

## For Korean Truce Talks LIAISON OFFICERS WILL TO WORK ON NEUTRAL ZONE

TOKYO, Oct. 8 (UP)-Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway today accepted a Communist proposal to resume the suspended Korean truce talks at Pan Mun Jom, five miles southeast of Kaesong. The supreme United Nations commander notified the

Communists that he is instructing his liaison officers to meet Red representatives at 10 a.m. Wednesday (8 p.m. Tuesday EST) to make the necessary arrangements. The Red commanders yesterday had reluctantly sug-




