Top shooters in the county 4-H trap shoot were Charles Johnson, Byron Neal, David Boozer, Steve Geris and Sharlet Johnson.

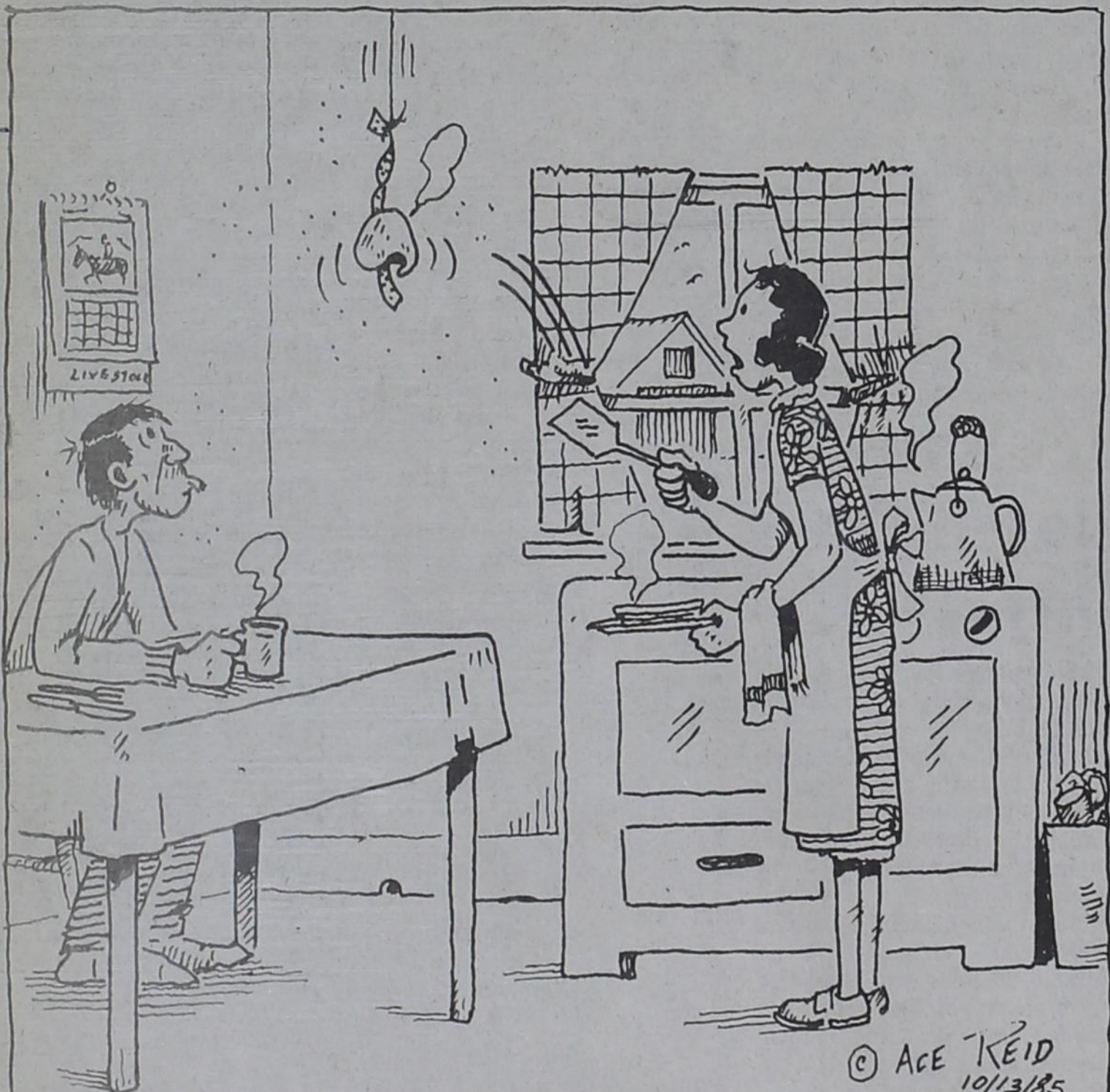
A youth summer recreation program is currently in progress at the Bovina High School Gymnasium.

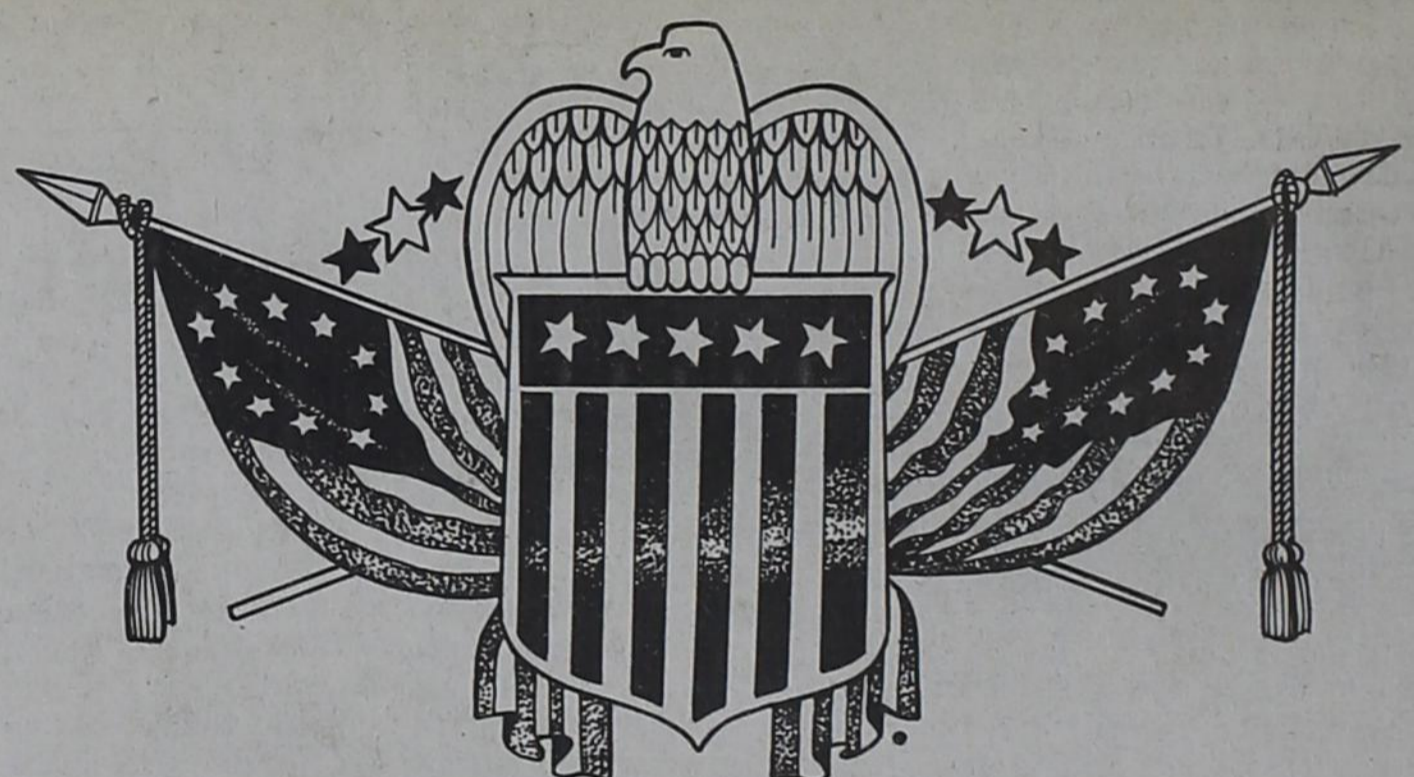

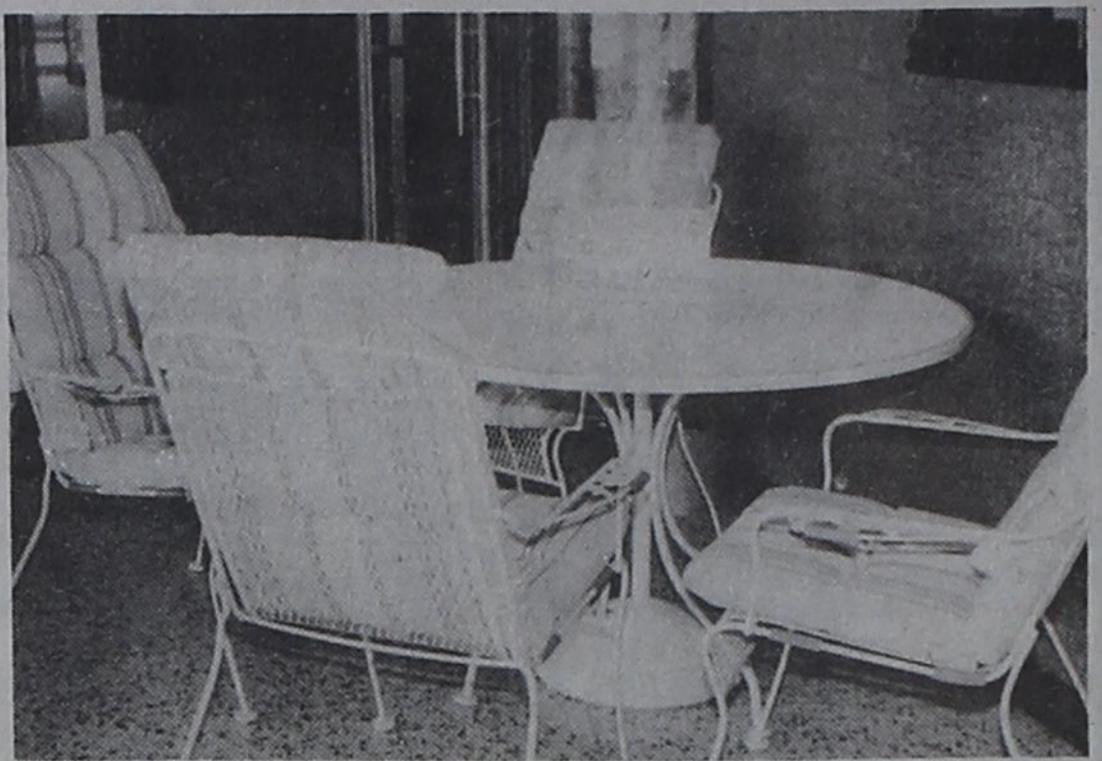

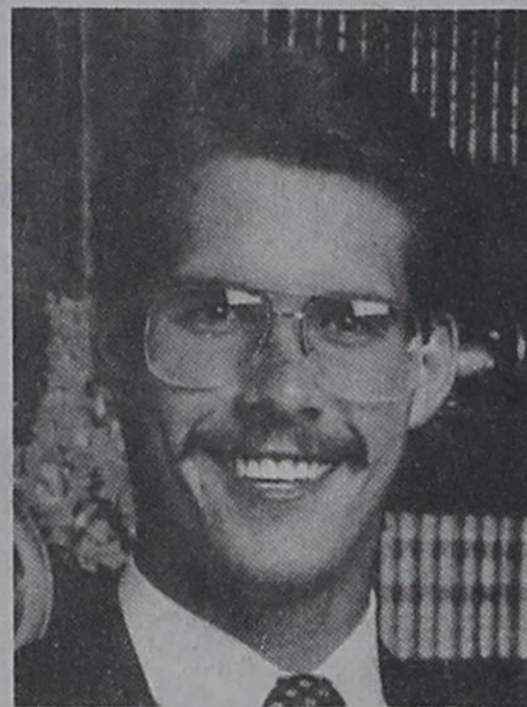

Co. Vets Receive Assistance

Porter Roberts, County Veterans Service Officer for Parmer County, has received an official report, through the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission, showing the amount of monetary benefits paid to the veterans residing in Parmer County for the fiscal year of 1988.

This information is released each year so the people of Parmer County can get an idea of some of the benefits received through the Department of Veterans Affairs by veterans, their dependents and survivors who live in Parmer County.

Most of these benefits are placed in immediate circulation, thereby providing a significant stimulus to the county economy. The amount of monetary benefits by category are as follows: compensation and pension, \$321,803; readjustment and vocational rehab, \$1,366; insurance and indemnities, \$41,599; with a \$364,768 total.

Three Franciscan Nuns came from Hereford to help with the Bible School and Sabina Schilling taught three and four year olds.

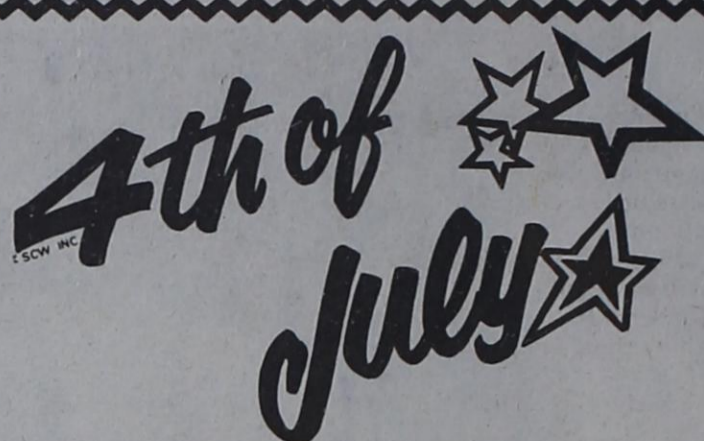

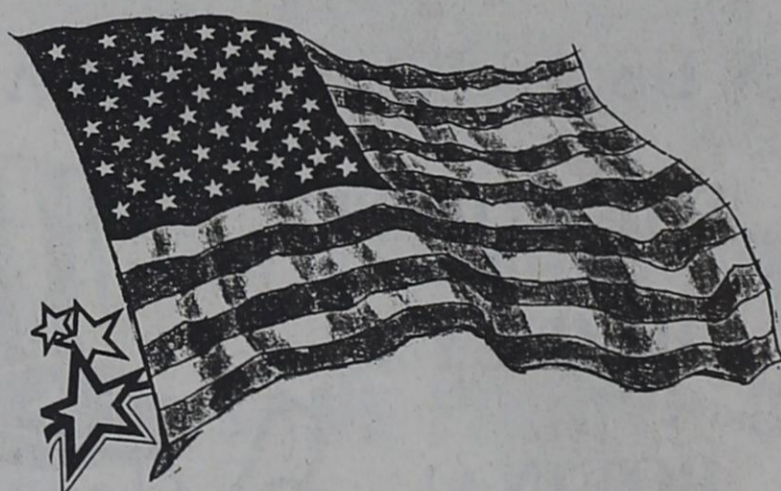

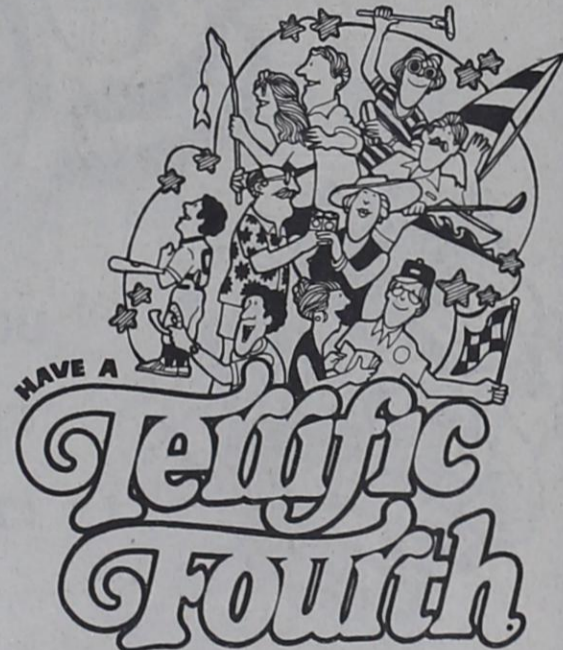

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Friday, June 30, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.

2. 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.

3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

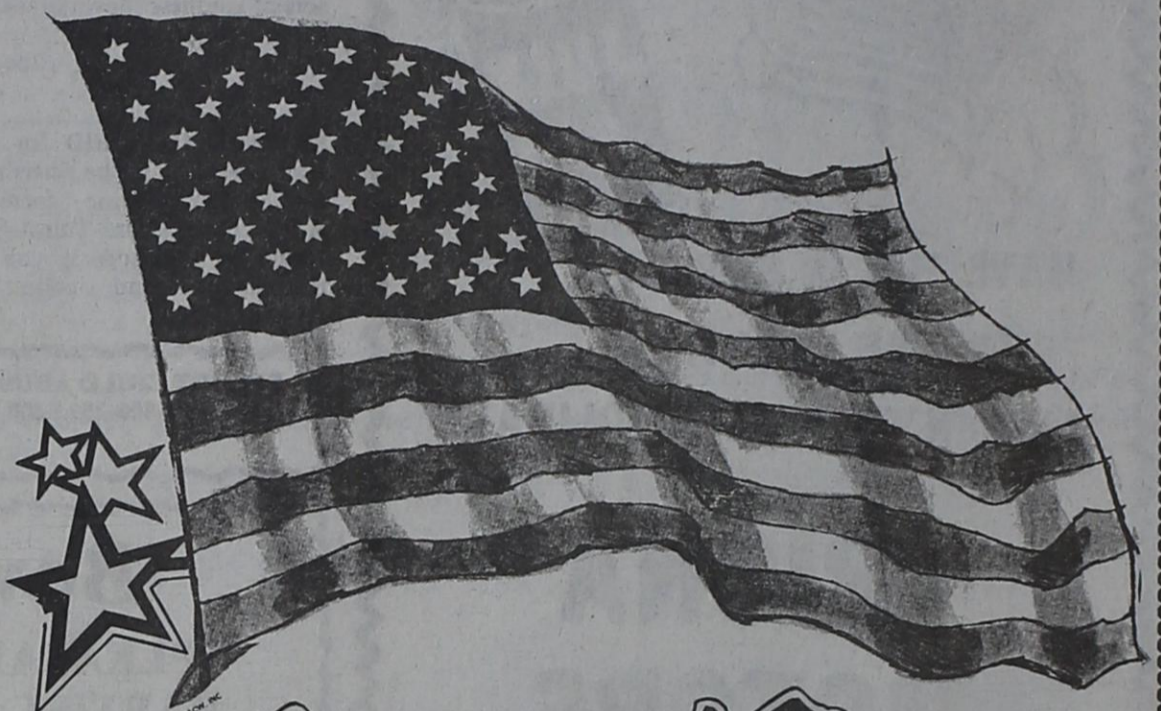
