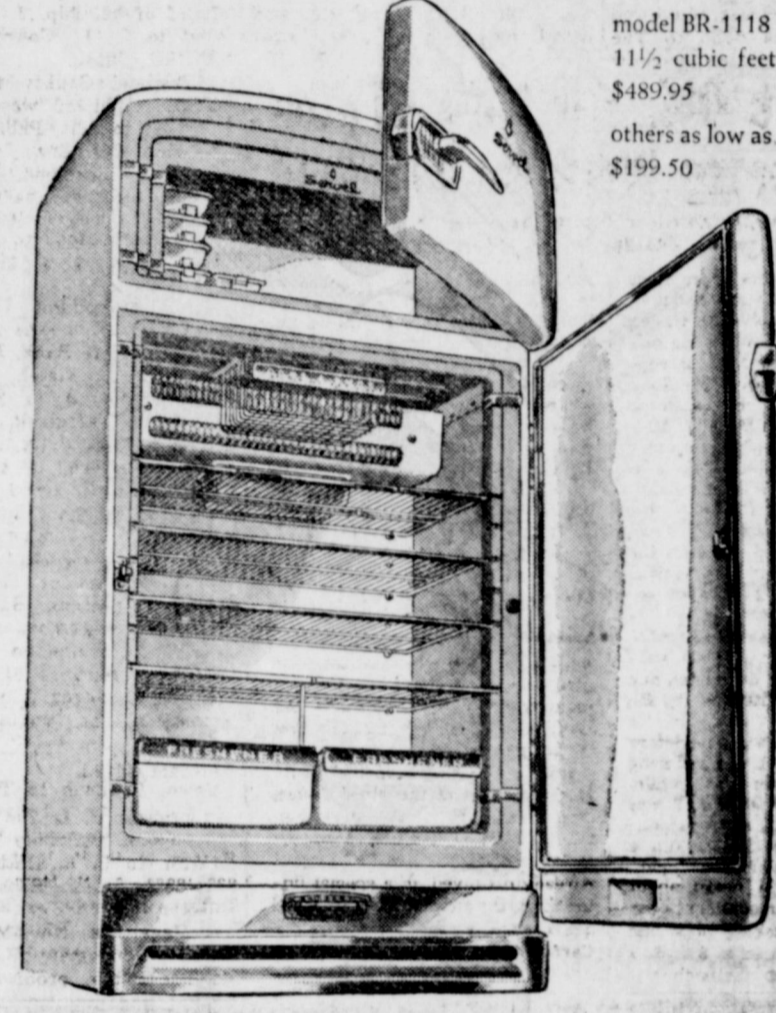

NEW YORK, March 22 (UP)—Kentucky will be the spotlight here tonight in the semi-final round of the Eastern NCAA Regional tournament, while the Oklahoma Aggies take the center of the stage at the quarter-final round of the Western Regionals.

The lineup for the Eastern semi-finals at Madison Square Garden sends Kentucky, the Nation's No. 1 basketball team, against St. John's and Illinois against North Carolina State.

As Kansas City, the double-header that will clean up the quarter-final round of the Western Regionals pits the Oklahoma Aggies, the Nation's No. 2 team, against Montana State, and Washington against the Texas Aggies.

Kansas State and Brigham Young, won the first two games of the Western Regionals last night, but each ran into more trouble than expected. Kansas State survived a terrific score to beat Arizona, 61 to 59, while Brigham

Young downed San Jose State, 68-61.

As a crowd of 10,000 watched in awe, the K-State Wildcats, champions of the Big Seven, started out to make mincemeat of the Arizona Wildcats, champions of the Border Conference. But with a minute and a half to go, Roger Johnson's goal brought Arizona up to a 60-59 deficit. K-State froze the ball and added a free throw to gain the narrow triumph.

Brigham Young, the National Invitation Tournament champion shooting for the "grand slam" didn't impress in first NCAA victory.

That could be because Roland Minson, who won the NE's "most valuable players" award, picked up four first-half fouls and spent so much time on the bench that he scored only 12 points.

The Oklahoma Aggies (27-4), were expected to have only a routine assignment against Montana State (22-12). However, the game between Washington (22-5), champion of the Pacific Coast Conference, and Texas A&M (16-11), champion of the Southwest Conference, was expected to be nip-and-tuck.

Kentucky was a solid choice over St. John's, but the Illinois-North Carolina State game was a toss-up in the east.

Dufflebag Buzzing After Atom Visit

By H. D. QUIGG United Press Staff Correspondent ABOARD A TRAIN APPROACHING TOKYO, March 21 (UP)—My dufflebag is probably as radioactive as a singing commerial.

And twice as insidious. It is stuffed with things which should make a geiger counter tick in bebop. It probably glows at night like a radium-dial alarm clock.

This is what comes of visiting the Atom Bomb Memorial Hall at Hiroshima just before I left town. Within the hall are multiple memories of the Atom Bomb explosion, three are seared tiles, burned bamboo, blistered gargoyles, blast-shadowed bricks and building stones, and materials of all kinds which were marked visibly by the bomb.

Each is tagged and labelled as to its distance from the bomb epicenter and its position in the architecture of pre-bomb Hiroshima.

There are also seared and twisted tree-trunks and plant life. And there are maps, charts, photographs, and a huge model layout of the city showing how it looked right after the bombing.

The hall is closed to the public right now. But Harry Umeda, of the Foreign Affairs Section of the city government, who was later the former director of the hall. Shogo Nagoka, came in, when I asked where I could get an atom-burned stone or two. Nagoka thrust some excess items upon me from his personal selection.

Hence the laden dufflebag. In my collection are six pieces of basalt rock which were lying on the ground in a shrine nearly 400 yards from the blast center.

They pair off, and each pair strikes in unison. You see them pull the picks up to the top of the swing, then a little wiggle, and then the stroke, right together. Good as any chorus girl.

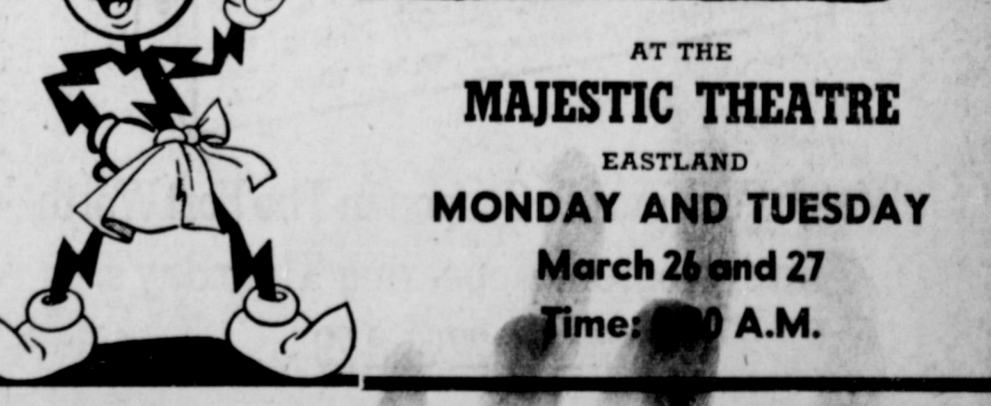
