# Pay Poll Tax Now As Tomorrow Is Last Day Effort Is Being Made To Pass A Day In Eastland's History 5,000 Mark Before Dead-Line (Editorial)

Tomorrow, you, as a Citizen of Eastland, have the privilege of deciding the course which the history of your city will follow during the many years ahead. It is a choice which may well determine whether your city lives or dies, whether the value of your property increases over the period to come, or whether it continues to decline because there is no demand for it. You are privileged to decide whether the City of Eastland is to have enough water to drink as well as enough to offer industries requiring water the opportunity of moving to Eastland. Such industries can bring in new citizens who will need to rent or buy your home, rent your building, buy your goods and services.

It is within your power to decide the fate of Eastland, yourself and those who come after you. Those who have seen our lake recently are vividly aware of the dangerous situation in which we now find ourselves. There is barely enough water now for us to use, much less to offer outsiders looking for a location for their businesses. You can vote for our joining the Eastland County Water Supply District and open the wedge for the future growth and prosperity of your city. The choice is obvious.

Tomorrow, January 31, 1952, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., you may make YOUR choice by casting your ballot in the basement of the County Courthouse at Eastland. You will not be voting a bond issue, but will merely be deciding whether or not Eastland is to join the Eastland County Water Supply District. Bonds to finance said District cannot be issued without a later election in which you will be entitled to vote.

The State Legislature has laid down the conditions which qualify citizens to vote in this election. ALL of which you must meet to vote tomorrow: First, you must live within the City limits of the City of Eastland, and; Second, you must own taxable real estate or personal property located within the city limits of Eastland, and must have rendered such property for taxation by Eastland COUNTY either for the years 1951 or 1952, and; Third, you must have paid your poll tax for the year 1950 (which is the poll tax that was due and payable on or before January 21, 1951, not
