If this should happen, then the selection of our next president would be passed to the U.S. Congress, and the decision would then be made by a few hundred representatives, rather than the electorate.

This is a danger that people need to be aware of when casting their vote come November. It is one thing to cast a protest vote, but it would be something else entirely, to offer the congress the chance of selecting our president.

County OKs 1981 Budget

The Parmer County Commissioners approved the county's budget for 1980-81 during a hearing Monday in the County Courtroom in Farwell.

The new budget is in the amount of \$1,067,334, which is an increase of just \$18,883 over the current year's budget.

Bernie Gowens, the county auditor, went over the proposed budget line by line and explained the various funds, how they are arrived at; what the expenses are expected to be for 1981, versus the income.

The ad valorem taxes will be increased some 66 2/3 per cent, due to inflation which has snowballed in recent years.

County Judge Porter Roberts explained that the county had been allowing for inflation in recent years by using from the county's surplus funds in recent years. Now, these funds have been depleted, and in addition, the county has lost an annual payment from the lateral road program, and may not receive revenue sharing funds this year.

Despite the raise in the tax ratio (from 15 per cent of fair market value to 25 per cent), the county will still have to transfer some \$180,000 out of its right of way funds in order to have a balanced budget.

The 1981 budget provides for very few capital improvements, but does provide for salary raises of approximately 15 per cent for county employees, whose salaries have been sadly lagging behind comparable counties.

Only three county citizens showed up for the budget hearing. "We will be glad to discuss this budget at any time with any citizen. We hated to increase the tax ratio, but it was necessary if we carry on the county's work that has to be done," stated a member of the commissioner's court.

Commissioners Have Routine Business

Mostly routine business was conducted at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday, September 8.

A motion was passed to pay the expenses for a court reporter from Lubbock in the amount of \$216 from a recent docket call.

District Attorney Jack Young and special investigator Dick Pylant met with the court to discuss assistance for Pylant's salary, which had previously been paid from state funds which have now been discontinued.

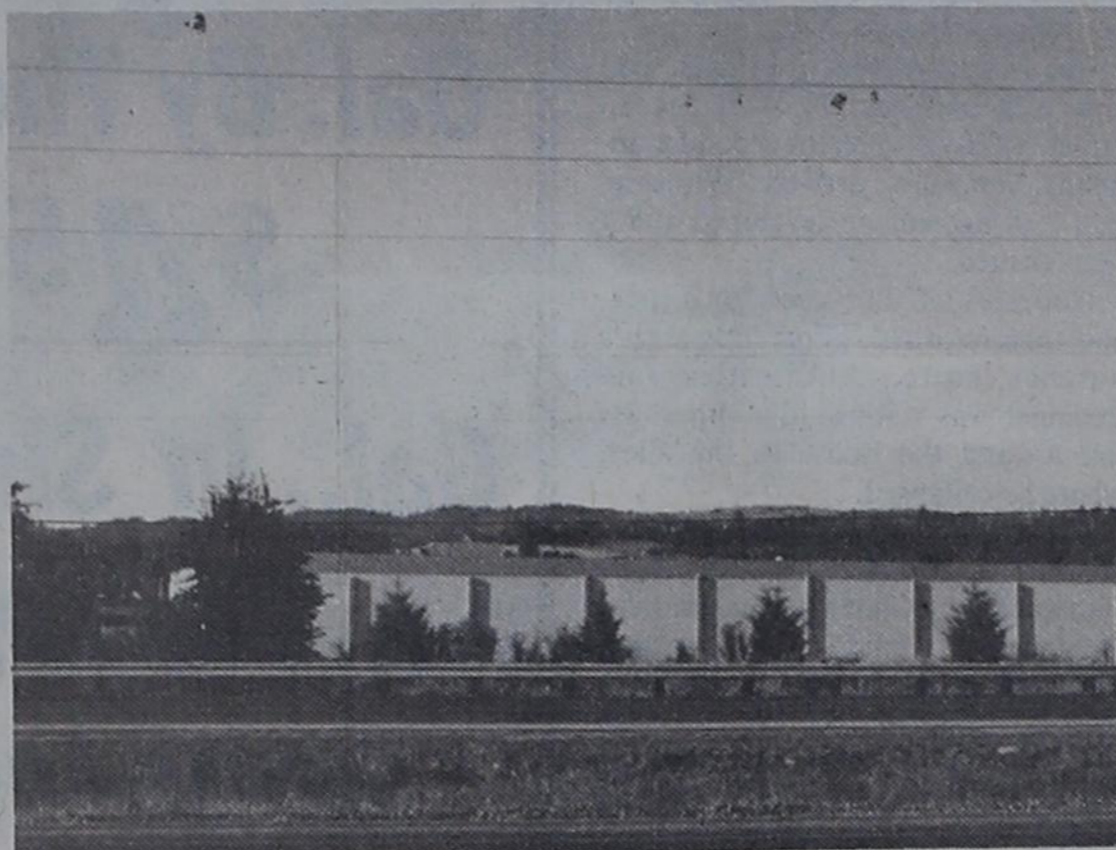
It was proposed that the investigator's salary be shared by Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties, according to population. Parmer County's share will be \$126.21 per month, beginning October 1, 1980. Motion was passed accordingly.

Payment of two small bills for boarding a county foster child, each in the amount of \$12, was approved.

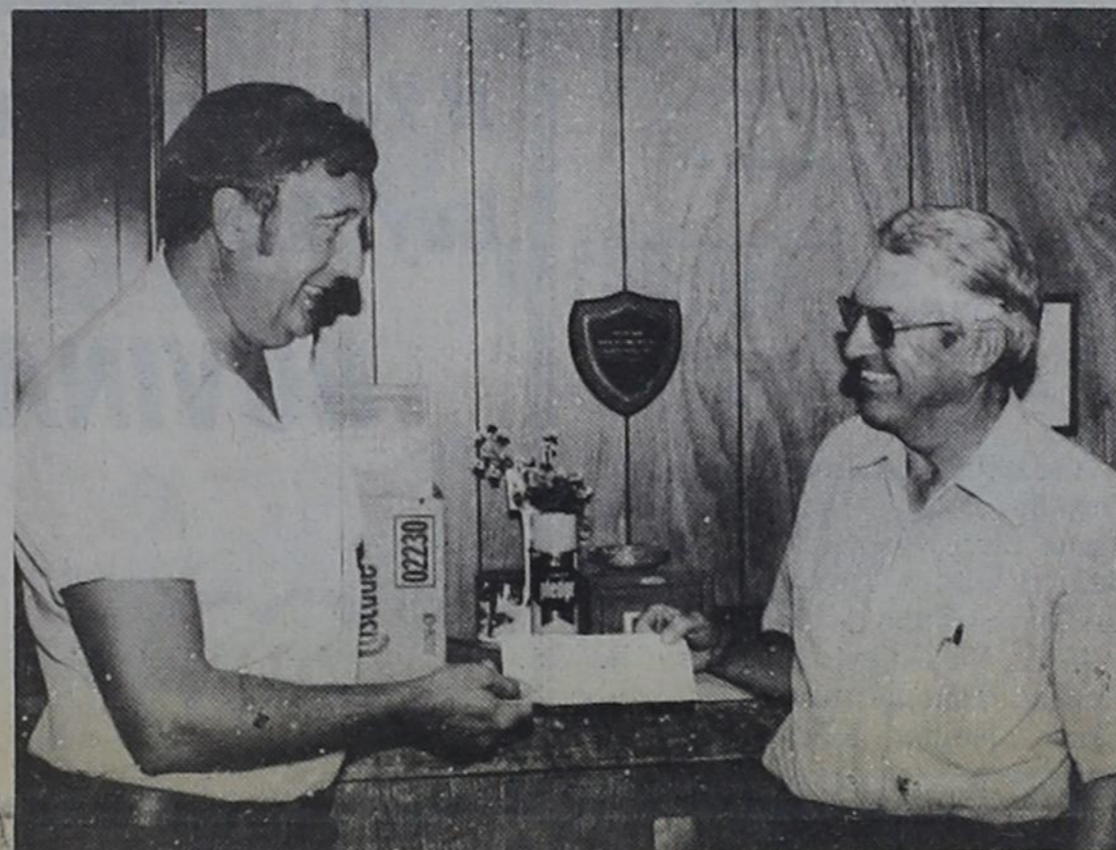

The "Goals and Objectives" for the Bovina Independent School District were adopted.

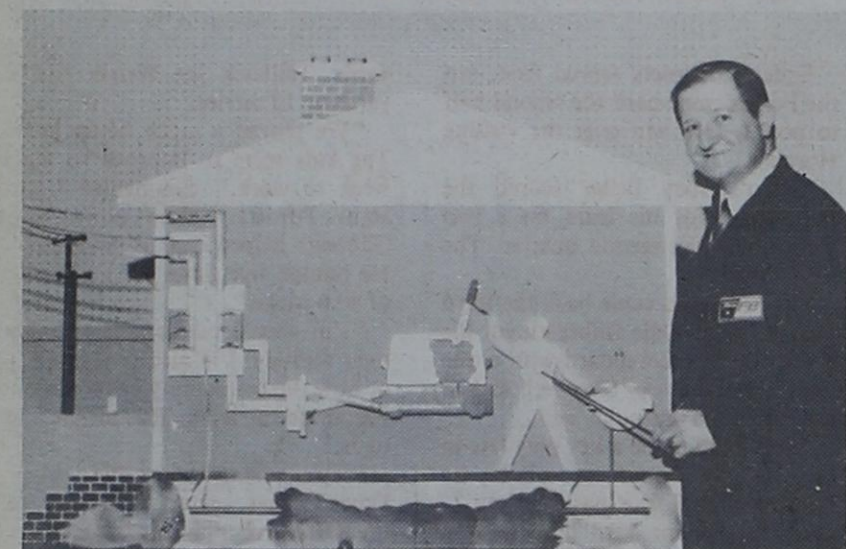

PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA

PROPOSICION NO. 7 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #121 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a los condados con una población de 5000 o menos, que construyan y mantengan caminos privados cobrando razonablemente por el trabajo. Por ley, la Legislatura puede limitar esta autoridad. Resolución Conjunta #36 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que cambie la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación del Estado. La enmienda cambiará el título de los Jueces Asociados de la Corte Suprema a Jueces, y requerirá que los miembros de la Corte Suprema sean abogados con licencia del estado de Texas mientras permanezcan en el puesto.

PROPOSICION NO. 9 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #54 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que define la propiedad que posee cualquiera de los cónyuges como separada, incluyendo las dos clases—de bienes raíces y los bienes inmuebles—los tales fueron propiedad de alguno de los cónyuges antes del matrimonio o fueron adquiridos después como un regalo, ya sea un legado de bienes raíces, o de descondonación. BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSICION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate un-manned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

PROPOSICION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pre-trial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

PROPOSICION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

PROPOSICION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

PROPOSICION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

PROPOSICION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

PROPOSICION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

PROPOSICION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

PROPOSICION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

PROPOSICION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

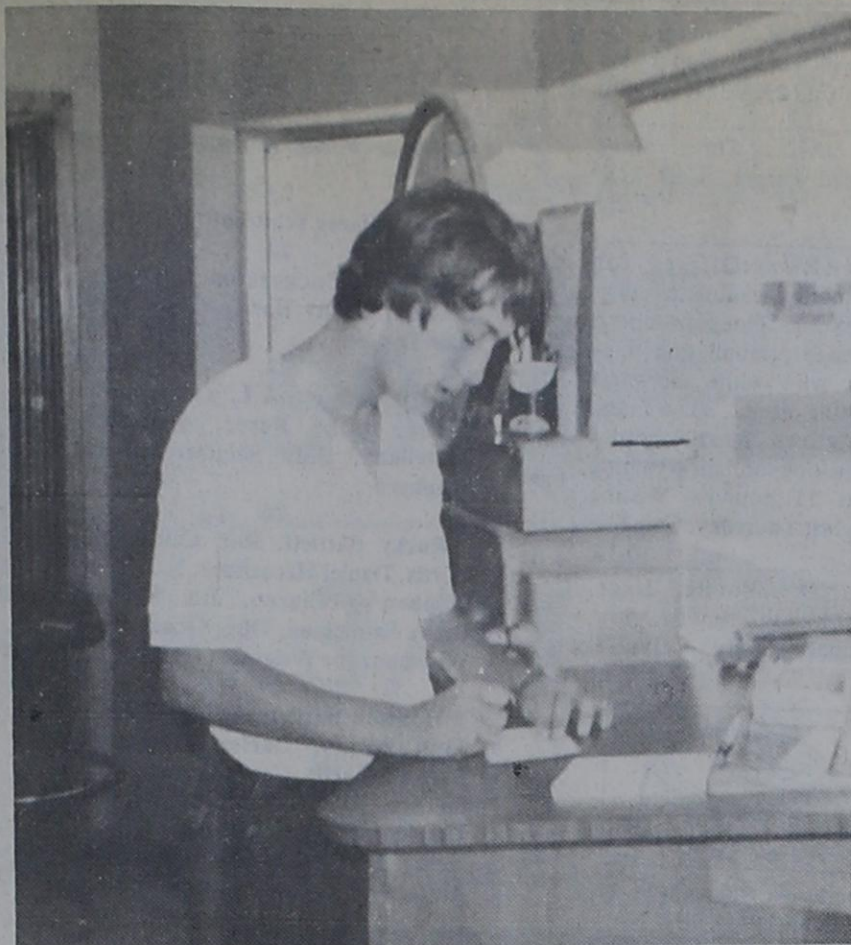

Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

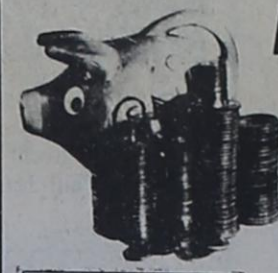
She died at 7:45 p.m. Monday, September 8, at Twin Cedar Nursing Home in Post after an illness.
