Missouri Pacific Authorized To Pay Bond Interest

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 7 (UP)—Appealing parties were given until noon next Monday to stay Federal Judge George H. Moore's authorization yesterday for Missouri Pacific to pay \$35,988,575 back interest on bonds.

The court instructed trustee Guy A. Thompson to pay the interest on \$232,190,500 worth of first and refunding mortgage bonds issued every six months from 1943 to 1946.

Thompson petitioned for the court's approval in September, saying the railroad's earnings justified payment.

However Judge Moore gave a bondholders' committee the company's "independent directors" and the Allegheny Corporation, largest common stockholder in Missouri Pacific time to file stay bond.

Also involved in the order was authorization to pay \$1,610,000 interest on similar mortgage bonds of International Great Northern, a Missouri Pacific subsidiary.

Eastland Boy Coming Home After 5 Years With The Marine Corps

Sgt. Donald W. Branton, son of Mrs. M. E. Bibb of Woodson, and the late Garland Branton, former county treasurer of Eastland county, is enroute home from Korea. He should land at San Diego harbor. He will be processed and discharged at the Marine Corps base in San Diego.

Don has been with the 1st Marine Division since 1946. He was discharged in February 1950 as a sergeant, and was called back for service in Korea in October of the same year. He has been in Korea since November 1950.

Don and a buddy made an agreement to see the parents of the other, if one should be killed. So Don plans on going to New York to carry out the agreement.

Damon Kelley of Putnam was in the same division as Don, but Damon was killed in action.

Last winter he suffered from frozen feet. He has been very lucky not to receive any wounds as he has been in two or three traps. He fought with the famous British brigade which lost almost every man last winter.

He is an ex-student of Eastland high school and has written his brother, Glen Branton, teacher in the Woodson School, that he would like to finish his education when he gets home. His mother, Mrs. Bibb, is hoping that he can come home by Christmas, as this will be the first time in 5 years he has been at home on Christmas, if he makes it this time. The mother would like to have all her children together at Christmas.

Six Judges To Hear Texas City Legal Battle

NEW ORLEANS, LA., Dec. 7 (UP)—Six federal judges will sit in back today to hear arguments in the appeal of \$240,000,000 in damage suits resulting from the Texas City, holocaust in April, 1947.

The case before the U. S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals is a composite of more than 300 claims by 8,500 claimants for death, injury and property loss by fire and explosion. Federal District Judge Thomas M. Kennerly has already ruled that the government is liable.

More than 500 persons were killed and hundreds were injured April 16, 1947, when an initial explosion aboard a French ship, the SS Grandcamp, in Texas City harbor set off fires and blasts that wrecked part of the city.

The judges sitting today are Chief Judge Joseph C. Hucheson, Jr., and judges Edwin R. Holmes, Wayne G. Borah, Robert L. Russell, Lewis Strum and Richard Rives.

Odessa Mayor Says Help Has Not Been Refused

ODESSA, Dec. 7 (UP)—Odessa has not refused state help in its fight to stem the polio outbreak which has claimed nine lives this year, Mayor C. W. McCollum said yesterday in answer to a charge by Dr. George Cox, State Health Officer.

McCollum branded Dr. Cox's statement that Odessa officials refused help of State Health Department sanitarians a "stupid, untrue allegation."

"The citizens of Odessa have been belittled by the... unwarranted attack," said the mayor. "We have at no time refused outside help in correcting our sanitation problems, which are no greater than in any other community of 50,000 population."

McCollum denied receiving any offer of help from the State Health Department.

He also said the epidemic apparently had passed its peak. One new case of polio was admitted yesterday at Medical center Hospital here.

ALLIES AGREE ALSO TO TAKE UP WITHDRAWAL OF TROOPS

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Dec. 7 (UP)—The United Nations proposed a new truce inspection program today and, in an abrupt about-face promised to discuss withdrawal of troops from Korea later in the armistice talks.

The Communists tentatively rejected the three-point UN inspection program at a truce subcommittee meeting, but agreed to study it further.

The Reds also sidestepped at least three new, separate demands for an answer to the allied request for appointment of a second subcommittee to begin immediate discussion of an exchange of war prisoners.

The Communist delegates said they had forwarded the proposal to North Korean Lt. Gen. Nam Il senior Communist truce delegate, and would relay his reply at "the proper time."

A UN communique nevertheless reported that "progress was made, however slight" toward an ultimate agreement on carrying out a truce.

It said both sides had agreed that all armed forces would cease fire within 24 hours of the effective date of an armistice, that all armed forces shall withdraw from the demilitarized buffer zone within 72 hours, and that only military police shall be permitted in the buffer zone.

U. S. Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodges disclosed the allied decision to yield to the Communist demand for discussion of a troop withdrawal might begin as soon as "the armistice is going well."

The UN previously had refused to discuss a troop withdrawal at any time in the armistice negotiations. It contended the question could be taken up only at a formal peace conference after an armistice.

The UN delegation presented this new truce inspection program at the afternoon session:

1.—"The armistice commission and its joint observation teams shall have authority to observe at ground, sea and air ports of entry and communications throughout all of Korea as mutually agreed to by the two delegations, together with freedom for the above teams over the principal lines of communication throughout all of Korea."

2.—"The armistice commission shall have the right to joint aerial observation and photo reconnaissance over all of Korea."

3.—"The armistice commission shall have the right of complete observation of the demilitarized (buffer) zone."

The Communists turned down the program on grounds that it merely was a restatement of previous UN proposals. But they promised to study it further.

The arguments became technical and confused during the debate.

The Communists proposed two armistice inspection groups—a joint UN-Communist commission which would control only the buffer zone, and an organization of "neutrals" who would inspect "ports of entry" in the rest of Korea.

The UN contended one commission should do both jobs, but declined to say at this time whether the commission should be made up of the belligerents or neutrals.

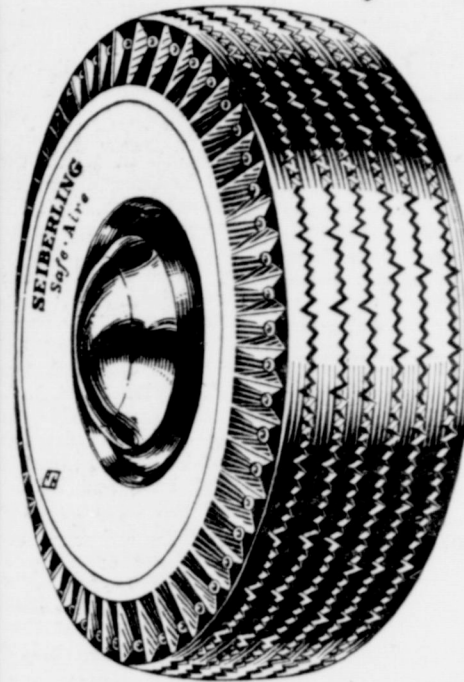

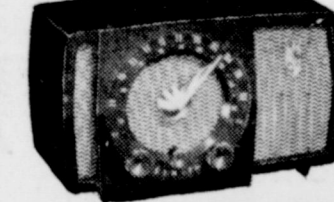

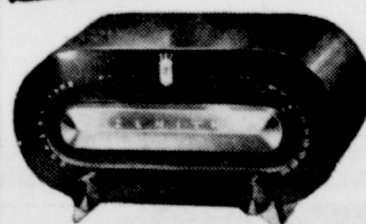
