Chinks Offer Bitter Resistance To Slow The American Advance

By Frank Tremaine United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO, April 15 (UP)—Bitter Chinese resistance slowed the United Nations advance along most of the 100-mile Korean front north of the 38th Parallel today.

Three B-29s dumped 30 tons of bombs on the runway, taxi stripes and revetments at Kang Airfield, 20 miles north of Pyongyang. Seven other superfortresses dropped 70 tons of explosives on the east coast supply center of Hamhung, through which enemy supplies have been moving.

No Communist fighter opposition was reported. It was the second straight day that the Communist Air Force has stayed away from American planes. B-29s and American jets shot down or damaged 33 enemy jets in aerial battles Thursday.

The sudden upsurge in fighting along the ground fronts was reflected in the enemy casualty figure of 4,315 yesterday. It was the first time the toll of enemy dead and wounded for a single day has exceeded 4,000 since Mar 17.

Ridgway's plane landed at Tokyo's Haneda Airport at 9:05 p.m. (7:05 a.m. EST) after a short flight from Korea, where he turned over command of the U. S. 8th Army to his successor, Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, shortly after noon.

The new supreme commander messaged ahead to the airport that there would be "no pictures and no press conference" upon his arrival in Tokyo.

Ridgway will have one full day to confer with MacArthur on the complex problems of the Far East which now are his responsibility.

MacArthur remained within the white-walled American embassy for the second straight day, presumably mapping the campaign of vindication he will launch on his arrival in the United States Tuesday.

Ridgway left Korea with a brief 21-word statement to newsmen at a farwell press conference during the afternoon.

"With God's guidance and with all my heart and mind, I shall do my utmost to discharge my new responsibilities well," he said.

His successor, Van Fleet, veteran of the victory over Communist guerrillas in Greece, accepted command of the 8th Army in Korea with a statement that was only a little longer.

"Gentlemen, I am delighted to be here," Van Fleet said. "This afternoon General Ridgway turned over to me the command of the 8th Army. This is a great honor and a tremendous responsibility. I shall give my best to merit the confidence both of my superiors and of my juniors."

NEW RATING IN NAVY

NEW ORLEANS, April 15—A new rating, "Officer Candidate", has been incorporated into the Navy's personnel structure and will soon designate enlisted men who are in training for Line commissions in the Naval Reserve.

The Navy's first OCS will convene bi-monthly classes of 300 students for indoctrination periods of four months.

The Officer Candidate program replaces the present program under which trainees were appointed Ensigns and ordered to indoctrination school at Monterey, Calif.

Under the OCS system, students will not be commissioned until successfully completing the school. Those who fail will return to active duty ranks with their previous ratings, or in the case of civilian candidates, as seaman recruits.

Candidates selected from civilian sources will enroll as OC with the pay grade of a seaman recruit, while those selected from active or regular service will have their rates changed to OC in corresponding pay grades.

Graduates become Naval Reserve Line Ensigns and must remain on active duty for three years. They retain their commissions as reservists for eight years, including active duty service.

Applications from regulars and reservists on active duty will be made through official channels. Civilians who possess previous "ROC" qualifications should apply to Officers of Naval Officer Procurement in Dallas or New Orleans.

Balance sheet for the week between good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

Good News
1. The Communists have challenged American superiority in the air above Korea and have lost the first round. The Reds threw 95 Russian built jets against a fleet of more than 114 jet fighter planes and bombers. The score was 33 Communist planes destroyed or damaged and two American bombers damaged. Loss of control of the skies would be a severe blow to Lt. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway.

2. The British are planning to step up their war effort in Korea their plans call for a full Commonwealth division of some 29,000 men compared with the 12,000 British troops now fighting there.

3. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower apparently is pleased with what he sees and hears on his tour of units making up his Western European Army. Progress in forming the force which is counted upon to deter the Russians from starting a world war is well on schedule and each passing day is to the advantage of the Allies.

Bad News
1. Regardless of the merits of the controversy between President Truman and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the removal of the general widened the breach between the two schools of thought on how the nation's foreign policy should be conducted. The bitter feeling

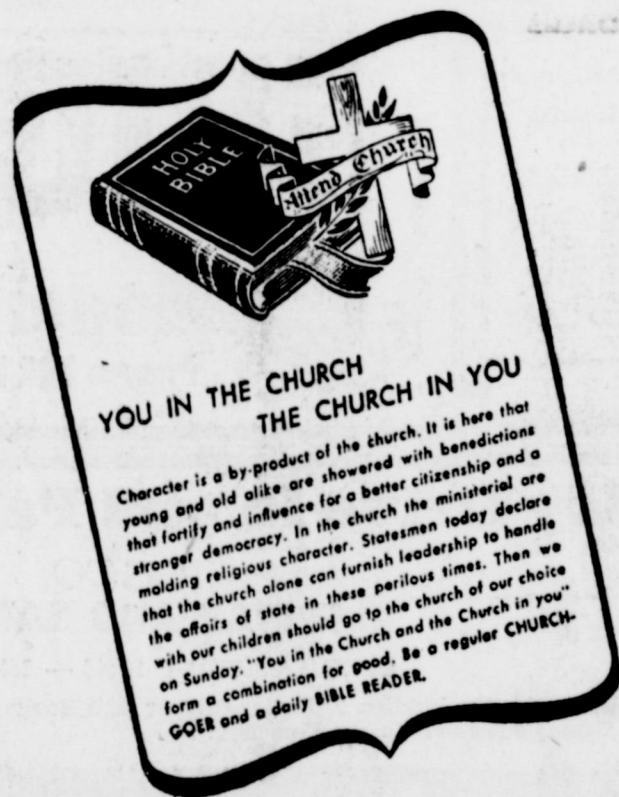
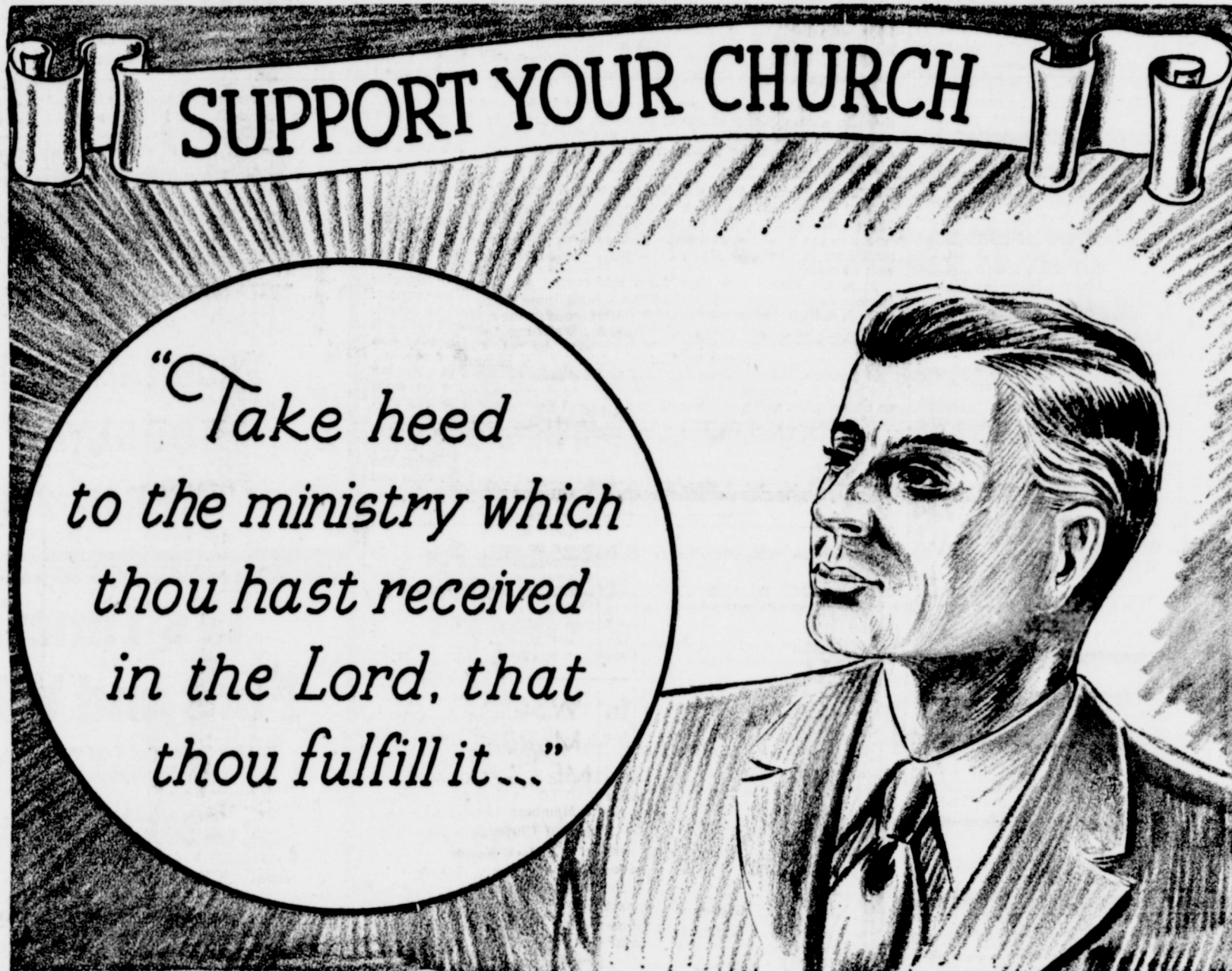

CUSTOMS MEN MAKE HAUL

EDINBURG, April 14 (UP)—Three Houston men and two from Fort Worth have been jailed in connection with federal seizure here and at Harlingen of narcotics worth \$75,000 on the underworld market.

The Houston suspect, George Spencer, 19, Calvin Terry Lee, 59, and Norman Adams, 42, were captured by U. S. Customs Agents who said they possessed 23.8 grams of Heroin, enough for 23,000 "shots."

Raymond L. Gray and Raymond Alsop, the two Fort Worth suspects were put under \$1,000 bonds. Gray posted his bond this morning and was scheduled to be released around noon. Alsop told U. S. Commissioner Carlos Watson he didn't think he could post a bond.

Customs Agents trailed Gray and Alsop 25 miles north of Brownsville Wednesday night and found a thousand Marijuana cigarettes and 11 1/2 pounds of bulk Marijuana, valued at about \$15,000, in their automobiles.

Agents Herbert Scott and Lake R. Rymer of McAllen, acting on a "tip," picked up the Houston men as they returned from Ciudad Aleman, Mexico, across the Rio Grande from Roma, Tex.

The officers said they trailed

the trio's truck 75 miles to Edinburg and made the arrests as Lee, Spencer and Adams finished their supper in a cafe.

The Heroin was found in a pocket strapped under Lee's left sock and covered by the top of his cowboy boot.

The drug is a processed form of Morphine forbidden in the United States under any circumstances.

U. S. Commissioner J. C. Hall set a \$2,000 bond for Lee, and bonds of \$1,000 each for Spencer and Adams.

Customs Agency Chief Bernard McLeish in Brownsville estimated the Heroin would have brought \$60,000 on the underworld market.

He said it tested 86 per cent pure and would have made 23,000 12-grain shots.

The Fort Worth men were arrested by Agents O. J. Dompier, John R. Kent and Joe F. Ray, who withheld the names pending arraignment.

Beat Him To Death

YARDVILLE, N. J., April 15 (UP)—The confession of a 64-year-old handyman that he killed a grocer for love of the man's wife, has caused her arrest on adultery charges.

Jacinto Carlos confessed to police yesterday and was held without bail on murder charges for the fatal beating of Leon A. West, 58, last Thursday.

TROUBLE IS ON THE MAKE

TEHRAN, Iran, April 14 (UP)—Scores of armed police converged on Tehran's Parliament Square to prevent a scheduled pro-Communist rally while fears mounted of renewed outbreaks in the southern Iran oil fields.

(British foreign secretary Herbert Morrison told Commons in London today that nine persons including two British seamen were killed in yesterday's riots at the oil town of Abadan, southwestern Iran.

(Morrison said the government would "not hesitate to take appropriate action" to protect Britons in Iran.)

Defiant leaders of the scheduled demonstration toured Tehran in cars equipped with loudspeakers. They blared out a call for all "true Iranian patriots" to attend the mass rally later in the day.

Gen. Abdul Hussein Hejazi, chief of police, last night banned all public meetings on grounds they would "interfere with traffic."

Premier Hussein Ala conferred with the Shah this morning on the tense situation. Anti-British feeling has risen with the Iranian Parliament's decision to nationalize the oil fields despite British protests.

Vets' Pre-Season Slump Doesn't Mean a Thing

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Joe DiMaggio didn't hit his weight at the outset this spring. Stanley Musial had a string of hitless times at bat.

Other established veterans got off slowly, but those most interested weren't concerned. The seasoned hands are only getting in shape. They'll open fire when the real shooting begins.

Harry Heilmann, who led the American League four times in eight campaigns, practically was an All-America out in his many training trips with the Tigers. But come April 17, or whenever it was, the pitchers couldn't get him out with a boomerang.

Heilmann didn't—no stickout slugger does—worry about being short-changed in the hit department while warming up for the main event.

Take what they might suspect was a base knock away from one of them in a championship game, however, and you'll hear the squawk all the way around the league. That one counts, goes into the records, contributes something toward where the club finishes. It's the ball player's groceries.

PITCHERS and batters will tell you they frequently lose their stuff and sharpness for a week or 10 days after leaving the sunny south. They can't explain, but it takes them that length of time to settle down to the business at hand. It is during this brief stretch that a youngster is likely to press, handicap himself mechanically, run the risk of injury.

It is the slump any time from mid-season on that the superior performer seeks to avoid, hastens to cure, for that's when it hurts most. Naturally, the batter doesn't realize he is doing it. He doesn't get next to himself until they start getting him out. Usually an observer can see the fault. It's like a professional golfer going to another pro.

A batter can be striding too long or too short, swinging or stopping the bat a little too soon or too late. He can be standing too far from or close to the plate. Staleness could be the cause, which is why rest is prescribed.

When not lacing the ball as he did to win 12 American League batting championships, Ty Cobb had kids throw to him long before batting practice. The Georgia Peach started bunting, just meeting the ball. Then he aimed just to meet the ball and hit it through the pitcher's box, c'd that until he got his timing back.
