"Texas Ike" May Lead Ticket In This State If He Is Nominated; Most Newspapers To Support Him

vey of the daily newspapers of the state conducted by the Standard-Times reveals that a preponderance of Texas newspapers will support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for President if he is the Republican candidate next year.

By almost the same majority these newspapers believe if the election were held today General Eisnhower would carry their own county and the state as the Republican standard bearer.

There are 98 daily newspapers in Texas. All of those with circulation over 5,000 (80) were sent a questionnaire by the Standard-Times. To date 49 have replied. They represent more than 80 per nt of the newspaper circulation

HOPED BYRD WOULD RUN Only one newspaper with circulation of more than 150,000 in the state failed to answer the question naire. The UN still has not given its formal answer to the Communist proposal for "neutral" instead of joint UN-Communist inspection of behind-the-lines "ports of entry" during a truce. And the Communits have stalled on the prisoner exchange question.

If these two answers are forthoming shortly, it was felt the way might be opened for speedy progress on the rest of the agenda. The negotiators have only 19 more days in which to complete an armistice if the present battleine is to become a permanent cease-fire line.







The New Safety Responsibility Law-

. was enacted to protect the public from careless, irresponsible owners or operators of motor vehicles. The law is designed to restrict the operation of automobiles to those who are financially able to pay for bodily injuries, death or property damage which their automobiles may cause. 

A pasture mixture of tall fescue grass, white and bur clovers supported as high as three animal units an acre in springs months.

Grasses and legumes make excellent pasture companions. The legumes contain a high percentage of protein and serve to increase the protein content of grasses growing with them. Both form a dense cover which reduces wind and water erosion. Rain which falls on such a pasture has little opportunity to run off before it soaks into the ground.

Too, the grasses provide the necessary roughage to balance the high protein in legumes. A grass-legume combination adds large quantities of organic matter to the soil and stands up well under intensive grazing.


