

West Germans

BONN, Germany, Feb. 9 (UP) The lower house of the West German Parliament voted 204 to 156 to support German participa-tion in West European Defenso provided it was "a partner with full equality of rights."

The vote yesterday ended a two day debage on rearmament—the most bitterly contested issue in Germany today.

The House vote is only the first step toward rearmament. A tough battle is expected from the Soc ialist opposition when the government introduces a conscription bill and asks for ratification of the treaty providing for the formation of a six-nation European

Political sources believe Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will be able to muster a hefty parliamen tary majority for rearmament plans, but they do not believe it will be as large as the 90 vote marjority the government amassed last month in the ratification of the Schuman Plan.

A palace spokesman said it would be impossible to plan both a coronation and a royal wedding at the same time.
