Grass Is The Foundation Of Security In Agriculture

The illustration is of a plot of Indian grass (second year growth) on a Central Texas farm.

To the farmer and rancher, grass has a manifold significance. It is the most abundant, most easily grown, and cheapest feed for his livestock. It means increased carrying capacity for his pasture. It simplifies the maintenance of contours, terraces and watercourses.

Blades of grass break the force of the raindrop and slow down the movement of water over the surface of the soil. The thick-growing roots aid in the absorption of water. As a result, runoff and erosion are reduced. Grass enriches the soil through addition of organic matter. The most fertile soils in the world are those developed under grassland farming.

The Soil Conservation Service Technician has information about grass that you should know. Ask him.

POTPOURRI AND WORSE

March 14."

"That fact that under the Lowe Committee recommendation, the 91st Court be abolished, indicates that the committee was unwilling to adopt the recommendation of the Thornton 9 member committee and the action was doubtless prompted by some unfair means. It was my purpose and intention as Judge of the 8th Administrative District to represent the entire district rather than the district court over which I preside. This prompted me to recommend that if either the 90th or 91st court must be abolished, that it was only fair to leave the matter of which court was to survive with the legislature. Apparently my attitude of fairness did not appeal to the Lowe Committee. Regardless of the recommendations of that committee, it is still a matter to be decided by the legislature."
