THE PLIGHT OF THE farmer has been much in the news lately, especially in light of the filibuster by farm state senators which held up the confirmation of Edwin Meese as Attorney General.

President Reagan in his first news conference of the year referred to the plight of the farmers, and the willingness of his administration to lend a helping hand.

But the problem with all of this was underscored by former congressman Kent Hance in a speech in Amarillo this past weekend.

According to Hance, little help can be forthcoming from the government, simply because few people involved in politics actually understand agriculture. He pointed out that fewer than 83 members of congress represent agriculture.

Hance added that in his personal opinion, he didn't see a lot of help for the farmers in the current farm bill being debated in congress. "It has been three or four decades since anyone in the administration understood agriculture," the former congressman said.

Hance said that supply controls are needed to help answer the farmers' problem. Credit is not the answer to agriculture's problem, he said--only a price for their product will yield a solution.

A good price for commodities also will help ease the national deficit because at this time farmers are so broke they are not paying any income taxes. Hance reminded that money turns over seven times in the agricultural industry when things are going good; but when farmers are doing little spending, there aren't as many dollars to "turn over."

The Dimmitt native brought up a plan which he and Congressman Charles Stenholm proposed in 1981 for the farm bill. They advocated a loan price tied to set aside, which, he said, would encourage more people to participate.

The former congressman explained that set aside is needed "because government action has kept us from having a free market." The Federal Reserve Board's tight money policy has made the dollar so strong that other countries can't afford to buy our products, Hance said.

Hance added that work needs to begin with the trade policy because a policy which allows other countries to put quotas on American goods without any reaction on our part is no good.

A reciprocal trade policy was the solution advocated by Hance--one that would take the average tariffs and, if one country lowered the average by a certain percentage, the other would follow suit.

"The trade policy of today is set in such a way that we can't participate throughout the world," Hance concluded.

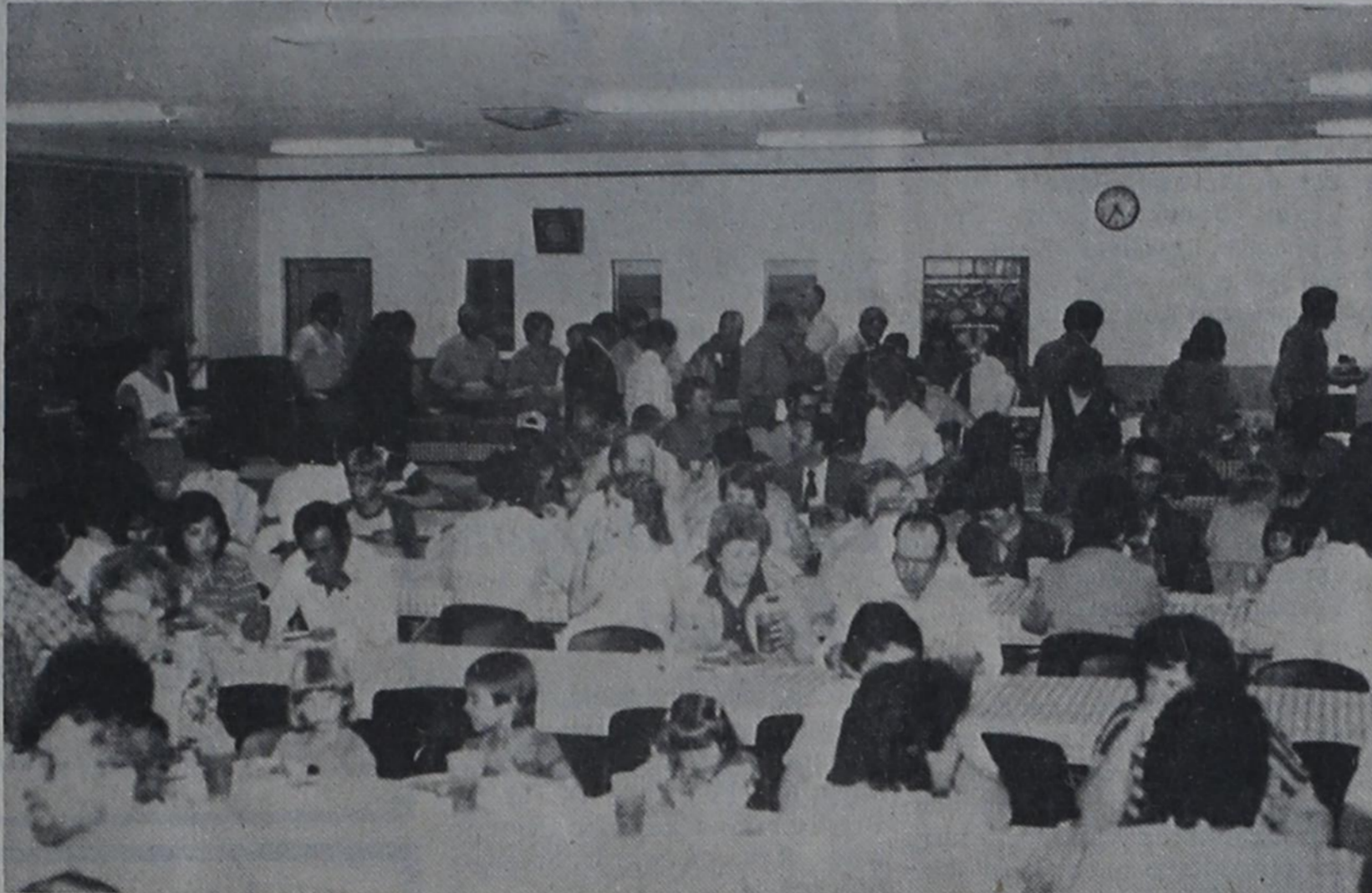
Police Report

Court Revises Stand On School Money

In a surprise move in an early session, the Parmer County Commissioners reversed their decision from the previous meeting to divide the permanent school fund among the county's four schools.

County Attorney Charles Aycock met with the court to discuss possible problems involved in dividing up the fund, and

advised the court that in his opinion the court should reverse its decision.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ernest Anthony, seconded by Robert White, and passed by a 3-1 vote (with Commissioner Tommy Williams opposing), to reverse the decision on the permanent school fund, until a written opinion is received

from the state attorney general's office, at which time the request to divide the money will again be considered.

The court was meeting early so that its members could attend a state meeting for county judges and commissioners at Texas A&M the week of February 25-March 2.

In other matters, L.E. Opperman met with the court to discuss the possible leasing of the county's school land in Gaines County.

After some discussion, a motion was passed unanimously to advertise for bids to lease labors 8 and 9, league 315 in Gaines County. The bids are to be opened on March 25 at 10 a.m.

A motion was passed to pay Hale County \$115 for holding a hearing in a mental case which involved a Parmer County resident.

A request for help on a funeral expense was denied, due to the court's guidelines as to the type of situation in which the county can participate in funeral expenses.

Another citizen had requested financial assistance to visit John Sealy Hospital once a month. After some discussion, this request was also denied.

Soil work was approved for the Thomas Rhodes farm in Precinct 2, and the farms of Duane McDaniel, Dee Brown and Doyle Wier in Precinct 3. This work is to be done by county machinery when it is not in demand for working on county roads. Expenses involved are paid to the county by the individuals.

Hernandez, Bovina's Chief of Police, has expressed his appreciation for all the help and support of the captains and those working in the various zones. A special thanks was given to Norma Whitten, who has spent her time putting up signs, calling people for

the meetings and providing a place for the meetings.

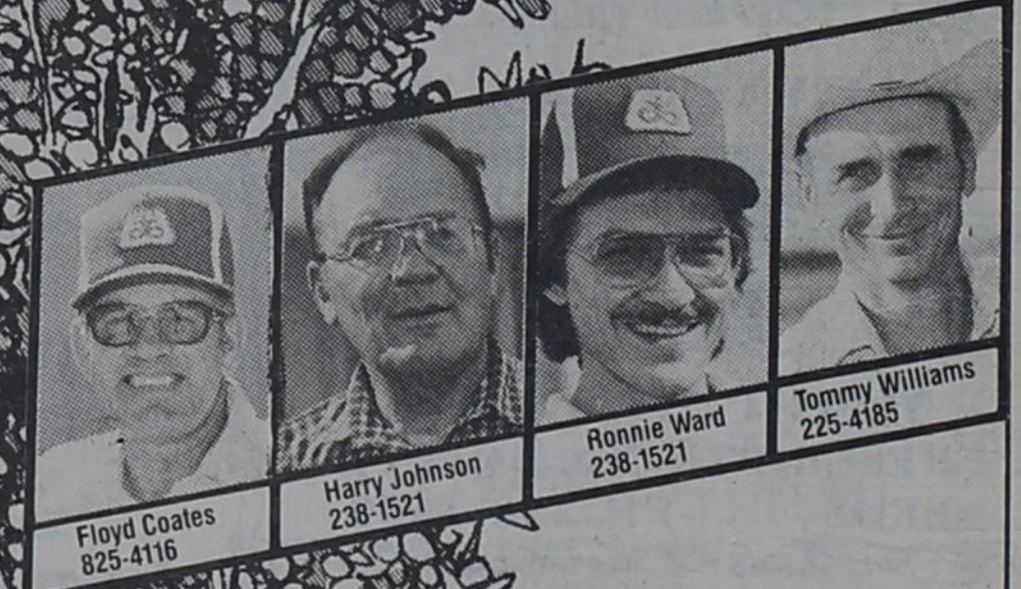

McClaran is a freshman at ACC and is majoring in computer science.

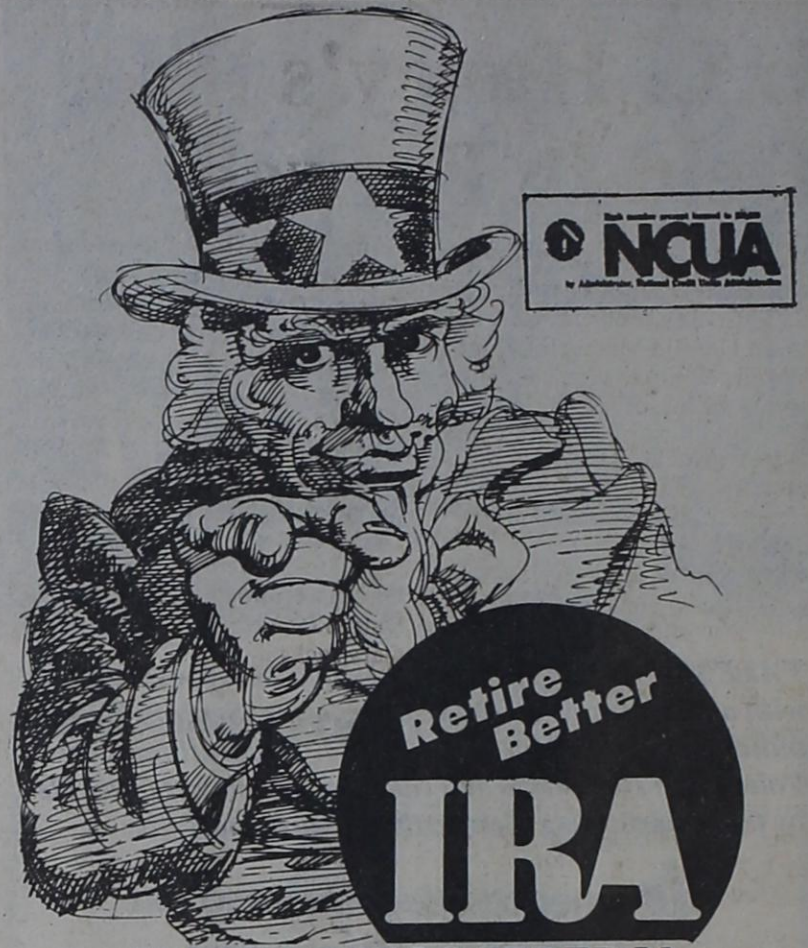
Rains On Advisory Council
