BRITISH HEADQUARTERS Suez Canal Zone, Feb. 16 (UP) -The British barred all Egyptian food and oil trains from passing through the Suez Canal Zone today in retaliation for the mining of a British oil train last night.

A spokesman for Lt. Gen. Sir George Erskine, British Commander of the Zone, said the ban would continue in force until Egyptian railway crews wreckage of the mined train from the Port Said-Ismailia line and all British railway traffic delays

Although the halt order applied to all Egyptian state railway traffie through the Canal Zone, it affects only food and oil trains. The British banned all passenger traffic more than five months




