### Temple Airport To Receive More Airlift Troops

TEMPLE, March 21 (UP)—Temple Municipal Airport in Central Texas is going to be a busy place again today. Fifty-three giant transport planes carrying more of the 31st Dixie Division are scheduled to land there.

The flights are part of exercise Longhorn's test of how fast troops can be airlifted to the locale of an invasion. Some 2100 soldiers of the 155th Regimental Combat Team already have been flown to Temple and billeted at Fort Hood to await the joint Air Force-Army maneuver to begin next Tuesday.

When the airlift is completed, more than 8700 men will have been flown 1100 miles by daytime shuttle runs only.

### Laughing Maniac Scare Keeps San Antonians Busy

SAN ANTONIO, March 21 (UP)—San Antonio's current scare over its "Laughing Maniac" is threatening to destroy all peace of mind at police headquarters. During last night, said police dispatcher Gerard Gutierrez, prowler calls on the "maniac" same in at the rate of one each 15 minutes.

### Reserves Will Train At Wolters Air Force Base

AUSTIN, March 21 (UP)—Reserve officers and men of two Army Engineer Aviation brigades will hold annual field training at Wolters Air Force Base near Mineral Wells, in July and August. Col. C. M. Culp, who is chief of the Texas Military District, made the announcement today.

He said the training periods extend from July 6th to August 3. The brigades, consisting of two battalions each with attached units, are the 420 from Colaba Station and the 337th, headquartered at New Orleans, La.

### NEW PAY SAND IS FOUND IN EASTLAND COUNTY

Gene Shirley of Dallas, and A. R. Venuto of St. Louis, Mo., have completed their No. 1 C. V. Fox, located in the South Half of Lot No. 28, League No. 2 McLennan County School Land. It is the opinion of local oil operators that it is a new producing horizon, and a very fine one. This well is approximately one quarter of a mile from wells that were produced in the Twenty's bluff from a pay at 1140 feet with the average elevation 1475 feet.

The Fox well topped the pay at 1198 feet with an elevation of 1445 feet. The pay sand in the old wells shaled out in the Shirley-Venuto well. Only three or four inches of the pay sand was cut when casing was set.

After drilling the plug about ten inches of pay-sand was taken and the well put on the pump. On a twelve hour test the well made 35.96 barrels of oil, 36.4 gravity and no water. The operators own about 600 acres in the immediate area and have an extensive drilling campaign arranged. They are moving in on the North offset 300 feet from the discovery well, and have made a location for the South offset. They are planning to drill a 4000 foot test well in this immediate area in the future. This well is located about three-fourths of a mile East of the old Panhandle lease that has produced over 2,000,000 barrels of oil in the last thirty years. The well, located 7 miles East of Eastland, was drilled in by W. C. Ferguson of Ranger.

The following letter addressed to the editor, along with other epistles, checks, parking tickets, etc., reached our desk early today. And because the subject is, or at least should be of interest to every individual in Eastland, we reproduce it. The letter follows:

"I will appreciate you delivering this memo and check to the proper authorities in your city. Thanks.

The memo addressed to the Chamber of Commerce, reads as follows:

Manager, Chamber of Commerce, Eastland, Texas, Dear Sir:

I was in your city at noon on March 14th, stopped at the Manhattan Cafe for lunch and to sample their food in regards to whether I would list them in the 1952 Guide Book. (No Charge.) Our listings are based on merit only. I received the enclosed ticket. (It was an over-parking police ticket.)

Your City, without any exceptions is the only city to issue a parking ticket between 12:00 noon and 1 p.m. for the entire Southwest States for meter expiration. I just thought you should know that this condition exists.

I am sure that the city of Eastland is not in dire need of a parking fine, in order that a person with a foreign license, should have to pay even 5c in addition to his meal to eat in your fair city.

The memo is self explanatory. If such conditions exist here, the Telegram is of the opinion changes should be made. It so happens the writer named above is owner and manager of "Wallace Tourist Guide of Eating and Lodging", a publication generally circulated among tourists, and if Eastland is to enjoy her share of Tourist trade, it stands to reason that we do not need any adverse barriers to drive them on, or stop them before they get here.

Eastland extends a hearty welcome to all visitors, and it is not our intention to harbor anything or practice which might be repulsive to visitors.

You have the facts, so do your own deciding. We have delivered the memo to Herb Tanner at the Chamber of Commerce, and this check and ticket to the police department.

### Fourteen Cases Polio Reported In Last Week

AUSTIN, Mar. 21 (UP)—State health officer George W. Cox says 14 cases of polio were reported in Texas last week. This is more than twice the seven-year average of six cases. The count for the previous week came to 15.

### Four Shrimpers Held By Mexican Navy Released

WASHINGTON, March 21 (UP)—The State Department said four American shrimp boats seized by the Mexican Navy last Sunday have been released. Officials said the boats were allowed to leave Campeche, Mexico, last night.

Department experts meanwhile are studying the possibility of lodging a formal protest against the seizure.

The American Consulate at Merida, Mexico, is preparing a report on the incident that may have a bearing on whether a protest is justified.

The four boats, working out of ports in Florida, were fishing off Yucatan Peninsula in the Gulf of Mexico when they were picked up by the Mexicans.

### Texas Weather Due Changes

A cool front is moving rapidly eastward across Texas today and may produce some showers. The front passed West Texas with a minimum of dust raising, weathermen said, and the area behind the front is warm and clear.

Central and East Texas have cloudy skies, but the fast-traveling air mass is dry and probably will sweep away most of the clouds. The showers—if—will be light. Winds hit 34 miles per hour at Brownsville early today, and the U. S. Weather Station at New Orleans ordered small craft warnings hoisted along the coast from Brownsville to Mobile, Ala.

The front will cause sudden wind shifts to the north late today, forecasters warn, and this will be dangerous to small boats and fishing nets.

Temperatures, which set record highs the past two days, are expected to drop tonight as a result of the front. Temperatures in the 40s are due early tomorrow, followed by afternoon readings in the 60s.

Yesterday's peak was 95 degrees at Laredo, and the low maximum 67 at Dalhart. This morning, Dalhart had the state low of 34 degrees and the Brownsville high of 73.

### New Snow Hits Mountain Area

By United Press. The worst accumulation of snow in 60 years is bogging down the mountain area of the West this morning. More than 1500 persons are marooned, and supplies are running out.

Transcontinental highways are blocked by snow, and more of the white stuff is now falling. A fresh spring snow, the heaviest since the crippling snows of December hit a hit northeastern Colorado and Wyoming.

### Drought Causes Cisco Hatchery To End Operation

AUSTIN, Mar. 21 (UP)—The drought has resulted in closing of two state fisheries at Medina and Cisco. A spokesman for the Game and Fish Commission says if heavy rains come soon, the two hatcheries might be placed in service in time for the 1952 hatching season.

## Southwestern Bell To Take Court Action To Get Raise In Ranger

Southwestern Bell Thursday took its Ranger rate case to court.

In a petition filed in the 91st District Court at Eastland the telephone company asked that the City of Ranger be enjoined from enforcing an ordinance passed November 16, 1948, which set present telephone rates. It also asked permission to put higher rates into effect under bond.

W. H. McAnally said "During 1950 and 1951, as in previous years, the Company's annual expenses in furnishing telephone service in Ranger exceeded revenues by many thousands of dollars."

"Higher rates the Company wants to make effective under bond in Ranger include \$9 monthly for one-party business service; \$4.75 for one-party residence; \$4 for two-party residence, and \$3.25 for four-party residence service", McAnally stated.

## Size Is Reduced For Air Parcels

The Department of Defense has notified the Post Office Department that the volume of air parcel post now being generated for delivery to members of the Armed Forces and civilian government employees served through military post offices overseas and on naval vessels has reached the point where the available aircraft space is being exceeded, and that it is necessary to impose limitations on Air Parcel Post (other than official air parcel post) for delivery through military post offices overseas and to naval vessels.

Accordingly, effective March 15, 1952, the limitations specified below will be applied to Air Parcel Post, other than official, addressed to APO's in care of the postmasters at New York, San Francisco, and New Orleans; and to Navy and Marine Corps units, including ships, addressed in care of the fleet post offices at New York and San Francisco:

(a) Limit of size, 30 inches in length and girth combined.

(b) Limit of weight, 2 pounds.

The term "Official Air Parcel Post" as used herein will be considered to embrace mail addressed to official titles such as commanding officer, officer in charge, or supply officer of any military or naval installation, base, unit, or vessel, and other government departments or agencies served through military post offices.

The foregoing limitations do not apply to air parcels mailed at overseas military post offices.

Post offices will continue to accept surface parcels not exceeding 100 inches in length and girth combined, and 70 pounds in weight, addressed to military post offices overseas and to naval vessels.

## Bogart Doesn't Think Much Of Winning "Oscar"

HOLLYWOOD, March 21 (UP)—Movie tough guy Humphrey Bogart, who ran off with this year's "Oscar", still thinks the top Hollywood award doesn't amount to much.

Last year, he said in a magazine article that the prize didn't prove anything. And he comments today, "the Oscar doesn't prove I was the best actor of the year. The only honest way would be to let everybody play Hamlet and let the best man win."

Vivien Leigh also won an Oscar, for her role in "A Streetcar Named Desire." And "An American in Paris" was chosen best picture of the year.

## Army To Conduct Study In Cost Of Mobilization

AUSTIN, March 21 (UP)—The Army will conduct an intensive two-week study in the economic problems of mobilization for war at Fort Worth May 12th to 23rd.

Headquarters of the Texas Military District said the course will be open to 150 civilian leaders in industry, education, economics and labor, and 150 senior reserve officers.

In addition to the resources of this country, the course will outline economic strengths and weaknesses of potential enemies, allies and neutrals.

The Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the study.

## Ridgway Says They Could Attack The Island Of Japan

By United Press. The United Nations Supreme Commander in the Far East, General Matthew Ridgway, charges that the Soviet Union has organized a vast military force in Siberia which would be thrown against Japan at any time.

Ridgway's warning came as American officers in Washington revealed that the Japanese Peace Treaty will become effective by mid-April.

American forces will remain in Japan, even after the treaty takes effect. But Japan will be substantially on her own, with full rights to negotiate treaties and build armaments.

American Sabre-Jet pilots say they spotted a full flight of new "Type 15" Communist jet fighters in Korea's MIG Alley. The new high-wing enemy jets refused to fight, but Allied Sabre-jets shot down five of the standard low-winged MIG-15 Jets, damaged 8 and probably damaged five more.

The communists came up with a so-called compromise on prisoner exchange at the truce table last night. Allied negotiators say it didn't contain much compromise. Under the Red Plan, only the Allied and Communist prisoners whose names already have been exchanged would be freed. In effect it would write off 53-thousand additional allied troops, including some 14-hundred Americans, who disappeared in Red captivity.

## Ten Die In Navy Plane Crash Today

CORPUS CHRISTI, March 21 (UP)—A Navy patrol bomber has crashed into Corpus Christi Bay taking the lives of 10 men.

The four-engine P-4Y2 fell into the bay one-fourth mile offshore from Corpus Christi early today. A Navy helicopter crew hovering over the wreckage shortly after daybreak reported none of the 10 men aboard survived.

The hull of the big plane is nose down in 10 feet of water. The helicopter crew said three feet of the tail section stands above the surface, and a tattered parachute flutters from one of the fins.

The plane crashed after taking off from Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, from an altitude of about 500 feet. Wreckage was driven ashore by large waves.

None of those aboard have yet been identified.

### Gonzales Warm Springs Reports Work Done In '51

GONZALES, March 21—More than 66,000 physical therapy treatments, a third of a million dollars' worth, were given at Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children in 1951, according to a report just published by the Texas treatment center covering last year's activities.

This report to the people of Texas, whose generosity has made the Gonzales hospital of physical medicine and rehabilitation possible, indicates a substantial increase in the activity of every department over previous years. The number of patients admitted was up some 15 per cent while out-patients increased more than 100 per cent over 1950. Some 3560 braces and appliances were manufactured in the hospital's brace shop, and laboratory and x-ray examinations totaled 3582.

Patients from 83 Texas counties were admitted during 1951, making a total of 143 counties represented at the Gonzales treatment center in the last four years and indicating the state-wide scope of the foundation's benefits.

A most important advance made during 1951 was a gradual reduction in the hospitalization period of patients, from an average of more than seven months late in 1950 to just over three months at the end of 1951. Improving medical programs and advances in follow-up care made this possible.

The report also indicates the source of income to the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation during the past year. Of all money received in 1951, 43.5 per cent came from contributions, the largest single source. March of Dimes funds, available to the Gonzales Foundation only for payment of treatment costs of patients sent there by local chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, comprised just under 30 per cent of the total. The balance came from hospitalization insurance policies of the patients or from their families in with their ability to pay treatment costs, with any difference made up from the foundation's welfare fund.

Of all money spent in 1951, the report shows that 88.4 per cent went for patient care, with executive offices needing 6.1 per cent, county educational and informational work 1.9 per cent, and the fund raising 3.6 per cent.
