

Labor Leaders Predict Tax Wage Controls

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)—Labor leaders today predicted general relaxation of wage controls as a result of the wage stabilization board's move to tie pay boosts of the cost of living.

The new wage formula, still subject to approval by economic stabilizer, Eric A. Johnson, would allow workers to match any rise in the cost of living with a flat wage hike or a boost through an escalator clause, even if the increase pierced the 10 percent ceiling on wage boosts.

Labor circles, with evident satisfaction predicted that the fluctuating cost-of-living ceiling would open the door to wage boosts needed to offset the price increases they anticipated under the new controls law.

One labor spokesman said the new formula met labor's demand that "there must be a soft wage policy if we have a soft price policy," he added. However, that labor was more concerned on how the wage board interprets the new formula in specific cases.

For this reason, labor leaders were particularly pleased with the first board decision in line with the new formula which granted northern cotton and rayon workers a 6-1/2 percent wage increase—all of it over the 10 percent ceiling. The boost was made to match cost-of-living increases granted other textile workers who have an escalator clause in their contract.

The third annual Post Quarter Horse Show is to be held in connection with the rodeo on August 14th. Entries will close at 8 a.m. on the day of the show and judging will start at 9 a.m. All of the usual halter classes will be held as well as a performance class.

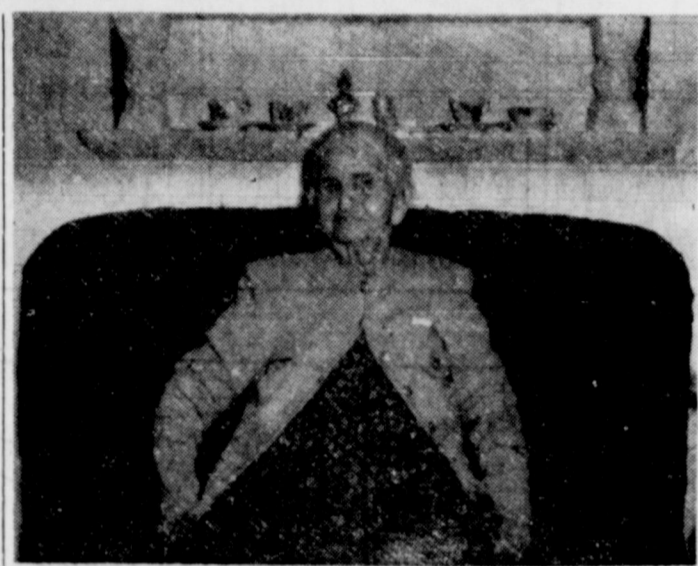
ADMINISTRATION RUNS INTO OPPOSITION ON FOREIGN AID

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)—A Senate storm built up today over administration plans to send farm machinery and similar equipment to underdeveloped areas throughout the world.

Chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex., of the Senate Foreign Relations committee complained that the administration was embarking on a "broader concept" in its point four program for backward regions than the state department originally had planned.

Sen. Guy M. Gillette, D., Ia., said that the administration's \$8,500,000 military-economic foreign aid bill was "very faultily drawn" and would permit President Truman to spend hundreds of millions of dollars at his discretion.

The father said he left her about thirty minutes in his car while visiting his brother at the airport. When he discovered her missing, employees at the airport searched 10 minutes and then heard the little girl's screams.

She was found naked in weeds on the north side of the airfield. "She was almost unconscious when I found her," said Mrs. Myrtle Jones, Oklahoma City. "She was bleeding all over."

Ridgway Calls Secret Meeting

TOKYO, Sunday, Aug. 5 (UP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway called a highly secret meeting of his top advisers late last night at his supreme allied headquarters in the Dai Ichi building and it was believed the 10-day deadlock in Korean cease-fire negotiations might be under discussion. The meeting still was in progress early today.

There have been hints for days that a break might be imminent in the deadlock over the fixing of a truce line.

Among those Ridgway called in, apparently suddenly, were Lt. Gen. Doyle Hickey, his chief of staff, and at least two other generals.

Army information spokesmen said when the highly secret meeting was first announced that a statement on it was expected momentarily. Later they said no announcement would be made.

O'Dwyer Demands Expose On Charge

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)—Senate crime investigators today studied Ambassador William O'Dwyer's demand for an "expose" of how he was implicated in a \$1,000,000 bank draft from the Mexican government, but seemed likely to stand on the State Department's explanation.

The former New York mayor, in a telegram from Mexico City, reopened his bitter feud with the crime committee last night by demanding that it uncover the sources which had first "interested" it in the report that the bank draft had been made out to his name in a New York bank.

The crime committee however, appeared ready to close its books on the case and recall its investigator after the State Department said that O'Dwyer's name appeared on the bank draft "in his official capacity."

The committee said that the department appeared to have explained the matter "satisfactorily" when it said that Mexico had made out the bank draft in O'Dwyer's name in payment for lend-lease goods. Later, the department said, the bank draft was cancelled at its request and made out to the U.S. Government in Mexican pesos.

There was nothing "extraordinary or irregular" about the affair, the department said, and "in no way did it deviate from accepted practices in such cases."

Immediately after the State Department explanation, O'Dwyer called upon the committee to reveal "the forces that started this story and interested you in it and procured circulation."

In a telegram to chairman Herbert R. O'Connell, D., Md., O'Dwyer charged that the committee participated in the "recent disgraceful lie imputing irregularity in my private affairs." He also criticized the committee for sending its chief counsel, Richard G. Moser to Mexico City.

Industrial Customers Of Lone Star Begin Paying New Tax

Industrial customers of the Lone Star Gas Company in Sept. will begin paying an additional nine-tenths of one cent for each thousand cubic feet of natural gas used.

The increased cost for gas service will affect more than 3,000 industrial and manufacturing plants and other large consumers throughout the Lone Star system in Texas.

M. L. Bird, operating manager for the company's general division of distribution, has sent letters to industrial customers in this area advising of the additional cost and pointing out that the rate hike became necessary after a gathering tax was imposed on the gas industry by the Texas Legislature at its 1951 session.

"In accordance with the provisions of our contract with you covering industrial gas service," Mr. Bird stated, "this tax will be added to your gas bill starting with our September, 1951 billing."

Bird also warned the larger gas consumers that "there is another even more serious matter confronting you relating to the cost of your gas service."

"This," he said, "is the proposed bill calling for a minimum price on natural gas at the well head,

COMMIES BREAK NEUTRALITY OF KAESONG CEASE-FIRE CAMP

UN ADVANCE BASE BELOW KAESONG, Korea, Aug. 4 (UP)—The Communists today blasted hopes for an early compromise in the deadlocked Korean truce talks by flatly refusing to back down on their demand for a buffer zone along the 38th Parallel.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, Senior Communist delegate, told Allied negotiators that he "could not depart in any particular" from his demand that the Allies fall back south of the pre-war frontier between North and South Korea.

Nam Il refused even to "examine a map of the area in question," a United Nations spokesman said.

The meeting carried the deadlock on the second item on the armistice agenda into its ninth straight day, but the delegations agreed to meet for the 20th time in Kaesong at 11 a.m. tomorrow (9 p.m. today EDT).

A UN correspondent asked Nam Il after the meeting whether he thought a truce agreement could be reached.

"I cannot give you an answer now," he replied in a barely audible voice.

Brig. Gen. William Nuckols, Official UN spokesman, said the two delegations were no nearer an agreement now than they were when they first tackled the question of a cease-fire buffer zone on July 27.

He said the UN delegates again flatly stated that they could not accept the 38th Parallel for a buffer zone because it was militarily indefensible.

Nuckols refused to comment on reports that the UN delegation is seeking a cease-fire line north of the present battle line to run between Pyongyang, the Red capital, and the east coast port of Wonsan, 80 miles north of the Parallel.

He said only: "The UN suggestions are very modest ones."

Reliable sources believed the Allies were seeking a cease-fire line north of the battle line to compensate for UN Air and Naval supremacy over all North Korea.

Chief UN negotiator Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy closed Saturday's brief meeting—it lasted only an hour and 10 minutes—with a charge that the Communists had violated the neutral zone around the conference city of Kaesong.

Joy did not enter a formal protest, but noted it only for the record. The Communists promised to investigate.

During the two-hour luncheon recess, Joy said, a company of Communist troops armed with automatic weapons, mortars, grenades, rifles and pistols passed within a few hundred yards of the staff house being used by the UN delegation.

AUSTIN, Aug. 4 (UP)—Madeleine Frances Evans, shapely strawberry blonde charged with impersonating a WAF Lieutenant, began her fourth day in jail today as she hopefully awaited freedom under \$1,000 bond.

The pert former showgirl and erstwhile non-scheduled airline stewardess fretted behind bars in the county jail yesterday as her telegraphed plea to an unidentified "friend" apparently went unanswered.

Her husband of 10-days, Sgt. Rufus Evans of Biggs Field, El Paso, was reported on official leave. However, his whereabouts were not known.

Madeleine was asked if she had any message for her husband.

"Tell him," she answered, "to get here—and get here fast."

The 26-year-old red head was taken into custody last week as she idled away an evening in the officer's club at nearby Bergstrom Field. Earlier, she had thumbed a ride in an air force plane from Biggs Field to Austin.

Madeleine treated the affair as a "joke." But military authorities declined to laugh.

Flooded Areas Get Housing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)—President Truman has signed legislation providing emergency housing aid for flood victims in Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma.

Mr. Truman also allocated an extra \$2,000,000 for the housing and home finance agency for relief in Kansas, bringing the \$3,275,000 the federal funds earmarked to help Kansas in the current emergency.

The new law authorizes the government to insure mortgages at 100 percent instead of 95 percent and to provide emergency housing facilities.

A reception followed the wedding and was held at the Wichita Falls Country Club.

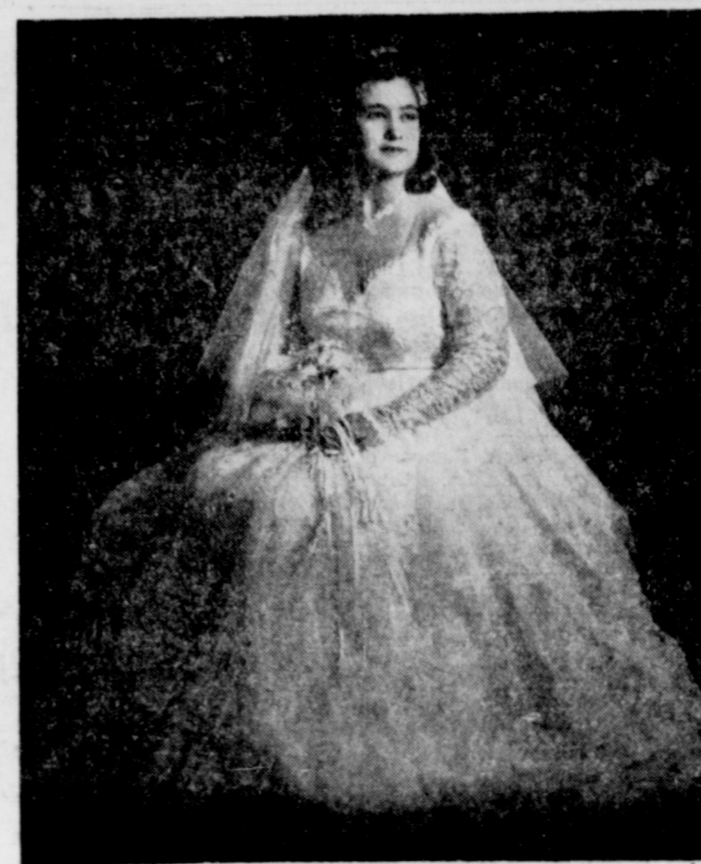

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Nine Texans On Casualty List

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (UP)—The Department of Defense today announced nine Texas casualties in the Korean area, including one killed in action, seven

wounded and one injured. The report also listed two men returned to duty after previous wounds, and another who has been returned to military control after being reported missing in action.

Killed was Cpl. Cecil V. Woodard, 1206 Locust St., Sweetwater. He previously had been listed as missing.

The wounded, all army personnel, were Sgt. I-c Gerald R. Adams of Yaleta; Cpl. Arturo Garza of San Benito; Pfc. Aldridge Kelley, 711 15th St., Plano; Sgt. I-c Robert G. Peterson of Wea-

therford; Pfc. Roosevelt J. Smith of Longview; Cpl. Lloyd C. Teal of Orange; and Cpl. Stephen P. Zduziencek of Fort Worth.

Army Cpl. Eldon L. Bridges of Crawford has been injured. Returned to duty were Pvt. Gilbert Cortez of Corpus Christi and Pvt. Joe E. Wallace of Henderson both army men previously wounded.

Pfc. James E. Brunswick, 3520 Ajax, Houston, has been returned to military control.

BALANCE SHEET OF COLD AND HOT WARS FOR THE WEEK

Balance sheet for the week between good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

GOOD NEWS

1. Britain and Iran agreed on a basis for a full-dress resumption of oil negotiations. Britain is sending a government mission headed by a cabinet minister, Lord Privy Seal and Works Minister Richard Stokes, to Tehran in what may be a final effort to reach an agreement that will keep Iran's oil—one-sixth of the world's production—flowing to the west.

2. The Russian people finally got a chance to read and hear an unvarnished version of what the western world thinks of their government and what life in a western country is really like. The official Soviet newspaper Pravda made good on its agreement to publish in full a statement addressed to the Russian people by British Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison and ran its reply alongside. Both statements have been picked up by other Soviet radio stations.

3. Unrest is growing in Russia's satellites. Reliable Yugoslav sources say the Communist regime in Bulgaria has arrested 200 high-ranking Reds in a desperate effort to retain control of the country. Twelve Polish seamen aboard a Polish Naval minesweeper mutinied and brought the vessel into a Swedish port to seek asylum. They said they were fed up with Communist government.

Release To Nips Give New Slant

TOKYO, Aug. 4 (UP)—A United States army release issued to the Japanese press three days ago said the United Nations would be justified in asking a cease-fire demarcation line half way between the present battle front and the Manchurian-Siberian frontier, it was disclosed today.

As translated from the Japanese, however, the release did not say specifically that such a line had been demanded by UN cease-fire negotiations in Kaesong. The release was issued by the Army's information and education service.

1—The UN Army now controls

the air and sea up to the Yalu River frontier line between Korea and Manchuria. The ground forces control terrain along a line which runs generally from Kaesong in the west to a point nearly 50 miles north of the 38th parallel on the east coast.

2—Therefore the military demarcation line should be midway between the Yalu-Tumen River line and the present battle line. (The Tumen River forms the border between Korea and Soviet Siberia.)

This demarcation would put the armistice line about 13 miles inside North Korea on the east coast and 75 miles inside on the west. It would include in UN territory that North Korean capital of Pyongyang.

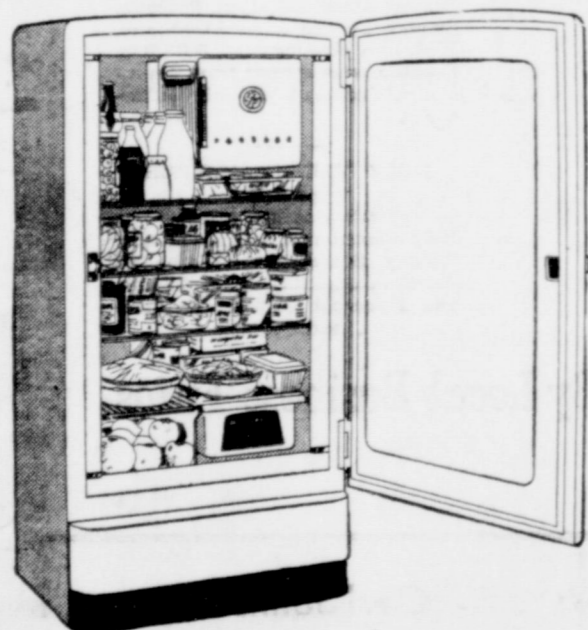

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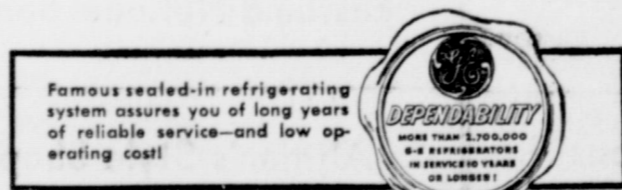
