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
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

THE NEW CONGRESS has accomplished a lot, and the Republican members have come exceptionally close to achieving their goals in their "First 100 Days Contract with America."

That is the feeling of Congressman Larry Combest, who reported to a few of his district's newsmen Thursday morning in a telephone conference call, following the passage Wednesday night of the nation's tax bill.

"I feel this has been a fairly historic time, and we have had excellent response from the American people. We have dealt with a number of controversial items, such as welfare, taxes, crime, a balanced budget, term limits and legal reform--things that in the past haven't even come up," Combest pointed out.

He hinted that the new majority in congress by the Republicans have allowed these things to be brought before congress, and that his party had been able to pass all of their bills except one (the balanced budget), and in that one, the vote was a majority, but it narrowly missed getting the required two-thirds majority.

There is no particular agenda for congress for the "next 100 days," Combest said. "We're going to continue with our same basic effort. Jima Monument. # **Smiths Report On** Washington Trip

**By SUEZY SMITH** Billy and I left Amarillo on March 11, 1995. When we arrived at Washington National Airport, Don and Myrna Lloyd picked us up. (Many of you know Don Lloyd, son of Sid, and the late Travis Lloyd. Don is a cousin of Billy's. Also, his wife, Myrna 'Downs' graduated with me. We had a wonderful reunion with them.)

It was late, no actually it was early in the morning, but Don and Myrna took us to the mall, located near the Capitol. For any of you that are not familiar with the term "mall" that is used in Washington, D.C., it is the grassy area in front of the Capitol building. It leads to a beautiful fountain, on to the Washington Monument, then to the Lincoln Memorial, and at last to the Jefferson Memorial.

This was a breathtaking sight. All the monuments, as well as the Capitol, are brightly lit. The lights are strategically placed so the Capitol and the monuments are such a beautiful sight to behold. At one place on the Capitol grounds, you see the three monuments and the Capitol all in a line. This was one of the first sights we saw from the air as we approached D.C.

They also took us to the Iwo and humbling sight. The Iwo Jima Monument is a statue of six Marines, all enlisted men, raising "Old Glory" during one of the bloodiest battles of World War II. The statue is a three-dimensional bronze that is six times life size.

on the grounds of the plantation. We even saw the room where Gen. Washington died. There was a gazebo built on the Potomac River so that Washington's friends could come see them by boat instead of traveling by land if they lived across the Potomac in Maryland.

On Sunday night, we went to visit my aunt. We stayed there the rest of the week and caught the Metro to see the sights we had not seen.

On Monday, we went to the National Air and Space Museum. We saw many of the famous early airplanes, one of The Spirit of St. Louis. We saw the inside of a space ship, satellites, early planes used for air mail, and one of the first commercial planes, built in 1924.

We went to one of the first Smithsonian museums. It was the Arts and Industries Museum. It contained many exhibits that were at the World's Fair in Philadelphia in 1876, during our Centennial celebration. One of the most impressive exhibits in that building was the pedal driven table saw. The table saw has not changed much since 1852 except now it has an electric motor.

Another enjoyable museum was the Museum of American History. This museum contained the tent of Gen. George Washington, the flag that was made by Betsy Ross and her helpers, the inaugural gowns worn by Jackie Kennedy, Lady Bird Johnson, Nancy Reagan, Barbara Bush and depicted several eras of American thought that any one from Texas history.

A huge African elephant, the world's largest stuffed specimen of this species greeted us as we entered the Museum of Natural History. There were many dinosaur skeletons, some of them were found in Utah, Oregon and Colorado. The Hope Diamond is on display at this museum. The Hope Diamond is the world's largest diamond. It is a deep-blue, 40-karat diamond surrounded by sixteen 1-karat diamonds. On Tuesday, Billy, one of my cousins, and I went to see more of the Washington sights. We went to Union Station. It is so large that the Washington Monument could be laid down and still have sixteen feet left inside the building. Inside Union Station, there were sixty-three restaurants. One hundred trains leave Union Station each day. This is the headquarters for Amtrak. From Union Station, we went to the Postal Museum which is next door. The city of Washington, D.C. wanted to destroy the old Post Office, the building that now houses the Postal Museum, but they found out that it would take more money to destroy the building than it would to renovate it. It is hard to understand why anyone would want to destroy such a magnificent masterpiece but if it was not for the citizens of Washington and the surrounding cities, the building would not be standing today. Next on our agenda was the Capitol building. This is a grand old building. We saw the great cast-iron dome that was completed during the Civil War. It is one of the largest domes in the world and weighs approximately nine million pounds. Constantino Brumidi painted the scene on the ceiling of the rotunda. The painting is 180 feet above the marble floor. This painting was completed in 1865. We were privileged to sit in the House Chambers and listen to some of the House members. We went to the Arlington buried. One of the most patriotic moments I have ever experienced is thousand acre plantation. The the changing of the guards at the

tombs of Martha and George were us proud to be an American.

On Wednesday, we went to the National Cathedral. It is perched atop one of the loftiest spots in Washington. It was finally finished in 1990 after beginning work on it more than 100 years ago. The building has many chapels that are used for weddings, funerals and baptisms, besides the huge sanctuary that seats at least 5000 people. This sanctuary is used for worship each Sunday. The stained glass used in the cathedral is as magnificent as any you have seen in pictures of the ancient cathedrals in Europe.

On Thursday, Billy and I drove up to Dover, Delaware. To get to Dover from Washington, D.C., we went to Annapolis, Maryland and over the Chesapeake Bay Bridge. This bridge is 21,286 feet. The land just past the Bay Bridge was farm land. There were lush fields of grain and very neat farm houses. The closer we got to Dover the more like home it looked. We finally saw one story houses again. In Washington and the surrounding cities, all we saw were apartment buildings, town houses, condominiums or three story houses.

While we were in Dover, we visited Jo Carol (Wiley) and her husband, Rudy Czeizinger. Many of you will remember Jo Carol, who was the niece of Katheryn Johnson, the owner of the City Drug on Main Street. Jo is also a cousin to Kathryn Gromowsky. Jo went to school in Bovina until 1959



I have never been to the Holy Land. Someday, in God's time, I will go. Velma and I heard a fellow minister say this past week that he had been blessed to go to Israel three different times.

"Each time," he said, "as I stood at Jordon's Calvary, the most likely site of Jesus' crucifixion, I stood transfixed with tears streaming down my cheeks."

"What shall I do, then, with Jesus who is called Christ?" Pilate asked. They all answered, 'Crucify him!"" (Matthew 27:22). How do you answer Pilate's question today? "What shall I do, then, with Jesus?"

Pilate tried to be neutral. As Roman governor of Judea, he did not want to put to death a man he knew to be innocent. But neither did he want to buck the powerful Jewish leaders who wanted Jesus dead.

To exonerate himself of Christ's blood, he attempted to wash his hands of the entire affair (v. 24). But his cowardice before the crowd sealed his true decision. He allowed Jesus to die.

When it comes to Christ and his death on the cross, there is no middle ground. We either believe Jesus is Savior and Lord, or, we do
