### Around The Square With Mack

Entirely too many of our farm boys and men are leaving the farm seeking work in the city. High salaries are very attractive in a fashion, but high living conditions as they are to learn. A farmer who is just making a living on the farm is dazed when somebody tells him he can make \$14 a day at the Consolidated and similar plants. He has been accustomed to making about \$14 a week. It stuns him and before taking a second thought, he sells his cows and calves, hogs and his hens, and heads for the city. He gets the \$14 a day job alright, but before he goes to work he has to find somewhere to live. He finally settles on a small, crummy apartment, that costs him \$65.00 a month. Of course it is not half as good as his farm home, but he has graduated into a "city duck" and will stand most anything for a while. By the time he puts up his meter deposits he will think he has bought a controlling interest in the city.

But the thing is: He has the job, and he gets \$14 a day. Looks like a gold mine, and he plans to get rich and retire. Day day comes and he gets his check, minus deductions for this, that and the other. Jolt No. 1.

He goes home to the wife and tries to explain why the check was reduced because of deductions. Both of them are unhappy, but they decide to go buy a few groceries. He pays 59c a dozen for eggs that were not half as good as the ones he had on the farm, and they didn't cost him more than a dime a dozen to produce. Of course on the farm they had all the baked chicken they wanted, so they decide to change off and buy a good beef roast. They pick one and it is weighed and wrapped, and the butcher asks him to take on it—only 4.98, for it was a small roast. He wants a pound of butter, but at \$1.10 a pound he is advised that it would be to his advantage to cultivate a taste for oleomargarine. On the farm old Jersey furnished the butter free for nothing, other than a little grass and tank water. As the kids have been accustomed to drinking milk they decide to buy a little, but are startled a gallon or 26c a quart for educated when they find it costs \$1.04 a gallon, city milk. It is not like old Jersey's lache, but really some kind of treated liquid with a weak milk flavor.

They continue their shopping, but continue to "cut" items that are not absolutely necessary. Finally they get to the checking stand and learn that the "little dab of food" is to cost them \$19.52, and they didn't get half they wanted, not of third of what they had on the list. By Monday they must begin visiting the store for "fill-ins" and by the time next pay day comes they are on a water and mush diet. Don't even have enough money to buy a postage stamp so they could write their renter in an effort to obtain a small, but necessary loan.

No room for washing, so the wife calls the laundry and sends the clothes out. This is fine for her back, but awful on the pocketbook. It comes back COD \$4.37, and she only has \$1.10. She offers the laundry driver the \$1.10 and half the clothes as a down payment on her bill. He refuses and takes all the clothes with him.

Friend hubby comes in and learns that the rent is due, and that the landlady is raising billy-heck. He has no money, and the family is promptly thrown out. He goes to the Salvation Army only to find it filled to overflowing with other people who have been unfortunate. They sleep in the "family bus" that night, but the next day he borrows a dollar from a friendly worker at the plant buys a little gas, and heads back to the farm where his renter allows him sleep in his own barn while he chops cotton for him. Final jolt.

### New York Central Hit by Wildcat Strike in 2 Spots

TOLEDO, Ohio, March 12 (UP)—Wildcat strikes by trainmen at Toledo, Ohio, and Elkhart, Ind., have prevented the New York Central system from restoring service west of Buffalo New York.

Members of the three train brotherhoods in the two midwestern cities—Key points on the line—defied both a government injunction and orders by the national union heads to return to work. Elsewhere on the New York Central system, trainmen bowed to the federal court order and obeyed the union call to resume work.

### Insurance Rate Raise Hearing Set March 17

AUSTIN, March 12 (UP)—A hearing has been set in Austin for March 17th on proposals to set higher automobile liability insurance rates for certain drivers under the age of 25.

Casualty Insurance Commissioner J. P. Gibbs says the hearing will consider automobile bodily injury and property damage liability rates, and automobile physical damage rates, rating plans, manual rules and endorsement forms.

### Beaumont Council Studies Electric Rate Raise Bid

BEAUMONT, March 12 (UP)—The Beaumont city council is to resume its hearing on an application for rate increases from the Gulf States Utilities Co. next week.

The company has asked for electric rate hikes up to 18 and one-half per cent. A Gulf Coast Utilities spokesman said the increases asked merely "would restore reductions made by the company since 1940."

### Warehouse Owner Sued by CCC On Cotton Shortage

TYLER, March 12 (UP)—The J. B. McGinty Company of Tyler and its three owners have been sued by the Commodity Credit Corporation for 3745 dollars worth of cotton, which the C-C-C charges was converted to private use.

The C-C-C says it first stored the cotton in the Vernon Tull Warehouse at Cooper. The suit charges that the McGinty firm purchased the 86 bales of cotton in 1946, knowing it was being sold without release from the C-C-C.

The action named J. B. McGinty, G. L. McGinty and Blair D. Disman, all of Terrell, as owners of the McGinty Company.

The owner of the Tull Warehouse, Vernon Tull, was sentenced to three years in prison and fined one-thousand dollars in 1946 on a charge of defrauding the government.

### Sheriff Tucker For Reelection

Sheriff J. F. (Frank) Tucker has asked this paper to announce to the voters of Eastland county, that he is a candidate for the office of Sheriff of Eastland county. Mr. Tucker is now serving his first term as sheriff, and feels that his services as a law-enforcing officer speak for themselves.

He is a firm believer in honesty and justice, and if re-elected he promised to enforce the law without fear or favor, to the very best of his ability.

He is not a new comer in Eastland. In fact he was born in this county just 57 years ago. ### Shivers Makes Surprise Visit

Governor Allan Shivers made a surprise inspection of the State School for Girls at Gatesville yesterday, but withheld a report until after his return to Austin.

The governor arrived by plane at 3 p. m. and made a 90-minute tour of dormitories and other campus facilities.

He talked to several inmates—some of them in solitary confinement. The school superintendent, Maxine Burlingham, was out of town yesterday, and assistant superintendent, Aline Smith was ill in a Gatesville hospital.

### Airmen Ordered To Keep Means Of Identification

All Airmen including pilots, mechanics, and others, must have their identification cards on their person at all times while performing their duties, Charles F. Horne, administrator of Civil Aeronautics advised today.

CAA aviation safety agents in the field have begun more specific checking on this requirement and the administrator urges all Airmen to comply with the law to avoid being cited for violation.

Agents will ask to see the Airmen's certificate, his medical certificate, where required, and the special identification card recently required by the Civil Aeronautics Board at the request of the military authorities.

If a person is performing Airmen duties without having the proper proof of his qualification on his person, he will be cited for a violation which may involve a fine.

### Reds Renew Demands to Inspect Secret Weapons

Chinese delegates to the Korean Peace Talks have revived their proposal to allow truce inspectors to examine secret Allied weapons after the armistice. And they again included Russia as a neutral nation.

The U-N has rejected both offers. Some officials say it now appears that only a high-level decision in Peiping, Moscow or Washington could break the deadlock in the talks.

### March of Dimes Campaign Ends; Is Successful

Now that the 1952 March of Dimes drive has been concluded, and all monies turned to proper authorities and a detailed report has been prepared for this issue of the paper.

In a communication today Stanley Webb, Campaign Director for Eastland county, took time out to offer thanks to loyal workers and others for making the campaign the huge success it was. The statement follows:

"Special thanks to the newspapers, Mrs. J. A. Bates of Ranger, Mrs. F. Water of Cisco, and all the local campaign directors throughout the county.

"The drive was successful, but our hospital cases have been tremendous. We have only \$422.67 left in the bank but have applied for a grant from National Headquarters for \$4,000 for the balance of the year," Mr. Webb stated.

In the report it will be noticed that half the funds collected in the drive have been sent to National headquarters, and for those who do not understand the working system, let it be said that while our donations were high, our expense is even higher. Every county sends in 50 per cent of collections, while the balance is retained by the local chapter for work here at home.

But some counties, of which Eastland is one, has more expenses than it does collection. They then draw grants from National Headquarters. Eastland has three or possibly four, "polio" cases to care for, and the annual expense for this care is considerably more than was collected in the county. National headquarters places money where it is most desperately needed.

### Missing Teacher Located; Didn't Know of Search

ROCK HILL, S.C. March 12 (UP)—A 39-year-old English teacher whose disappearance from South Dakota State College last December touched off a nationwide search has been located in Rock Hill, South Carolina.

Dr. Barbara Morehead explained she left the college because she was nervous and felt she had to "get out of a rut." Dr. Morehead said she had worked in San Francisco until about 10 days ago. She said she was "surprised" to hear that her mysterious disappearance had caused any sensation.

### Dust And Fog Blanket Texas

Dust and fog covered most of Texas today as a windy cold front raced from west to east on winds up to 55 miles an hour. Drought-damaged agricultural regions of West Texas are being belted by winds which are scooping up tons of topsoil this morning. The dust cloud reached into central Texas during the morning, and weathermen say they will cut visibility over all the state by tonight.

As the blow started, parts of Central, South and East Texas were under fog. At San Antonio, visibility was cut to one-and-one-half miles. Victoria and Tyler also had thick fogs, and Austin and Tyler reported drizzles. Winds averaged 45 miles per hour at Childress, with gusts up to 55.

The dust has cut visibility to one mile at Lubbock, Amarillo, Big Spring, Del Rio and Wichita Falls. Yesterday's high for the state—87 at Presidio—compares with the morning low of 35 degrees at Dallas.

### Truman-Taft Lose By Wide Margins

General Eisenhower and Senator Estes Kefauver have won smashing victories in the Republican and Democratic presidential primaries in New Hampshire.

The United Press has compiled complete unofficial returns from the state's 297 precincts. The figures show that the two victors led their nearest rivals, Senator Robert Taft and President Truman, by wide margins in the popular balloting—and captured all the delegates to the two national conventions.

An unofficial total of some 120-thousand votes were cast. General Eisenhower swamped Taft by almost an 11,000 plurality, and Kefauver beat Mr. Truman by more than 4,000.

Harold Stassen was never really in the Republican race, polling only a little more than 6600 votes. Gen. MacArthur, who was not a candidate, drew some 3600 write-in ballots.

Eisenhower smiled happily in Frankfurt, Germany, when he heard the latest returns. Said the general: "Any American who is informed that so many other thousands of fellow Americans think he's fit for the presidency—well, by golly, if he isn't proud, then he just isn't an American."

As for Senator Kefauver, he stressed that his surprise victory is not a slap at the administration's foreign or domestic policies. Rather, he said his triumph shows that the voters want new ideas and new personalities.

Taft Refuses Comment at Dallas Departure  
DALLAS—Sen. Robert A. Taft, in obvious ill temper over his defeat by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in the New Hampshire presidential primary—boarded his plane for Amarillo today with a refusal to comment on the vote.

The Senator appeared genuinely ruffled by questions about the outcome of the pace-setting ballot.

"If that's all you want," he snapped at a newsmen, "there'll be nothing." He added, "There'll be no statements at this time."

Taft was scheduled to arrive at Amarillo from Dallas at 9:47 this morning. There he will make one of three West Texas stops, which will close out his three-day Texas campaign tour.

Truman Refuses to Comment in Florida  
President Truman gave a newsmen a cheerful "good morning" at Key West, Fla., this morning, but refused to comment on the New Hampshire primary election.

The president took a walk along Key West's business and residential streets, and members of his staff said he probably would look over the New Hampshire returns after completing his stroll.

AMARILLO—Sen. Robert A. Taft's scheduled airport speech at Amarillo today had to be cancelled because of a dust storm which was whipped up by high winds hitting 60 miles an hour in gusts.

The low visibility and high winds kept the Ohio Senator's plane from landing. He radioed the waiting reception committee at Amarillo his regrets, and flew on toward Lubbock—about 300 miles away.

A dust storm also is reported at Lubbock, and if his pilot thinks it too bad to land there, he will go on to El Paso.

In fact, one of the two planes flying the Taft party proceeded directly to El Paso. But Taft will try to land at Lubbock for his scheduled appearance there.

FRANKFURT, Germany, March says he is as proud as any American would be that the New Hampshire voters picked him as their choice for president.

But the five-star general made it clear he doesn't plan to return to the United States in the immediate future.

He said he hasn't received word of the proposal by Democratic Senator Brian McMahon of Connecticut that he return to give a Congressional committee his annual report on "SHAPE" and the Allied Forces.

**Tip on How to Keep Your Cut Flowers Fresh**

BERKELEY, Calif., (UP)—Cut flowers will last longer if as many leaves as possible have been removed.

Home Advisers at the University of California agricultural extension service point out that flowers lose moisture rapidly through the

leaves after they have been picked. They suggest that removal of the leaves will eliminate some of the surfaces where evaporation can take place.

Add other greens to replace the ones removed, the home advisers suggested.

Another method for slowing evaporation from leaves and cut-flower stems is by keeping the storage temperature low and humid.

Sometimes cut flowers which have wilted can be revived by setting the container on a cool porch overnight or in the refrigerator, with a temperature of 40 degrees.

**Voyage to Moon Tough Problem**

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—The moon, with all its romantic significance, is nothing but a great big, problem to scientists. The problem is how to reach it.

Dr. I. M. Levitt, director of the Fels Planetarium in Philadelphia, has an idea on how to solve it. Speaking at a meeting of the Ritzenhous Astronomical Society, Dr. Levitt said a rocket ship about 250 feet long and 75 feet in diameter, shaped like a cigar, should do the job. The cost would be about \$200,000,000.

The major problem is fuel. Dr. Levitt said the best fuel today is a mixture of alcohol and liquid oxygen which could power a craft at a speed of two miles per second.

That isn't fast enough, however, Dr. Levitt said the ship must attain the speed of "escape velocity," which is seven miles per second, before it can break loose from the earth's gravitational pull.

Dr. Levitt said step rockets could provide the extra push for the ship to reach "escape velocity." Once that speed is attained, the ship would revolve around the earth like a satellite. Then, he said it can be used as a jumping off

place for other craft, saving them the trouble of reaching "escape velocity" before soaring into the cosmos.

The astronomer said a space ship satellite could be used for world-wide weather predictions, scientific vacuum experiments, a radar beacon for navigators around the world and clearer observations of the universe by astronomers.

The first nation to put a satellite rocket into space will control the earth, he predicted.
