

If the pond or tank is already stocked, he recommends a fertilization program. Farm ponds can be fertilized just the same as can farm crops and the results are equally as good. He likes to use mixture of 400 pounds of cotonseed meal and 200 pounds of per cent superphosphate. The first application of 300 pounds er surface acre of water should made about this time of the year. Broadcast it on the surface of the pond and follow with second, third and forth applicaon of 100 pounds each at three four week intervals. The fertilir program should be completed efore hot weather arrives and efore July 1, says Callender.

High grade commercially mixed fer ilizers can be substituted for the above mixture, says the specialist and should be applied at the rate of 500 to 600 pounds per acre per year. The first application should be from 200 to 300 pounds per acre and 100 pound






