metal but said it was worthless. He said he had taken it because he "just wanted something for shucks. Bark on trees is a little a souvenir."

"It's a minor molehill and they are making a pretty big mountain out of it," Mathews said after his release here.

He said he couldn't reveal details of the incident "because of security regulations." He declined to say just where the uranium was obtained or what job he had at the atomic plant.

Mathews holds a degree chemical engineering and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tandy S. Mathews of Sand Springs. His father is an accountant, with offices in Tulsa, and his mother is an employe of a Tulsa department store.

Uuranium, regarded in recent years as one of the world's most precious metals, is used in manufacture of atomic weapons. Federal officials would not say whether the metal is processed uran-

Information and facts pertaining to the Special Election to be held in Eastland County on November 13th for the Re-Allocation of Constitutional Taxes.

Our Constitutional tax levies were written into the Texas Constitution prior to 1900. These tax levies produce the operating funds of your county, and are now as follows: Jury Fund .15 cents; Road and Bridge Fund .15 cents; Permanent Improvement or Building Fund .25 cents; and General Operating Fund .25 cents.

Since 1900 many changes in the various costs of operating a county government have taken place. Consequently adjustments in these tax levies for Eastland County are necessary to operate its government with more efficiency. The Jury Fund, out of which the jurors and other court cost are paid, does not need the full .15 cent tax. Likewise the permanent or building fund does not need the entire .25 cent tax. In recent years the Legislature has enacted laws which have added to the tax burden supported by the Road and Bridge Fund and the General Operating Fund.

The present state laws permit changes in these constitutional tax levies for a period of 6 years if voted by the property owners of the ounty. In view of these laws and in view of the need of the adjustments in the tax levies the Commissioners' Court has called a Re-Alloaction Election for November 13th.

Therefore, the Re-Allocation Election merely gives your Commissioners' Court the authority to re-arrange the operating tax levies of the county for a period of 6 years. THESE CHANGES DO NOT RAISE YOUR TOTAL TAX LEVIES. THEY MERELY RE-ARRANGE YOUR TAX DOLLAR.

- Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952. On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents.
