Labor Leaders Predict Lax Wage Controls

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP) Labor leaders today predicted general relaxation of wage controls as a result of the wage stabilization board's move to tie pay boosts of the cost of living.

The new wage formula, still sub ject to approval by economic stabilcer, Eric A. Johnson, would llow workers to match any rise in the cost of living with a flate wage hike or a boost through an escalator clause, even if the increase pierted the 10 percent ceiling on wage boots.

Labor circles, with evident satsfaction predicted that the fluctuating cost - of - living ceiling boosts needed to offset the price increases they anticipated under the new controls law.

One labor spokesman said the new formula met labor's demand that "there must be a soft wage policy if we have a soft price policy." he added. However, Cat labor was more concerned on how the wage board interprets the new formula in specific cases.
