## **REDS PROPOSE ARMS FREEZE** AND BEHIND LINES CHECKS By Arnold Dibble United Press Staff Correspondent

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Dec. 3 (UP) - The Communists broke the Korean armistice deadlock today by agreeing to a total arms freeze and proposing that "neutral" inspectors come behind the iron curtain to enforce it.

It marks the first time that the Communists anywhere have accepted the principle of arms inspection behind their borders or lines.

But they phrased the concessions in language that might end the U. S. Army's rotation program, preventing replacement of battleworn units and permit the Communists to complete new jet airfields.

United Nations truce negotiators sought to clarify the Red proposal by posing 21 questions. The Communists promised to answer them at the armistice meeting at 11 a.m. tomorrow (9 p.m. today EST.) The replies may go a long
