
So, don't be deprived of your vote. Cast it absentee if you think you might be away from

Major Dust Storm Wreaks Havoc Here

A "dirty 30s" type 'dust storm, accompanied by winds clocked at 75 m.p.h. and a smattering of rain at the onset of the storm, struck Bovina about 3 p.m. Tuesday of last week, reducing visibility to near zero and leaving a trail of damage in its wake.

The huge, billowing cloud of reddish sand gusted in ahead of a cold Pacific front almost obliterating the mid-day sun, reminding long-time residents of dust storms in the 1930s and

The strong wind sheared tree branches, lifted shingles from buildings, sent trailers and stock tanks tumbling into fields, damaged trailer homes and blew the siding off at least one home in Bovina, the C.L. McDaniel residence at 209 Third Street.

ties was a 1974 Blazer, a sports-van owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Sudderth. Parked at First State Bank, where Mrs. Sudderth is employed, the vehicle was struck by a flying dog house which shattered two of the windows in the van and chipped paint off the side and top of the van. Damage to the vehicle was estimated at approximately \$100. The dog house is believed to have come from a home in the 400 block of Avenue A.

In the Rhea Community, a mobile home owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jay Potts was unroofed by the blast. Mrs. Potts and her two-year-old daughter, Nicole, were in the home at the time, but escaped uninjured.

Also included in the casual- | large section wrapped around a utility pole. Neighbors assisted the family in emptying the home of their furniture and household items which were stored in a barn at the Herman Grissom farm. Several other homes in the Rhea area reportedly suffered some damage.

The slight amount of moisture that fell at the onset of the storm was just enough that mixed with the sand gave the impression that big globs of mud had been thrown against windows, cars and buildings,

particularly those facing west. The temperature plunged to 26 degrees Thursday night following the cold blast, further threatening the area's fruit crop, which had already sustained damage in an earlier cold snap.

IN CLOSE RACE

Bonds New Mayor; Elect 3 Councilmen

Incumbent Durward Bell, Dickie Clayton and E.B. [Bedford] Caldwell were elected city councilmen in a moderate turnout at the polls here Saturday. Tom Bonds, uncontested in his bid for the mayor's post, nailed down that position.

Although only 128 votes were cast, some three less than last year, the race for the three seats on the city council was a close one with only one vote separating the third and fourth place men. In addition to the closeness of the contest, Incumbent Roy Allen, completing his first term on the governing body, failed to win in his bid for re-election.

Bell, a farmer who was appointed to fill a vacancy on the council last summer, was re-elected to the city position with 95 votes. Clayton received 85 votes to capture a seat and Caldwell received 62 votes for the third position. Caldwell and Clayton are also farmers.

Daryl Kirkpatrick, also a farmer, received 61 votes; C.N. (Big Nick) Trienen, owneroperator of Big Nick Machinery, had 53 votes; Allen, manager of Riverside Chemicals, 35. One write-in vote for the council was recorded.

In the balloting for mayor, Bonds received 100 votes. Thirteen write-in votes for seven people were received in that race.

J.E. Sherrill served as election judge. Mrs. Elton Venable and Mrs. Pearl Moore were clerks at the polls held in the American Legion Hall.

Holdover councilmen, with one year remaining on their terms, are Billy Whitecotton and Vernon Estes.

Whitecotton is co-owner of Bovina Supermarket. Estes is a farmer-rancher.

Bell, Clayton, Caldwell and Bonds were sworn into office on the council at a meeting Monday night in city hall.

Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary, reported that the revenue sharing check for the last quarter of 1973 had been received. The check was in the amount of \$5336, making the total for the year \$21,344. She told the council that the city would receive information on this year's revenue sharing funds the latter part of the month.

Horn, Estes, Bell and Whitecotton met prior to the swearing in ceremonies of the new councilmen to canvass and certify the election returns.





Sod House Society Seeks Information

As I see it, the County Judge is responsible for the distribution of certain monies received from Public School lands and for the approval of various school bus routes.

The County Judge presides at the meetings of the Commissioners and should advise, counsel and assist in the administration of the business of the county. He should take the lead in the preparation of the budget and he should be versed in the procedures necessary for the smooth operation of the county. He should strive for unity, at all levels, within the county government. He should be, in reality, the executive officer of the county and should work constantly for programs and ideas that would benefit the county.

The County Judge presides at probate hearings and other trials involving charges that are not felonies and punishable by imprisonment. There will also be

various domestic, welfare and rehabilitation situations come before the County Judge for his consideration and handling, as well as numerous and varied other items, such as appeals from J.P. and corporation courts.

I believe the office of the County Judge should be a place where anyone in the county could come and discuss a problem. I am a Baptist and am very proud of the churches of Parmer County. I believe in the Christian home and all of the basic good things that are taught in such a home.

I believe in our schools and feel that prayer should be held as deemed right and needful. I believe students can learn much from a school prayer session and a devoted Christian teacher. I believe that local control of our schools is necessary.

I believe in the full support of our county and various city law enforcement officials. I do not believe in the use of drugs or alcohol, especially in excess. I believe the young people of our county should be guided where possible, but where guidance is not possible, they must be prepared to be accountable to the law, the same as all adults.

Clayton Seeking 7th Term In Legislature

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake this week gave the Blade his official announcement for re-election to the state legislature.
