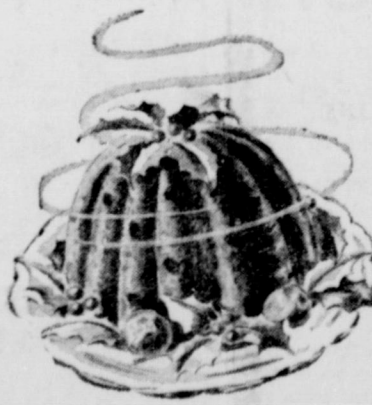

### Hotel Fire To Be Probed

**CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (UP)**—Two investigations began today into the cause of a hotel fire in which three persons died and 10 others were injured yesterday morning in Chicago's south side. Five of the 10 injured guests jumped from fourth floor windows and 200 other guests fled in nightclothes as the flames crackled through the Norwood Hotel.

The dead were Bart Cronin, 60, Miss Edith Crocker, 71, and Owen J. Benson, 61. Damages were estimated at \$50,000.

Earle R. Downes, assistant corporation counsel, will question witnesses and a specially selected coroner's jury will begin an inquest.

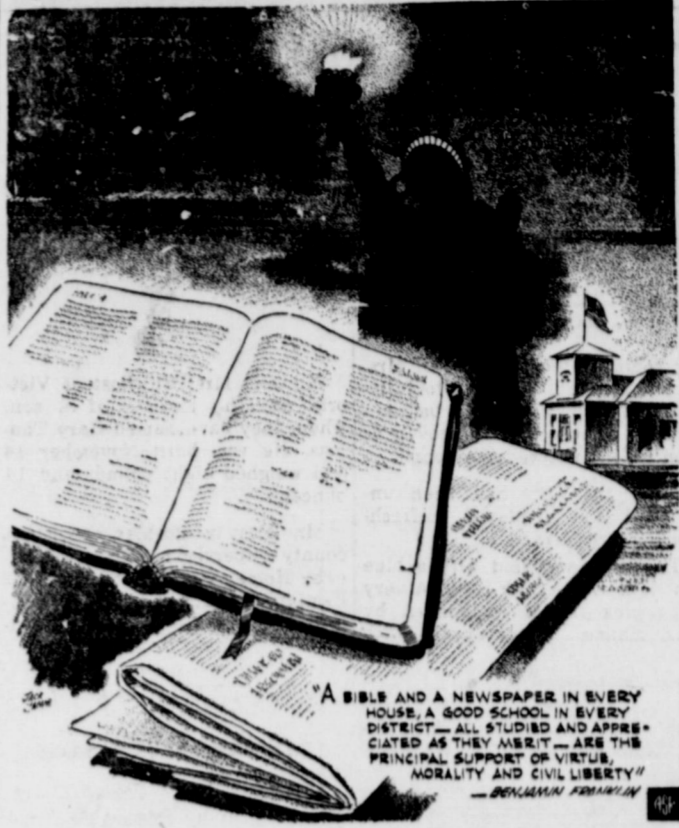
### New State

**MEXICO CITY, Nov. 19 (UP)**—Congressional leaders reported no opposition today to President Miguel Aleman's request to make lower California Mexico's 29th state.

## Anything Can Happen In The Southwest Conference Race

Rice and Texas Christian, a pair of clubs which were not counted in when observers passed out the pre-season laurels, battle for the Southwest Conference leadership this week with oft-beaten Southern Methodist shaping up as a spoiler of championship hopes.

While the Owls and Horned Frogs stage a real battle for survival at Fort Worth, SMU's pass-happy Mustangs journey to Waco for a crack at Baylor's title aspirations.

These are the only two conference games on tap, as Texas and Texas A&M take their usual week off in front of their traditional season-windup game, at College Station this year. Arkansas winds up its campaign against Tulsa at Fayetteville.

But, they will add up to as fine a card as any presented this topsy-turvy conference season.

At Fort Worth, a Rice team unanimously earmarked for the cellar in all pre-season predictions gets its big chance to stride on toward the title and a possible Cotton Bowl berth New Year's Day.

Arranged against the Owls will be a team that sputtered lackadaisically through its warmup games, then turned on the steam under the impetus provided by a third-string quarterback a n' d swept through three straight con-

ference foes before stumbling over Texas last week.

At Waco, pre-season co-favorite Baylor makes a virtual last-ditch stand to stay in the running for what it had hoped would be the school's first championship in more than a quarter of a century.

In the Bruins' way will be an SMU team that hit its peak in upsetting Notre Dame, dropped title games to Rice and Texas and tied A&M before it scratched the victory column with a tremendous 47-7 walloping of Arkansas last week.

Arkansas, which had thrilled its supporters with rousing upsets over Texas and Texas A&M and tied TCU, Baylor and Rice plenty of trouble, wrote a sad finish to its conference race against SMU to wind up with a 2-4 record.

The Razorbacks can gain some solace this week, however, if they can spoil Tulsa's fine record. The Golden Hurricane has dropped only one game this season and has been the standout in the Missouri Valley conference.

Last week's results, which saw Texas turn back TCU 32, 31, Rice upend the Argies 28-13, and Baylor wallop Wake Forest 42-0 in an inter-sectional tilt, left four clubs still with fair to good chances of at least a share of the title and the Cotton Bowl berth.

TCU, Rice, Baylor and Texas still have a chance, although Texas would have to become the first team in loop history to win or share the crown despite two losses.

SMU faces two of these—Baylor this week, TCU a week later. It could wreck both teams' hopes if it plays like it did against Arkansas.

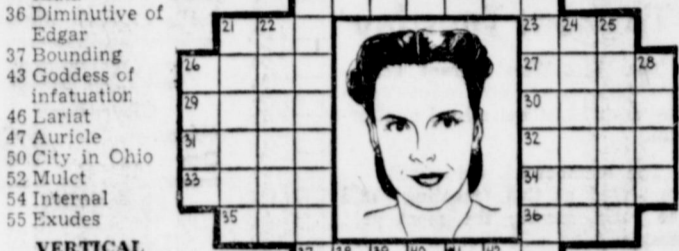
