through in Eastern Korea today. Troops of the U.S. 2nd Division gave ground only in one where flooding streams left 500 sector, where they were forced to fall back to protect their families homeless today, but diright flank

The massive human sea assaults of the Reds wavered during the day under terrible pounding of massed Allied artillery, but were resumed near evening.

New Communist attacks broke out around Seoul. Communist troops occupied abandoned Uijongbu, 11 miles North of Seoul, and sent patrols within six miles of the capital. They were stopped by barbed wire entanglements. Twenty miles Northeast of Seoul the Reds tried again chasing more than 200 families from their homes. Officials said nine hour battle.

The U.S. 2nd Division, killing Reds at the rate of 10,-000 a day, stabilized its lines after a 20-mile Communist breakthrough Friday.

High School Senior Is Arrested By Merrill Blosser As King Pin Of Marihuana Ring

HOUSTON, May 19 (UP)-Police and Federal Narcotics Agents announced today that they had cracked a marihuana ring with the arrest of several persons, including an 18-year-old high school senior who described himself as the "kingpin" of the group.

The youth, John Thomas Graham, was arrested in a school cafeteria yesterday, and agents then arrested five others, including two juveniles. Two others are sought.

Agents said the gang had been selling marihuana to Sam Houston High School students. All were arraigned today before U. S. Commisioner Ralph Fowler on federal charges of sale and possession of mar-

ihuana. Capt. George Seber said the crackdown followed a month-long in vestigation during which undercover men had purchased about 1,000 marihuana cigarettes from the ring.







Gulf Coast Is Full Of Plants

HOUSTON, May 19 (UP) — The Texas and West Louisiana Gulf Coast is studded with chem ical plants valued at \$750,000,000 according to a report prepared by Dr. F. A. Buechel, manager of the Houston Chamber of Commerce's ndustrial Research Department.

The report said another \$100,-000,000 is the value of planed expansion of chemical plants this year and next. The figures, Buechel said, don't include the \$80,000, 000 in construction or expansion of such plants as shell, carthage hydrocol at Brownsville and Ethyl

Thus ,the Gulf Coast Chemical Industry has invested, or will inrest nearly one billion dollars in plants and equipment, Buechel aid, adding that the total figure did not include investments in some related industries such as the \$80,000,000 Reynolds Metal Plant under construction at Corpus Christi, nor Alcoa's \$15,000,000 expansion at Port Lavaca, near
