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### TEXANS WANT SHIVERS TO OPPOSE TOM CONNALLY

AUSTIN, April 28 (UP)—The Gen. Douglas MacArthur - President Truman dispute is having a notable effect on Texas politics.

Namely, many Texans are urging Gov. Allan Shivers to oppose Sen. Tom Connally for re-election because they disapprove of the nation's present foreign policies.

Letters and telegrams urging the governor to seek Sen. Connally's post have been pouring in at a rate of between 30 and 40 a day, it was revealed yesterday.

Shivers, now in Santa Fe, N. M., attending a meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, is making little comment about the sudden demand for his entering the senatorial race.

Several petitions have been sent in from East Texas. Two came from Palestine and one from Jacksonville. Their signatories numbered from 160 down to less than 12.

### Will March Down Avenue

NEW YORK, April 28 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur and 500,000 marchers parade up 5th Avenue today before 4,000,000 spectators in the biggest anti-Communist "Loyalty Day" demonstration in the city's history.

Back from a triumphant two-day hero's visit in Chicago and Milwaukee where more than 6,300,000 persons saw him, MacArthur said he "felt fine" as he prepared to lead the six-hour procession along the "richest street in the world."

The parade, sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars to counter annual Communist "May Day" celebrations, will include 40 bands and 33 nationality groups wearing native costumes, including those of Russia and other Iron Curtain countries.

Plans for Roman Catholic Francis Cardinal Spellman to ride in the five-star general's lead car in the parade were changed at the last minute after protests from various Protestant groups that MacArthur is an Episcopalian.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 28 (UP)—The first degree murder trial of the Rev. George P. Hetenyi, 41-year-old accused wife slayer from Amherst, N. Y., will resume Monday following a week end adjournment.

Hetenyi is on trial a second time for allegedly shooting his 24-year-old wife in April 1949, and dumping her body into the Genesee River. His original conviction of second degree murder was reversed by the Appellate Division, Fourth Department.

### ALLIED GUNS IN SEOUL ROAR AGAINST THE RED COLUMNS

TOKYO, April 28. (UP)—Chinese Communist reinforcements were thrown against the retreating U. S. 8th Army today to open the fifth battle for Seoul with a powerhouse drive that reached within five miles of the ruined South Korean capital.

Northwest of Seoul the Reds plunged across the Seoul-Chunchon Highway, isolating the capital from the rest of the United Nations Army along the front.

Allied guns in Seoul roared continuously against the Red columns piling up new dead to add to the 42,260 men the Communists have lost since they started their offensive last Sunday.

The Communist attack on Seoul was typical, infiltrators slipped through the UN line to strike from the rear while the main force hammered from the front.

The U.S. 8th Army announced officially the fall of Uijongbu, 11 miles north of Seoul, which from reports said the allies abandoned Friday.

The blazing battle Friday cost the Reds an additional 4,760 killed and wounded Friday to add to 37,500 casualties suffered in the first five days of the offensive, the 8th Army communique said.

The Reds' frontal assault on Seoul was made from the northeast, along the highway from Uijongbu. Enemy units in company strength hit the UN line in close quarter fighting with rifles and machine guns. These first assaults were thrown back.

All along the line to the east the Allies kept up their retreat, leaving an open space between the lines where artillery could reach out and blast the Reds at little cost of Allied lives.

### BULLETIN

TAIPEH, Formosa, April 28 (UP)—Chinese Nationalist Guerrillas have made an amphibious raid on the suburbs of the Communist Mainland Coastal City of Yungkia (Wenohow), 235 miles South of Shanghai, the China Union Press Agency said today.

It said the Guerrillas made surprise landings April 22 on Lungwang and Pangshih Islands 15 miles east of Yungkia, seized control of them and sent a raiding force across the bay into Yungkia's suburbs.

The guerrillas captured a number of Communist supply boats and 50 tons of rice and killed or wounded 400 Communists, the agency said. The raiders returned to secret island hideouts after the attacks, it said.

Official sources said they could not confirm the raids.

### Vogeler Is Set Free

VIENNA, Austria, April 28 (UP)—Communist Hungar, today freed Robert A. Vogeler, an American industrialist serving a 10 year prison sentence as a western spy, and announced that the U. S. had granted four major concessions to gain his release.

Vogeler, pale and gaunt from 17 months in prison, crossed the frontier into Austria at 11:25 a.m. (5:25 a.m. EST) and two hours later rejoined his jubilant wife in a tearful reunion in Vienna.

At the same time, Hungary announced that the U. S. had agreed to grant these Hungarian demands in return for Vogeler's release: 1—Reopening of Hungarian consulates in New York and Cleveland. 2—Lifting of Washington's ban on travel by American citizens in Hungary. 3—Restoration of Hungarian property recovered in the U. S. zone of Germany. 4—Alteration of the wave length of the "Voice of America" relay transmitter in Munich, Germany, so as not to conflict with radio Budapest's frequency.

### Will Appeal The Prices

WASHINGTON, April 28 (UP)—Price Stabilizer Michael V. DiSalle—with President Truman's blessing—will order a rollback of beef prices this weekend, authoritative sources said today.

The sources said a group of orders, already signed, will be announced today or tomorrow. The orders will cut cattle prices three or four cents a pound throughout the industry—from the range to the local butcher's front window.

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DiSalle, it was learned, had to fight all the way to the White House to get approval for the action. A cabinet meeting yesterday overruled Agriculture Secretary Charles F. Brannan's strenuous objections to the rollback. The chunky price chief first cleared the decision with defense mobilizer Charles E. Wilson and economic stabilizer Eric A. Johnston.

Coming Struggle for Power Highlights Foreign Aid Fight

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The coming battle over who is to run the \$10 billion to \$13 billion foreign military and economic aid programs will be a struggle for power in Washington. President Truman has attempted to settle this argument before Congress gets a crack at it. By a letter to William C. Foster, present administrator of the Marshall Plan, the President has issued a directive that the State Department shall have the major voice in deciding which country gets what aid and how much.

This would apply to both military and economic aid. What it means is that Department of State will have control over the Department of Defense military aid to foreign countries and the Economic Cooperation Administration's Marshall Plan aid. When the original Marshall Plan legislation was before Congress, Gen. George Marshall, who was then Secretary of State, wanted the program run by his department. Congress would have none of it. So ECA was set up as an independent agency. Paul Hoffman, its first head, was given cabinet status. Any differences between the State Department and ECA were to be settled by the President.

PAUL HOFFMAN and Secretaries Marshall and Acheson never had to go to the President to settle any disputes. But Mr. Hoffman insists that to get action, it was essential that ECA be kept a separate agency. This brings up the larger question of whether ECA should be continued beyond its original four-year life span, supposed to end in 1952. President Truman wants ECA retained as the permanent agency for administering foreign assistance programs.

There are strong arguments against it. Since it was created on assurances that its program would last only four years, those promises should be kept. It is even argued that it would be a great feather in the Truman administration's cap if it were to say in effect: "The original job of the four-year Marshall Plan has been concluded a year ahead of time. So—we now propose to abolish it. We have, however, a new problem in re-arming western Europe. We therefore propose that a new agency be set up for this job, and we will transfer to this new agency the Marshall Plan staff and the liquidation of its affairs."

The job of drafting new legislation to give ECA added authority for the economic side of military assistance has been a headache. Supervision of this task has been turned over to a committee of three, which has now been working on the problem over a month.

ON the committee are Charles H. Bonesteel 3rd for State Department, Col. George A. Lincoln for Defense and Ambassador C. Tyler Wood for ECA. While this looks like a predominantly civilian committee, all three were general staff officers during the war.

Colonel Bonesteel, a West Pointer, did much of the original work on MDAAP—the North Atlantic Pact, Military Defense Assistance Program. Colonel Lincoln, a brigadier general during the war, has been an instructor in social sciences at West Point since 1947. Colonel Wood, a New York stock broker in civilian life, is now deputy administrator to Ambassador Milton Katz for Marshall Plan operations in Europe.

Their present task is really to draft an omnibus bill which will put all foreign assistance programs in one package. It would allow for the meshing of the Department of Defense military assistance program with ECA's economic assistance and the infant Point Four program of aid for under-developed countries, now in the State Department.

Hard to Imagine Anybody As Good as Mickey Mantle

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Mickey Mantle walks with a slight limp. The Yankees' story-book 19-year-old was asked if osteomyelitis four inches above his left ankle ever gives him trouble. "Only when I play a double-header," replied young Mantle, "and go to a carnival and walk and stand around for two or three hours." The callow towhead was asked what he thought when he first saw Yankee Stadium.

"That was last September when the Yankees brought me in from Joplin," he said. "It looked easy to hit homers near the foul lines." He was asked how he felt opening the season with the Yankees. "I sure had butterflies in my stomach," he said, "but Joe took care of me."

He never takes his eyes off DiMaggio, and the Clipper keeps both bulbs on him. The entire Yankee club has adopted the big, smiling kid from the lead and zinc country. Mantle is the youngest player ever to perform with the Bombers, the first to hop directly from Class C.

It's difficult to imagine a young player as good as Mantle, but there he is in right field, and batting third, where swung the immortal Babe Ruth and Tommy Henrich. Mantle was a switch hitter at 10. "One of my grandfathers threw right-handed, the other left," he explains, "and they pitched to me. Switch hitting just came naturally."

STRONG BOY has twin 15-year-old brothers, Ray and Roy, reported to be as good as he was at that age. The line forms at the left. Mantle is the most muscular kid you ever looked at. You see the cords in his big neck when he swings. He has the arms of a blacksmith. He swung so hard at a ball in an exhibition game that he sprained his hand and the swing from either side of the plate is always identical.

You never saw a faster ball player. A tremendous threat now, he'll drive the other side nuts when he masters the art of bunting the ball away from the pitcher. Mantle hits anything near the plate. Ruth did that. Unlike Ted Williams, Mantle doesn't quibble about a pitch. He doesn't particularly care to be a perfectionist. He wants to knock in runs and win.

Rummans Says Mistaken Identity Made Him to Spend Time in Jail

LOS ANGELES, April 28 (UP)—Sport promoter Larry Rummans testified in his \$210,000 damage suit against millionaire oilman Glenn McCarthy that he once served six months in jail in "a case of mistaken identity."

Rummans was cross-examined by attorneys for the Texas oilman and hotel owner yesterday on his testimony that McCarthy beat him during an argument over a football bet and then held him prisoner in the Shamrock Hotel at Houston in 1949.

The promoter, who wants \$100,000 for the humiliation he allegedly suffered, said he also was a greatly humiliated by the jail sentence.

Defense Attorney George A. Kuittinen argued Rummans could not have suffered \$100,000 worth of humiliation by being imprisoned in the hotel after he already had served a jail term. Federal Judge James C. Carter ruled Rummans' attorney would have to show the court how the promoter's reputation or peace of mind was damaged by being held. Kuittinen questioned Rummans

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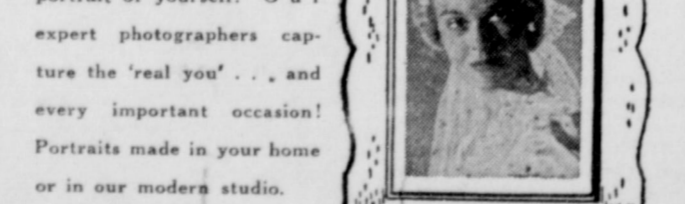

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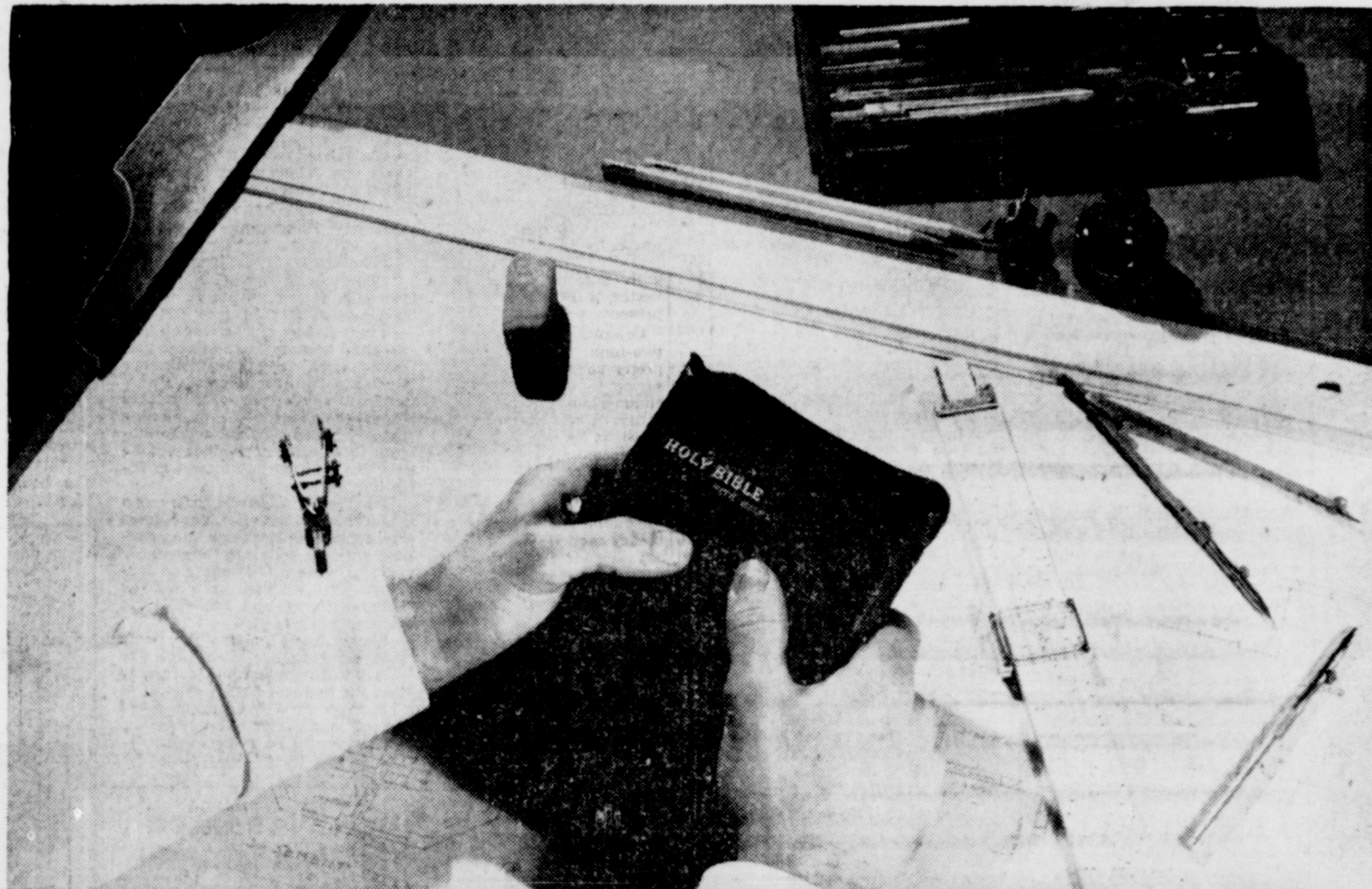

### Chinese Doctor and Wife Hard Put To Stay in U. S.

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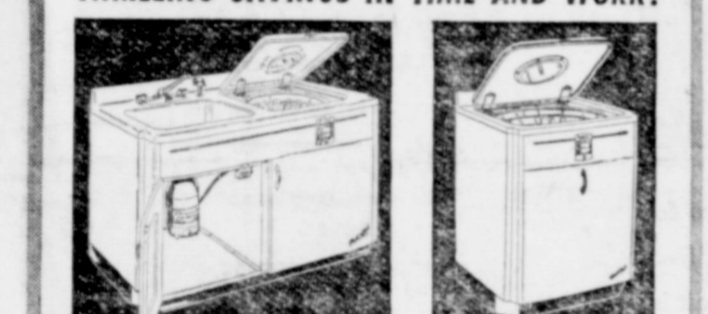
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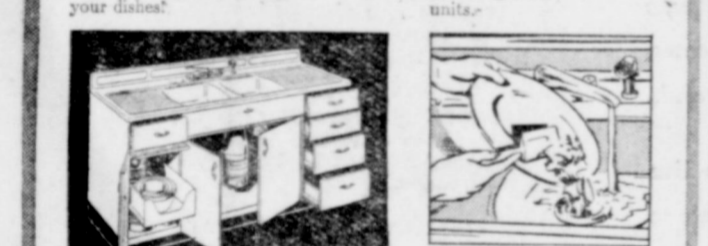
