365 SUCH ATROCITIES HAVE BEEN PROVEN OF COMMUNISTS

TOKYO, Nov. 20 (UP) - Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway onceded tonight that 6,000 or more U.S. troops may have died in Communist atrocities in Korea, but said his command has proof of only 365 such deaths.

The Supreme United Nations Commander qualified the figures given by Col. James H .Hanley, Chief War Crimes Investigator for the 8th Army, in his controversial atrocity report last week and contended Hanley exceeded his authority in releasing it.



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
