While we don't know very much and have only a limited education, we do know that present day studies are lot more interesting than they were when we went to school. In those days we didn't have much choice as to our courses. They had reading, writing and arithmetic on schedule and we could take our choice so long as we had 3 subjects. See what we mean? Also we were taught our ABCs before we began reading, especially from Latin and Greek classics.

Rhythmic was always a "booger" to us. It took us several years to learn to count up to twenty. We would start and make it all o.k. until we got to nineteen, after that number we invariably said seventeen. Teachers stripped every peach orchard in a mile of the school, and we were whipped until we got to where we would howl if they don't whip us. Then they'd whip us for howling. We finally got up to algebra, but to this day we don't see how it was done, unless the teacher went to sleep. Or maybe just got tired of looking at us, we don't know.

When we entered college we knew less about more things than any living mortal, and just by way of parenthesis we might add that we haven't improved any since entering and leaving college.

But the complexion of education has entirely changed. A 4-year old "student" now is supposed to pick up it's first book and read it through the first day in school. They call this "sight reading" and maybe it is but if so we are near sighted or maybe blind.

At 5 years of age the child is ready to select it's own courses. He will likely tell the teacher to sit down and inform him or her that they will do their own thinking (That makes us think Darwin might be right). he scholastic menu is pulled out and unfolded and about 8 seconds later the child announces to a poor and unsuspecting faculty that he or she has decided to take tennis, journalism and band, and that they will major in football or basketball. During the next decade father and mother work hard and try to make enough to keep them going. They want them to have a sheep skin because it carries prestige, and not because they are educated.

Finally they graduate but only a very small per cent can write their names well enough to be read. We have a son who majored in football. He stayed in the 12th grade for three years because he was captain of the team. He might all have stayed only he married and the teachers said his kids were too noisy, and as he always took them to school so they could see their daddy make a touchdown they expelled him. Last time we heard from him (his wife writes all letters), she said he was trying to learn to read and write. If he masters this he will be able to get a counting employees for Truman.

We have one daily job of opening letters. Most of them come from Colleges in Texas. We know the name of every coach in 300 miles of here, as well as a majority of players, but to save us we can't recall the name of a single College president. They are never mentioned in these football releases, or releases of any other kind. So far as we are concerned we don't know whether they teach anything but football. No literary courses are ever mentioned. Graduating exercises seem to be a mere formality, but the Thanksgiving game means more than an atomic bomb. If they miss the game all is lost. Worse than the sinking of the Titanic.

But after writing this we have looked in the mirror, at the wife's request, and have decided that maybe we are just an old fogey. A lot of our ancestors thought the world was flat, and we laughed at them. We may get the same reception—who knows?

222 Texans Will Die During The Christmas Period

AUSTIN, Dec. 13—Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today released the prediction of his Statistical Division for the number of violent deaths which will occur in Texas during the eleven-day Christmas holiday season this year.

According to Garrison, N. K. Woerner, Chief of the Department's Statistical Division, estimates that 222 persons will meet violent deaths during the period. Of these, 115 will die in Texas traffic accidents, 42 will be suicide or homicide victims and another 65 lives will be claimed by miscellaneous accidents such as fires, drowning, etc.

Director Garrison pointed out that Mr. Woerner's predictions for holiday periods and even for complete years have been consistently accurate in the past. He appeals to all citizens to furnish the utmost cooperation to the members of the Texas Highway Patrol and to their local police this year in an endeavor to prove the experts wrong.

"This," says Garrison, "can be accomplished by a strict observance of the traffic laws and by the exercise of the utmost caution with fires, firearms, and boating excursions."

House Studying Foreign Labor In The South

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 13 (UP)—A House Agriculture subcommittee opens a hearing here today into the use of Mexican and other migrant laborers with an eye to solving such problems as those that led to a recent walk out on a Tiptonville, Tenn., cotton plantation.

Rep. E. C. Gathings (D-Ark.), a committee member, said the group will go into every phase of the South's foreign labor problems with one of its major aims being to assure adequate labor for the 1952 cotton crop.

Cotton growers were expected to appear before the subcommittee to demand changes in the Mexican labor agreement, particularly a clause which requires payment to the government of \$15 for each Mexican hired.

House Tax Investigators Still Busy On \$500,000 Shakedown

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (UP)—House tax investigators hoped to learn today why Charles Oliphant, resigned chief counsel of the Internal Revenue Bureau, took special interest in Abraham Teitelbaum's tax troubles.

Oliphant was scheduled to testify after the House Ways and Means subcommittee investigating tax scandals finishes questioning Bert K. Naster, Hollywood, Fla., businessman (beginning at 10:30 a.m. EST). Teitelbaum, attorney for the late Al Capone, has accused Naster and gambler-promoter Frank Nathan of attempting a \$500,000 shakedown to fix his tax case.

Naster denied under oath yesterday that he ever had suggested that Teitelbaum pay him any money. Nathan, influential peddling friend of ousted assistant Attorney General T. Lamar Caudle, who told the subcommittee that he accepted airplane rides and bought cars at a discount from him while Beaty was under investigation for tax fraud.

Postoffice To Observe Late Closing Hours

In a statement made by Postmaster E. E. Layton, today, the postoffice in Eastland will remain open until 6 p.m. on Saturday, December 15 and Saturday, December 22.

This is being done to aid late shoppers in getting their gifts into the mail.

Dr. George W. I found economy-minded Congressman Ken Regan of Midland, Tex., a little tongue-tied in a speech before the American Institute of Mining Engineers at El Paso. He'd sent his pants out to be pressed just before his speech, omitting to remove his wallet. It isn't easy to connect one's thoughts when one has just been separated from \$600.

However, if more Congressmen were relieved of their wallets more often, they'd realize how the rest of us feel, whose pockets are picked every day by the federal government.

Yesterday's Kill Sets New Record For One Day

By WARREN P. FRANKLIN United Press Staff Correspondent 8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, Dec. 13 (UP)—American Sabrejets destroyed a record-breaking 13 Russian-built Mig-15 jet fighter planes today in blazing air battles over northwest Korea.

Two more Migs were probably destroyed and one damaged in the "Mig Alley" dogfights. American losses, if any, were not given. Never before in the history of combat solely between jet planes has one side lost so many aircraft in a single day. However, U. S. B-29 Superfortresses and escorting American jets together shot down 14 Migs last April 12.

United Nations troops and tanks also took the offensive on the ground. They staged two major raids deep into no-man's land on the western and west-central fronts and killed scores of enemy troops before returning to their own lines.

The twin raids were the largest scale allied attacks since the 8th Army issued its famed "no aggression" directive two weeks ago. Despite the raids, the 8th Army insisted there had been no change in the directive.

The first of the day's air battles saw 36 Sabrejets pitted against an estimated 100 sleek Communist Mig-15s in a 20 minute dogfight just south of Sinanju.

Four enemy jets were sent crashing to earth in that battle—two of them before the guns of Maj. George A. Davis, Jr., of Lubbock, Tex., who thereby raised his Korean war tally to seven Migs and three enemy bombers destroyed.

One Mig was damaged in the dogfight. On the ground tank-supported infantrymen with fixed bayonets made their second big offensive raid into no man's land in 24 hours.

This time the armored task force stabbed 2,000 yards—more than a mile—in front of the UN west central front in an attempt to encircle and trap an enemy outpost on a peak.

The Reds fell back to their main line of resistance, however, before the raiders closed their ring about the peak. The Communists called in artillery and mortar fire on the UN force and it returned to the Allied line.

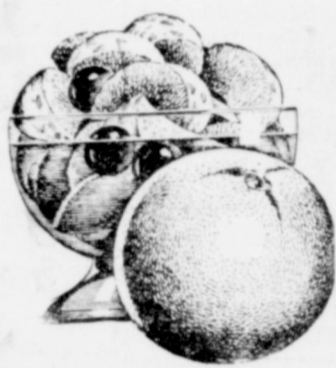

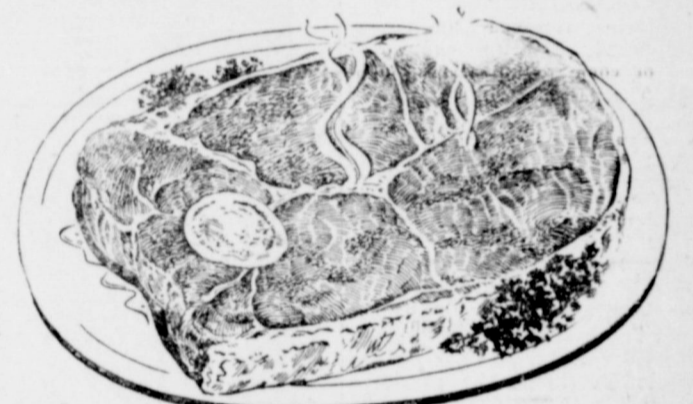

REDS STAND PAT ON REFUSAL TO NAME UN WAR PRISONERS

PANMUNJOM, KOREA, Dec. 13 (UP)—The Communists stubbornly refused today to tell how many United Nations war prisoners they held and backed down on a 1950 promise to abide by the Geneva Convention in their treatment of the captives.

The UN retaliated by refusing even to consider a Communist five-point prisoner exchange program because they feared any mass release of allied prisoners under present circumstances might lead to a "death march in reverse."

Both the joint UN-Communist subcommittee discussing an exchange of prisoners and another trying to work out a method of policing an armistice found themselves stymied at the end of the day. However, both will meet again at 11 a.m. tomorrow.

In the "policing" subcommittee, the Communists strenuously opposed the UN demand for continued rotation of American troops during an armistice.

They also reiterated that the UN demand for a ban on new air-

port construction and inspection behind their lines other than at ports of entry for truce violations constituted interference with North Korea's internal affairs.

North Korean Maj. Gen. Lee Song Cho conceded in the other subcommittee that North Korea had pledged itself in 1950 to "strictly observe the principles"

of the Geneva Convention on the humane treatment of war prisoners. But he said that did not mean the Communist regime had promised to observe the convention "as a whole."

For the third straight day, he handed down Allied demands that he disclose the names and whereabouts of UN prisoners in Communist hands, and permit international Red Cross representatives to visit them.

He pressed instead for adoption of a five-point Communist proposal calling for an exchange at Panmunjom of all war prisoners held by both sides.

But Lt. Col. Howard S. Levie, spokesman for the UN delegation, said there can be no agreement on the exchange problem until the Reds come through with the demanded information.

For all the Allies know, Levie said, the Reds may be holding all UN prisoners on the Korean east coast 200 or more miles from Panmunjom.

"We don't want our prisoners marching all over Korea," he said. "We don't want a death march in Korea in reverse."

Soaking Rain Needed by Texas

AUSTIN, Dec. 1. (UP)—Light rains and drizzles over most of Texas during the last three weeks have provided temporary surface moisture, but soaking rains are still needed, the U. S. Department of agriculture reported today.

However, the department said that scattered rains over the eastern third of the state have allowed small grains and winter legumes to make fair to good development, while snow which covered much of the northern high plains last week will enable the wheat crop to "continue to hold its own."

In South Texas, early-planted flax was generally up to a good stand, and conditions were favorable for a continuation of plant-

ing in that area.

Strong winds and dust delayed the cotton harvest in the southern high plains.

Commercial vegetables, the USDA said, made "exceptionally good progress" during the week ending Dec. 10.

However, dry range and pasture feed supplies continued to be steadily consumed and supplemental feeding of cottonseed cake, range cubes and roughage was necessary over most of Texas. In the northern high plains, snow covered wheat pasture and most of the stock on these fields was shifted to dry bundle feed for a few days. Chilling winds over the weekend caused further shrinkage, the USDA reported, of all unprotected livestock.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 13 (UP)—When a man shoots a rabbit it isn't news.

But Julius Monroe got shot by a rabbit.

Monroe said he was awakened

by a sharp pain in his hand. There was his pet rabbit peering at him over the sights of a .22 caliber rifle lying on a chair.

Monroe figured the curious cottontail hit the trigger when it hopped on the chair to investigate the rifle.

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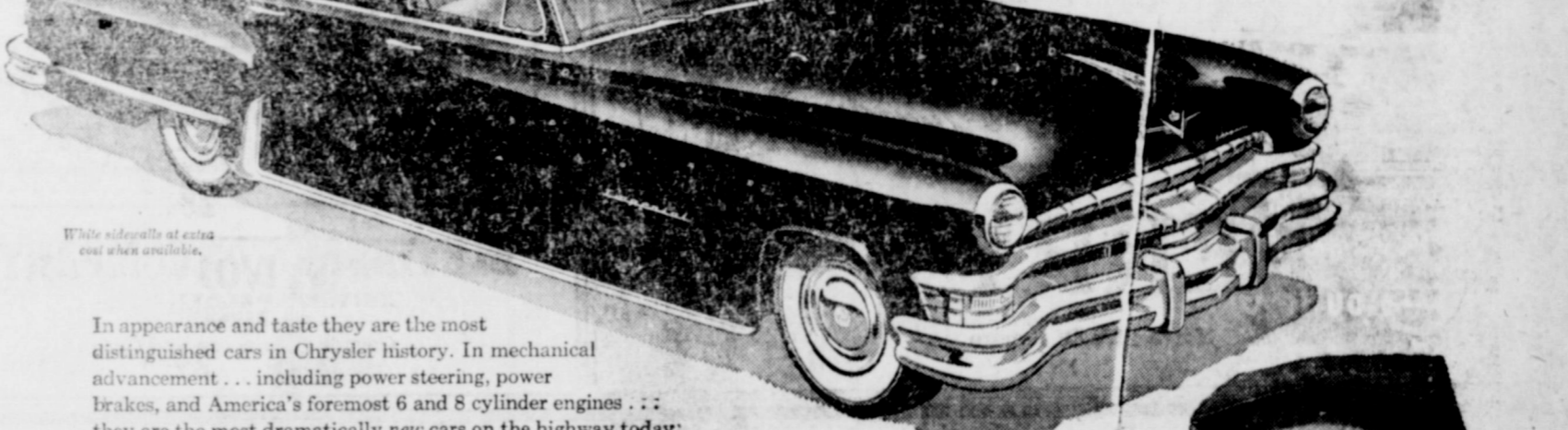

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala, Dec. 12 (UP)—Texas industrialist Glenn McCarthy has given Guatemalan capitalists 60 days to subscribe to 49 per cent of the stock in a \$6,000,000 hotel he will build here.

McCarthy said yesterday he had received permission from President Jacobo Arbenz to build the resort hotel, the first in a proposed chain of hotel in Guatemalan tourist centers.

The Texan said the hotel would be built on the site of the San Jose Army Barracks, which were destroyed during the revolution of Oct. 20, 1944. It will have 250 rooms, a swimming pool, a garden and other modern facilities, McCarthy said.

McCarthy confirmed that Frank Casone, who accompanied him here, participated in the hotel negotiations.

President Arbenz has offered full government cooperation, McCarthy said.

Four Die When Water Tank Falls In New Mexico

TUCUMCARI, N. M., Dec. 13 (UP)—At least four persons died and several others were injured early today when a 3,000,000-gallon water tank collapsed, flooding a section on the west side of this town of 8,500.

One of the victims was identified as Steve Gallegos, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gallegos. Grady Maples, radio station owner said he helped lift the roof of a house off the lad.

The others were identified by E. F. Dunn, owner of a funeral

home, as a Mrs. San Miguel and her baby and a man, Deal Elliott. Another funeral home operator—Marvin Doughty—said that he had joined officials in counting the people believed to be in the area and "we think we've got them all."

However, he said National Guardsmen and other searchers were still searching debris for possible victims. In addition the State Highway Department has been asked to furnish bulldozers.

Doughty said that "as of now, officials are inclined to think the tank was blown up." He said several railroad workers saw a blue flash just before hearing the noise of the tank giving way.

He said that natural gas lines

in the area were still leaking and it has been impossible to use torches in the search for more bodies.

"Pieces of that steel tank are strewn all over," he said.

Dunn, whose funeral home was located nearby, placed the time of the accident at about 4 a.m.

Maples said there were two other children in the Elliott house when part of the big steel side of the tank "literally went right down on top of the family." He said Tony's twin brother, Tommy, was removed from the wreckage by Phillip San Miguel, his 17-year-old brother who was staying with his sister at a nearby home. A six-year-old girl, Annabelle, escaped unaided.

Phillip then stood by and watched his mother, brother and step-father pried from the wreckage and taken to a funeral home.

Lee Gallegos, 64, said a change of habit last night saved his life. The room in which he usually sleeps was crumpled beneath a sheet of steel, but for some reason he had moved to a different room.

Electrical power was cut off in some sections of the city and radio station KTNM was off the air. Water was being carried to the general hospital by hand but officials believed water in two other tanks would serve the city on an emergency basis.

Maples said the large metal city equipment barn was swept


from its foundation as though it has been cut by a scythe.

The shop was washed up against the Ford Motor Company warehouse, about 300 feet away. The nearby sanitary laundry was completely demolished.


