### TCU Leaves For NCA Tournament In Kansas City

FORT WORTH, March 18 (UP)—Texas Christian got ready today for an invasion of the NCA regional tournament at Kansas City after closing out a warm-up campaign with an 87 to 45 victory over Fort Sam Houston's Rangers.

The Frogs—Southwest Conference Champions, toyed with the Service team after the first quarter last night when they held

only a 15 to 11 edge. From there TCU built its advantage to 40-21 by half time and 71 to 32 by the end of the third period.

Center George McLeon gathered 20 of the Frogs' points, one more than teammate Harvey Fromme, as they rang up their 23rd win in 26 starts.

Coach Buster Brannon's squad leaves here tomorrow night for Kansas City, where they will meet Big Seven Conference Champion Kansas in the nightcap of an opening night twin bill involving St. Lewis of the Missouri Valley loop and New Mexico A&M of the Border Conference in the other game.

SAN ANTONIO, March 18 (UP)—A pinch hitter who rapped out a single gave the Ohio State Buckeyes a 4-3 victory in the 11th inning over Brooke Army Medical Center yesterday at San Antonio. Charles Brentlinger's single drove in Billy Sachs from second to break a two-inning deadlock with the comets.

Dick Finn, who started on the mound for the visitors, ended up in the hospital. The Buckeye hurler was injured in a second-base collision with the Comet's Owen Friend. Finn was placed in Brooke Army Hospital for observation. Dave Masters, the Winning picture, blanked the Comets for three and two-thirds innings as his contribution before being retired.

The clubs meet again today and tomorrow.

### Service Applies To Build Another Crude Oil Line

TULSA, Okla., March 18 (UP)—A Service Pipe Line Co. application to construct a second crude oil pipe line from the Saunders Pool in Lea County, New Mexico, to a connection with its West Texas system has been approved by the Petroleum Administration for Defense.

The Saunders pool now is served by a line that pumps oil north to a company line serving the Caprock area. The new line, 26 miles of 10-inch, will move oil east, via the Denton pool, to the company's West Texas system at its Wesson station.

C. M. Scott, Jr., general manager, said his company is preparing to start engineering systems and to obtain right of way. He described the new construction as "a big gathering line that will act as a loop also for our northern line in Lea county."

The new line will provide adequate capacity for future production in the vicinity of the Saunders and West Saunders pools, and for the new development along the route of the line. There is considerable drilling activity in the region to the traversed.

As a phase of the new PAD-approved project, the East Caprock pool will be connected to the company's northern line.

The proposed construction will give Service Pipe Line Co. an extensive gathering and transportation system in northern Lea county. Lines now run from Caprock to the company's West Texas system at Slaughter station with laterals serving the Bagtower, Saunders and Gladiola pools. A Magnolia Pipe Line Co. gathering system serving the Crossroads pool is connected to the Caprock-Slaughter line also. A line runs from the Knowles pools across the Texas line to Wesson. The Denton pool already is connected to the West Texas system.

During the past year Service Pipe Line Co., a 12,000-mile crude oil system, has connected 92 new fields and pools largely in Texas and New Mexico. Another PAD-approved project, a line from Cogdell in southern Kent county to Aspermont in Stonewall county, is under construction. Contracts for several gathering lines in this area have been awarded.

A long-line system, most of the oil gathered by Service Pipe Line Co. in Texas and New Mexico is delivered to refineries in the Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago areas.

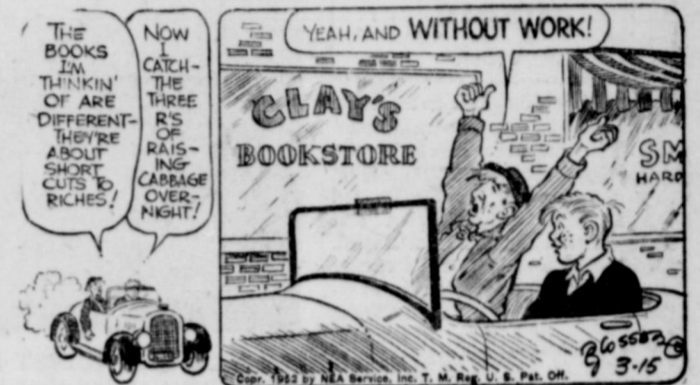
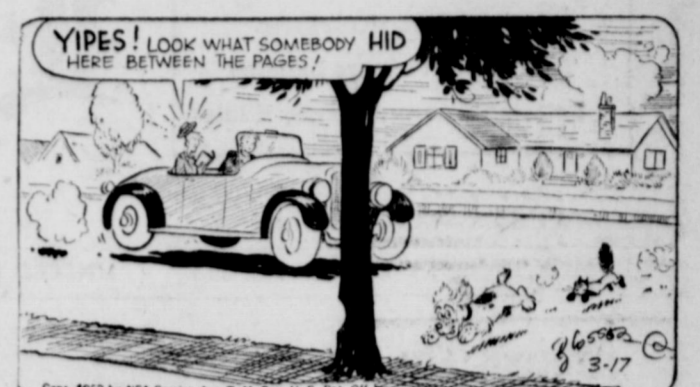
Defending Champion Tyler, Texas is missing from the line-up, after Wharton Downed Tyler early in the Defending Champion's own elimination tournament.

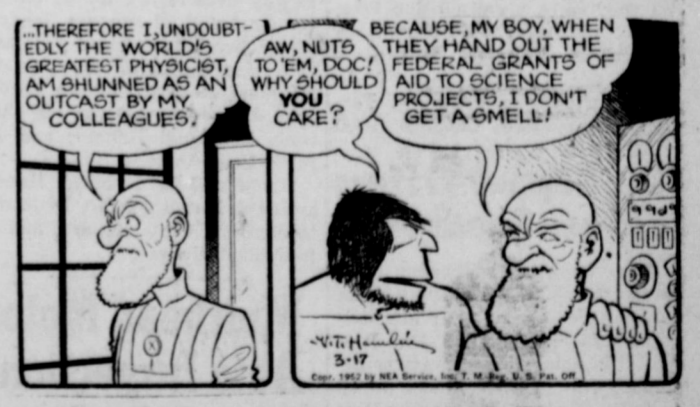

THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF EASTLAND EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the District on the 1st day of April, 1952, for the purpose as set forth in the resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on the 1st day of March, 1952, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING THREE DIRECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held on April 1, 1952, in Eastland County Water Supply District, as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-first Legislature, for the purpose of electing three (3) directors of said District.
2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct," and all of the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct."

(a) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the Chamber of Commerce, in the City of Ranger, Texas. Lee Dockery is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the County Courthouse, in the City of Eastland, Texas. Billy C. Frost is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

3. C. B. Pruet, P. M. Kuykendall and L. E. McGraw, have made application to this Board to have their names printed on the ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballots, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

4. The ballots for said election shall be printed in substantially the following form: "OFFICIAL BALLOT" C. B. Pruet, Director P. M. Kuykendall, Director L. E. McGraw, Director.

Each voter shall leave on the ballot the names of the three candidates for whom he desires to vote. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

5. No person shall be elected a director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Ranger and no employee of said City shall be elected a director. Likewise, no member of the governing body of the City of Eastland and no employee of said City shall be elected a director.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Daily Times and the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within said District one time each, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election.

### National 4-H Awards Upped

Here's good news for every 4-H Club boy and girl in this State:

Announcement has been made by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club work that county and sectional awards have been doubled, and eight college scholarships have been added on the national level in the 1952 4-H Achievement program, as follows: Gold filled medals of honor to winners in participating counties have been increased from two to four, and sectional awards of educational trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November now number 16 instead of eight, as was the case last year. Also \$300 college scholarships will be presented to 12 national winners, instead of two \$300 and two \$150 college scholarships to the highest rating and

second place winners, as here to fore. All awards are provided by the new donor, the Forq Motor Company.

Previous awards of a set of statues, symbolizing 4-H achievement, for the State-winning boy and girl, and a silver trophy for the national-winning boy and girl who latter presented in the name of the President of the United States are being continued.

Recognition in this program for top records of general achievement—either on county, state, sectional or national levels—is considered one of the highest honors a 4-H Club member can receive.

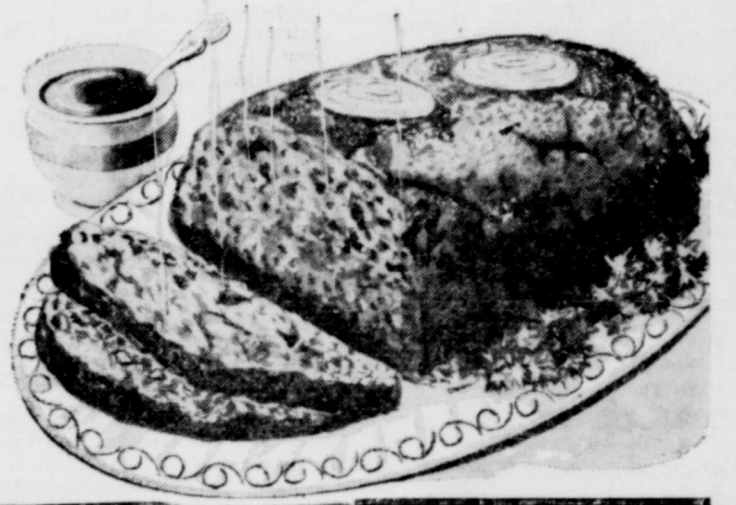

### Oilmen Will Hear General Johnson On March 28 At Sixth Annual Meet

AUSTIN, March 16 Brigadier General Alfred H. Johnson, chairman and executive secretary of the Munitions Board Joint Petroleum Committee and chief of the Office of Petroleum Programs, will be the dinner speaker at the sixth annual meeting of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association in Fort Worth March 28.

General Johnson, an outspoken defender of a free enterprise petroleum industry who is lavish in his praise for its initiative and far-sightedness in making possible oil for all needs in peace and war, will discuss the role of petroleum in the defense program.

His military career, practically all of which has been devoted to the development of aviation from which both civilian and military aviation has profited, was launched in 1922. Today he holds the rating of command pilot.

During the 1930's General Johnson was one of the pioneers in high altitude flying, assisting in the development of the turbo supercharger and pressure cabin air planes which are used universally in commercial and civilian aviation today. In 1936 he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for development and flight testing of the first successful pressure cabin aircraft.

During the War he headed the procurement, production and inspection of Air Force material in Ohio, Michigan, and Canada. He later was assigned to the Strategic Bombing Survey in the European Theater surveying the German aircraft industry. Near the close of hostilities in Europe he was transferred to the Far East Air Forces and was stationed in Manila until July 1946. Leaving the Philippines, General Johnson next

served as commanding officer of the Okinawa Air Materiel Area until January 1947 when he was made assistant chief of staff, A-4, Far Eastern Air Force Headquarters in Tokyo.

In October 1949 he was named chief of the Industrial Planning Division and after the outbreak of the Korean fighting became chief of Production Resources Division which is responsible for expanding aircraft production base to take care of the growing demands of the Air Force.

General Johnson was born in North Dakota. He married Mary McCaskell, daughter of a prominent San Antonio lawyer, in 1927. Since that time he has considered Texas his home state.

### Prisoners Escape Florida Jail In Movie Type Break

PENSACOLA, Fla., Mar. 18 (UP)—Three prisoners overpowered a guard today at the Escambia County Jail in Pensacola, Florida, then freed a red-haired woman prisoner and escaped.

The men bound and gagged jailer J. H. Holman early this morning and locked him in a cell. They looted a jail safe before they fled.

Sheriff R. L. Kenricks says the three men are armed and dangerous. He won't comment on where they go their weapons, but says he has "an idea."

The woman fugitive is Mrs. W. G. McQuagg, who was being held on 12 charges of forgery. She was recently returned to Pensacola from Huntsville, Texas, where she was arrested.

### AF Thunderjets Set New Record For Jet Flight

NEUBIBERG, Germany, March 18 (UP)—Two United States Air Force Thunderjets have completed what air experts say is probably the longest sustained jet flight in aviation history.

The F-84 Thunderjets landed at Neubiberg, Germany, today after a 2800-mile flight without refueling. The flight planned seven nations and took four-hours and 48 minutes, including an average speed of almost 585 miles an hour.

The two planes took off from a United States air base at Neubiberg then flew over Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, France, Britain and Belgium, and returned to Neubiberg.

The pilots are Major Robert Kurr of Reading, Penn., and First Lt. Larry Kilpatrick of Salt Lake City, Utah.

### Loyal Democrats May Be Planning Part Rebellion

Pro-Truman Democrats in Texas have warned that if coming precinct, county and state conventions aren't to their liking, they'll break off and hold their own conventions. The "Loyal Democrat" group is arming for a political battle which is threatening to split the party into two hostile groups.

This is the key to strategy aimed at thwarting anti-Truman forces being rallied by Governor Allan Shivers. The result could mean that Texas will send two contesting delegations to the National Democratic Convention in Chicago next July. One side probably will be pro-fair deal, and the other rabidly anti-Truman.
