

The UN command demanded that the Reds agree to reduce the five-mile neutral zone around their truce camp in Kaesong to one of 3,000 yards, such as the southeast of Panmunjom.

The five-mile zone was agreed upon for Kaesong when the truce talks opened there last July, but the UN command said it no longer should prevail now that the talks are to be moved south into "no-man's-land."





THE WATER PROBLEM

Eastland's water problem has reached the acute stage It is no longer a joking matter, and something must be done, and done immediately. Of course there are those who will tell you that there is nothing to cause alarm. But maybe they are wrong-then what?

No city is more secure than it's water supply. Water i one essential. We must have it to live, for it is as necessary as food.

Water is necessary for protection. A waterless fire de partment would be just about as efficient as a one-legged man in a foot race, because either the fire department or the runner would be defeated and counted out before act ivities began. Health must be considered, too. A city with out an adequate supply of pure water is fighting a losing battle.

From an industrial point of view, water is essential. I takes water to drill oil wells. It takes water for boilers and other things in a manufacturing plant, of which there are several in our city. It takes water for cattle brought to thi city's weekly sales. It takes water to beautify lawns, I takes water for us to live. Without it we would perish!

Right now water is being rationed in Eastland, and peo ple are getting a fraction of the amount they desire. Un less it rains in the very near future they will be getting less, and finally no water at all

Something must be done! Action is necessary!

Two or three plans have been mentioned, though noth ing definite has been done. Suffering is to follow if this continues

Maybe the old lake can be enlarged an dimproved. With early rains this would afford temporary relief, and this work should probably be done as it seems the quickest way to get relief

But being only temporary and inadequate we should b looking into the future. There are other days coming. Wat er is something that will always be in demand. It's a neces sity here and a necessity in every community under the canopy of heaven.

A few wells filled with salt water won't help. Artesian water seems to be out of the question, so it seems that we have only one final choice, and that choice is the construction of a lake with sufficient capacity to care for all our needs for years to come. This is West Texas, and while the greatest country on earth, does have its occasional drouth.


