## **Arrest Of Man Behind Dallas Bombings Seen**

DALLAS, (Aug. 17 (UP) Officers cautiously conceded today that they may be close to the nastermind" behind the terroristic attacks against Negro-owned property in South Dallas.

The admission followed filing of arson charges yesterday against four men accused of burning a small home in the fringe area where 13 bombings and bombing at tempts have occurred.

The new cases brought to tight the number of men charged in the terroristic activities.

Arson counts were lodged a gainst Elmer H. (Red) White nanager of a Dallas liquor store Dowell C. Bailey, identified as a resident of the store building; Burl Foster, a truck driver and paint er, and T. D. Peacock, Jr., 24, Fort Worth ex-convict employed as a truck driver.

White and Bailey were charged with arson on Feb. 25, 1950, in the fire which damaged the frame home at 4518 Leland, in th bomb-hit neighborhood.

Foster and Peacock were charged with starting a second fire at the same house which destroyed it on March 3, 1950.

At the time of the destructive second blaze, Fischer had agreed a sale to Tennessee Germany, a Negro, and moved out.

None of the accused men lived the strained neighborhood and Riddle and Crowder said they apparently were "hired for the job, money from the same source

The officers said "some" of the new suspects made statements implicating themselves and the others in burning of the home.

GRANDBURY, Aug. 17 (UP) cient of 107, died claiming to the very end that he was the famous outlaw, Jesse James.

Dalton made headlines in 1948 when he announced that James hadn't been shot to death in 1883 at St. Joseph, Mo., as most everyone believed. No indeed, he said. man slain actually was one Charlie Bigelow.

# **DELEGATES LEAVE INFORMAL** MEETING IN VERY GOOD MOOD

United Press Staff Correspondent UN ADVANCE BASE BELOW KAESONG, Korea, Saturday, Aug. 18 (UP) - The United Nations and Communist commands opened informal negotiations on a Korean truce line in a friendly atmosphere Friday and hope for a compromise agreement rose sharply.

There were indications that both sides are prepared to make concessions in an attempt to end a three-week dead-lock on the line to be drawn between the UN and Red


