**SWC Baseballers Tangle With All Outsiders Today**

 Southern Methodist's victory-happy Mustangs, Texas A&M and Baylor tackle outside competition today as the Southwest Conference diamond race heads into a busy week end schedule.

SMU will go after its seventh victory in eight series when it meets Hardin-Simmons in the second game of a series at Dallas after winning yesterday's opener 7-5.

The Aggies play host to Ohio State at College Station in the opener of a three-game series, and at Waco Baylor tackles an Oklahoma team, which ran into all kinds of trouble against Texas Christian yesterday.

TCU, loser of all five previous starts, cut loose with an 18-hit barrage that buried Oklahoma 17-3 behind Norris (Knobby) Graves' five-hit hurling.

The Aggies' foe, Ohio State, just completed losing two out of three to the powerful Brooke Medics at San Antonio.

Denny Davidson went the route and limited Hardin-Simmons to five hits, but the Mustangs had to come from behind twice to overcome the effect of five of their own errors. Davidson struck out six.

Shortstop Don Carroll sparked the TCU victory, driving in six runs with five hits in six trips to the plate, including a pair of solo home runs.

Meanwhile, Graves went the route for the first time to chalk up his first victory after three defeats.

The loss, while only the season opener for the 1951 NCAA champion Sooners, snapped a 13-game winning streak which started last season. None of the losers' five blow helped in their run making as a high wind hampered the fielding by both teams.

**Senator Byrd Would Cut Budget Of Government \$8,600,000,000**

Eventual tax savings of \$373,240,000 to the people of Texas were estimated today by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce on the basis of proposals by Senator Harry E. Byrd (D., Va.). The "Byrd Budget," released February 14, called for reductions totaling \$8,600,000,000 in the President's proposal spending budget for the Federal fiscal year 1953. Calculating that Texas bears 4.34 per cent of the total Federal tax burden, the West Texas Chamber pointed out that 4.34 per cent of the \$8,600,000,000 spending reduction outlined by Senator Byrd would be \$373,240,000.

An even greater saving could be made for Texas taxpayers if

the President and his administration were to give their sympathetic leadership to an economy effort, the West Texas Chamber said, citing a contention of Byrd. Byrd held that the \$8,600,000,000 spending cut he proposed can be achieved by Congressional action alone without active support

from the Chief Executive. The Chamber said:

"In the absence of such cooperation by the Executive Branch, the only thing left for Congress to do, in addition to reducing 1953 appropriations, is to enact a resolution placing a \$71 billion ceiling on 1953 spending by Government. The \$71 billion figure represents the total revenue anticipated by the Federal Treasury next year.

"Federal expenditures are met by taxes levied on the people of

the 48 states. If Congress were to carry out Senator Byrd's outline for an \$8,600,000,000 spending reduction—or achieve an even greater cut—it would make unnecessary the levying of additional Federal Tax to pay the principal and interest on the new indebtedness that will otherwise occur and at the same time reduce the threat of inflation."

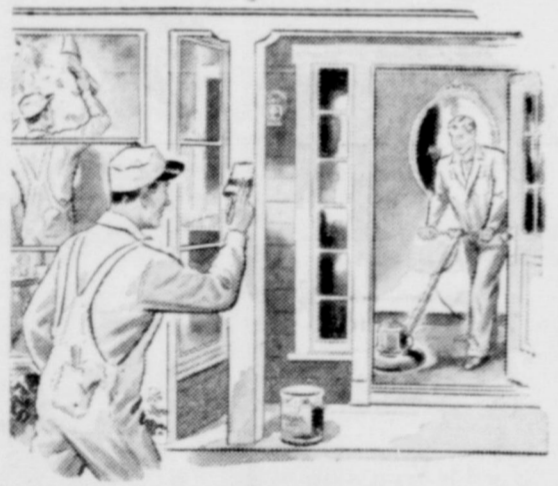

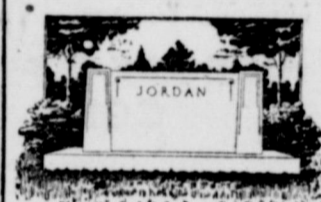

### GRAND JURY INDICTMENT OFTEN CONFUSED WITH CONVICTION FOR CRIME

What does indictment by a grand jury mean? Lawyers find that many persons are inclined to confuse indictment by a grand jury with a conviction for a crime.

This misconception is unfair to anyone who becomes the subject of a grand jury investigation. Justice, in the United States, is based on the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty, and public opinion should withhold its verdict until the courts have had an opportunity to determine guilt or innocence.

An indictment is simply a written accusation presented by a grand jury to the district judge. It charges some person or persons with a crime. It is not a conviction. When a grand jury indicts a person it merely affirms that there is sufficient reason for him or her to stand trial. That is as far as the grand jury goes.

### How to have a winning TELEPHONE PERSONALITY



We're often judged by the way we use telephone service. Good telephone technique and good telephone manners are important to a winning personality... and help you get the most from your telephone service.

Of all the many questions I'm asked about good party line manners, probably the most frequent one is "How long should my telephone conversations be?"



Answer: The length of your conversations will vary, of course. But purely for a selfish reason, it's a good idea to avoid long, drawn-out conversations. No incoming calls, however important, can get through to you while your telephone is tied up. And your party line neighbor can't make OR receive a call. You're displaying good party line manners when you hold conversations to a reasonably short length—consideration that folks on your party line will appreciate and return.

Recently, a friend visiting at my home noticed a small booklet titled "LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE NUMBERS" lying beside my telephone. My guest asked "Is there any advantage in making long distance calls by number?"



Answer: Indeed, there is. Long distance calls go through faster—often twice as fast—when you call by number. The smart, well-informed telephone user takes fullest advantage of today's fast long distance service by placing out-of-town calls by number whenever possible. Incidentally, if you don't already have one of those convenient booklets for listing out-of-town telephone numbers, you can get one free at the telephone company business office. That's where I got mine.

Here's another test of good telephone technique. When in doubt about a telephone number, should you look in the telephone directory... or call information?



Answer: You will usually save time if you look in the directory first. Chances are, you'll find the number there. The telephone company people tell me their records show that 3 out of 4 calls for information are for numbers listed in the telephone book. Why make two calls when one will do, three out of four times?

After that, the judge and the trial jury take charge of the case. At the trial the indictment is simply the State's pleading in the case, to which the defendant may plead "Not Guilty." The trial jury is instructed by the judge that it must not consider the indictment as any evidence of guilt.

All felony offenses in Texas, that is all offenses punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary must be prosecuted on an indictment by a grand jury. A grand jury may indict and individual for a misdemeanor, and offense punishable only by a jail sentence or by fine, but this is rather an unusual procedure.

Misdemeanor cases are customarily prosecuted on the basis of "information" filed by the County Attorney. This serves the same function as a grand jury indictment.

The importance of a grand jury verdict is this: If it votes a "True Bill"—that is, if someone is indicted—the District Attorney must prosecute the person indicted; but if the jury votes a "No Bill"—that is, not to indict—the suspected person cannot be tried. In most cases, the District Attorney informs the grand jury of persons or crimes to be investigated and produces the evidence for it. However, the jury is free to order any further witnesses it may wish to hear brought before it, and is by no means limited to the evidence the District Attorney produces.

A grand jury cannot require a suspect to testify before it. But suspected persons sometimes ask to be allowed to appear before a grand jury to testify in their own behalf. They may do so and still be prosecuted and convicted.

The grand jury procedure is one of the basic protections enjoyed by the common man against tyrants, and dates from early Anglo-Saxon times. It assures that

no person shall be forced to stand trial for a felony on the basis of a malicious or frivolous accusation having no apparent factual support.

When called to serve on a grand jury you share with a group of fellow citizens some of the most solemn responsibilities known to our democracy. Consequences of life-or-death importance may hinge upon your vote.

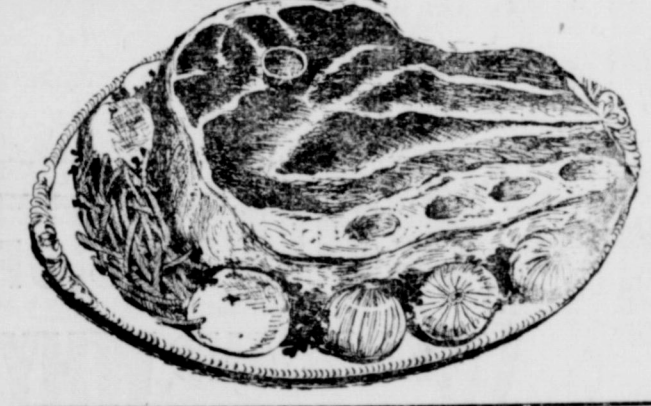
