WE APPRECIATE the remarks this week by Senator John Tower, in his weekly newsletter from Washington, in regard to community newspapers.

In fact, we decided to share his remarks with our readers. (Senator Tower isn't running for office this year, so maybe we can get away with using his particular column.)

"This week (October 10-16) is National Newspaper Week. I would like to join my friends in the press as they observe the occasion with the theme 'A Free Press--Your Key to Freedom.'"

"A free press is guaranteed in the First Amendment of our Bill of Rights. The founders of our nation believed that it was an essential right--not for newspapers or their editors--but rather for the people. They realized that it was impossible for even the best-informed citizen to know first-hand of everything that happened in government. Only through newspapers, and later other forms of mass media, was it possible for citizens to keep track of their representatives and their government. It was essential that the press be free of government control if it was to perform this function.

"Newspapers thus have a proud heritage as guardians of democracy. Our entire system of government rests on the premise that an informed electorate will make decisions that lead to good government. Government officials have a primary obligation to keep their constituents informed, but must depend upon the press as the primary vehicle through which to meet that obligation.

"Throughout my 21 years in the U.S. Senate, I have been proud of my association with Texas newspapers. They have not always agreed with my actions. They have not always written stories the way I would like to have seen them written. But, by and large, they have been fair and have served their readers well. That is all that any public servant can ask.

"I would also like to say a word about community journalism. As communication and transportation have improved during this century, the world seems to have grown smaller. National news networks, nationally circulated magazines, easier travel and commuting have brought us closer together as a people. This has made us a stronger nation. Yet, we have lost some of our roots, our sense of community, in the process.

"Community newspapers serve a special role in helping people feel a part of their town as well as their nation. As I travel throughout the state, I see many towns in which the newspaper is a substantial factor in the preservation of a community's sense of identity. This is a valuable service, particularly in Texas where diversity is one of our great resources.

"So as a reader and a public servant, I would like to use the occasion of National Newspaper Week to thank the newspapers in Texas for their outstanding service, and for their unceasing dedication to their role in preserving our traditions of freedom and democracy."

Commission Has Friday Session

Mostly routine business was transacted by the Parmer County Commissioners' Court, which met on Friday, October 8, a departure from the court's regular Monday meetings.

Lawrence Kriegel of Bovina had visited with Judge Porter Roberts as to repairs and renovations made to the Bovina Neighborhood Center. Due to the work done, Kriegel asked that the rent to the building be increased. A motion was passed approving the increase of the county's share of the rent to \$86.00 per month effective January 1, 1983.

A request had been received from the Bovina Ambulance Service for certain equipment. Following a discussion on the matter, the item was tabled until the next meeting, for further study and consideration.

A motion was passed to allow the County Extension Agent for Agriculture to have repairs made to the county pickup, which are expected to help the vehicle's mileage. Benna Felts, County Treasurer, met with the court and presented the quarterly report of county finances. A motion was passed approving the report, and directing that it be published in the three county newspapers.

A motion was passed to pay boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$1100, which amount will be reimbursed to the county.

Short reports were made by the County Extension Agents, Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston, relative to the 4-H Club work underway in Parmer County.

After discussing other items of interest to the county, the court adjourned.

City Man Winner In Boat Event

A Bovina man, J.D. (Sonny) Roach, was a point-winner in the North American Model Boat Association's season standings.

Roach finished in second place in District 7 for the Hydroplane-type boats, after the final district race at Amarillo October 8-9.

The district in which Roach competes is made up of five states, Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas.

Racers amass points in each of the six races conducted during the year. Roach also competes in two other classes in the association's events.

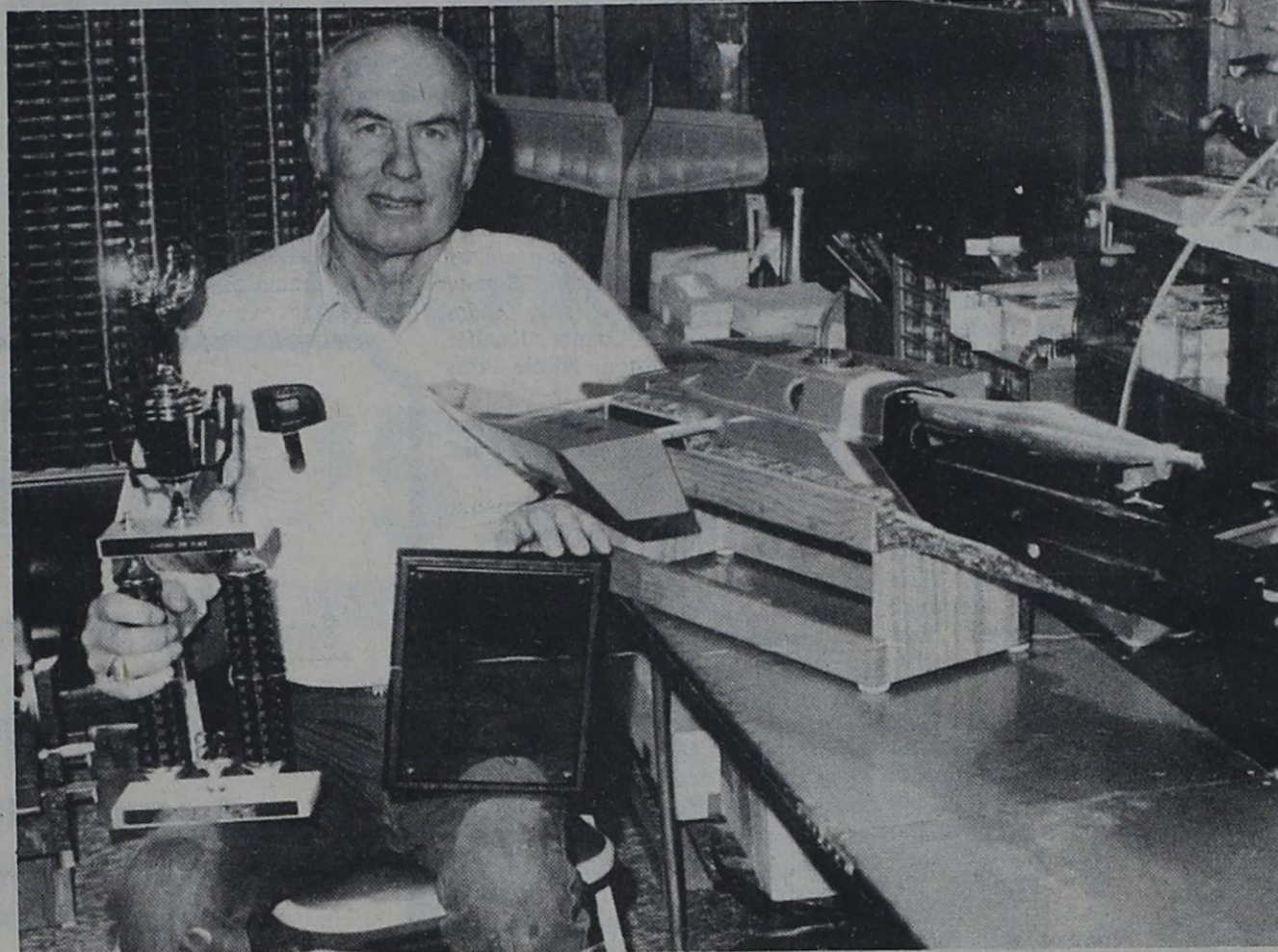
Model boats have been Roach's number one hobby for the past five years. He says he has been a model airplane buff for the past 25 or 30 years. "But I like the competition better with the boats," he says.

Roach had been in first place much of the year, until experiencing some hard luck in a meet at Andrews. But he recovered to hold on and win second place honors, which was rewarded with a sizeable trophy and a plaque.

The association races are held throughout the five-state district, and usually take up two days on the weekend. Roach says he has developed a number of friends from the association. He formerly raced full-sized boats, and this contributed to his interest in the model racing.

The meets draw over 100 entrants from across the five-state area.

Ponies Host S-E In Friday Action

The Bovina Mustangs will try to get back on the winning track when they host the Springlake-Earth Wolverines Friday at Mustang Field. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

"We know what we have to do now. If we win our last four games, we'll make the playoffs. At least we're still in control of our own destiny," said Coach Larry Helton this week.

Springlake-Earth is also a team backed into a corner, after the Wolverines lost to Olton, 35-0 last week.

Coach Helton warns that that score was deceptive, as Olton took advantage of numerous breaks, and had only a couple of drives in the game.

The Wolverines have a 3-3 season record, holding wins over Amherst, Sudan and Hale Center. S-E dropped decisions to Anton, Shallowater and Olton in the district opener.

The Wolverines have 15 returning starters from 1981 when S-E posted a 4-6 record. The outstanding player on defense is Danny DeLeon, a 175-pound linebacker who averaged 15 tackles per game in 1981 and was named to the all-district team.

DeLeon also is runningback on offense.

Lorenzo Monreal is another two-way starter at tailback and safety, and is described as a "tiger" on defense. He is a threat to gain 1,000 yards rushing this season.

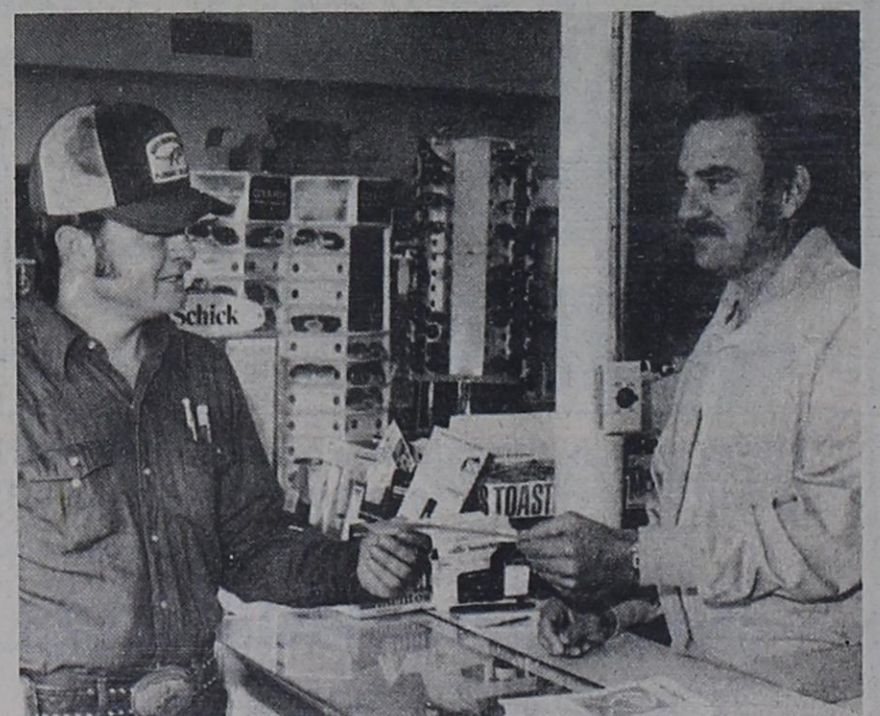
Monreal is helped by the blocking of 205-pound senior tackle Rocky Lunsford, who is all-district material.

"We expect a very tough game. There is not an easy team on our schedule the rest of the way. Every team in the district looks to be about even, so we have our work cut out for us. But we had a good workout on Monday. I told the boys we need more intensity, and I think they'll be ready to bounce back," Helton said.

DPS Investigates Seven Wrecks In County

Sergeant Billy Don Scott, Area supervisor of Parmer County, reports that for the month of August the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of seven accidents in this county.

There were two injury accidents

with a total of two persons injured and five property damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 217 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol. Highway Patrol Captain Bob

Russell reports that the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated ten fatal accidents with a total of 13 persons killed, 79 injury accidents with a total of 135 persons injured, and 128 property damage accidents.

The Grand Prairie office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays, to accommodate applicants.

The office in Lubbock reopened on Tuesday, October 12 and have revised hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays until further notice. The location will remain at 1611 10th Street, Suite 200, Lubbock, Texas 79401. The telephone number for the Lubbock office is (806) 762-7481.

Halfback Robby Armstrong of the Steers had a super game, pacing the Farwell running attack which amassed 422 yards rushing.

Armstrong scored the game's first touchdown in the first quarter and Raymond Sierra kicked the PAT, for a 7-0 Farwell lead.

The Mustangs came back with quarterback Dale Gilbreath punching the ball in from the one on a keeper play to climax a Bovina drive. Jose Gomez' PAT kick tied the score at 7-all.

Farwell quarterback Alan Eubank scored a touchdown for the Steers from a yard out in the second quarter, and Sierra's kick gave the home team a 14-7 lead. But Bovina runningback Richard Shepherd scored on an 11-yard run and Gomez kicked the point for a 14-all score, that turned out to be the halftime score.

Gilbreath scored for Bovina on a three-yard run in the third quarter, and the Mustangs made a conversion for a 21-14 lead.

Farwell halfback Paul Fulcher scored from four yards out in the third quarter, but a missed conversion attempt left Bovina still in the lead at 21-20.

But the Steers kept their running game going, with Eubank scoring twice in the fourth quarter to climax Farwell drives.

After Eubank's first TD, which gave Farwell a 27-21 lead, Bovina had a good drive going, only to fumble the ball away, and Farwell responded with the clinching touchdown and the final margin of 33-21.

"I don't think Farwell's a two touchdown better team than we are, and feel that if we played them again, we'd have a good chance of beating

them. They just were a better team than we were Friday night," Helton admitted.

The Bovina coach said his team never could take charge in the game, and found themselves playing a defensive game and having to "hold on."

He said the team came out of the game in good physical shape. There are some nagging injuries, but nothing serious, Helton said.

"We'll bounce back. We have our backs to the wall now, and have to win the rest of our games in order to get into the playoffs. I think the kids are ready to make up for the loss," the Bovina coach said.
